2024 Outlook

Army's writeup here will be brief. Just once in the last decade have the Knights had a player finish inside the top 40 at their respective position in CFF, meaning you should not invest any draft capital here. With that said, there are players on the roster that could make for a weekly streaming option should the matchup dictate it, starting with Bryson Daily. The senior quarterback scored 27 or more fantasy points three times last season, becoming the first Army QB since Kelvin Hopkins Jr. in 2018 to hit 200+ rushing attempts. Much was made last offseason about Army's scheme change deviating away from the standard triple-option offense, but the core principles remained the same as the Knights were 2nd nationally in rush rate. After Daily, the next three leading rushers were all fullbacks, as freshman Kanye Udoh was the best of the bunch, averaging over five yards per carry on 99 attempts. For Udoh to be a CFF option, his usage inside the 20-yard line must change. Daily held a 47-to-6 advantage in red-zone attempts last season. The Knights return three starters up front from a group that finished 12th in the country in Line Yards, so we're expecting a healthy rushing output in 2024.

2024 Outlook

No surprise that the Charlotte offense was putrid in 2023 with an entirely new coaching staff, a first-time play-caller, and a team that was returning just 33% of their offensive production. The 49ers finished 126th in scoring (17.5 PPG) and were equally ineffective via the run and pass, ranking 125th in pass success rate and 128th in rush success rate. HC Biff Poggi is not one to sit around and sulk, though, revamping the roster with a collection of P4 transfers, some of which bring a considerable amount of playing experience. The QB1 job was solidified during the spring with Florida transfer Max Brown, who will be a significant upgrade over what the 49ers trotted out a year ago. The 6-foot-2, 220-pound redshirt freshman rushed for over 2,300 yards in two seasons as a starter in high school and will take over a QB1 spot that accounted for 24% of the team's rushing attempts. Similar utilization could make Brown a spot-starter in CFF provided the right matchup. Remember when folks thought Cartevious Norton was that next stud running back for Iowa State? Well, he's now at Charlotte as the perceived RB1 with Poggi calling Norton "very special." Charlotte was particularly run-heavy in 2023, ranked 34th in rush rate, but split up the carries with no running back having more than 18% volume share. The WR room is completely revamped after adding transfers O'Mega Blake (South Carolina), Justin Olson (Middle Tennessee), and Isaiah Myers (JUCO). The 6-foot-5 Myers was given the nickname "Up-top Zay" and is expected to give the offense a vertical threat that was lacking a year ago.

It shouldn't come as a surprise that the floor bottomed out for ECU last season as one of the least experienced teams in the country, falling to last place in the AAC with a 2-10 record. Offensively, it was a disaster, finishing 127th nationally in scoring (17.3 PPG) and their 277.3 YPG was worst in the conference. HC Mike Houston retained his job, but changes were needed on the offensive staff, as he went out and hired John David Baker who spent the last three seasons with Lane Kiffin at Ole Miss. Fast, assertive, and explosive were the terms used to describe Baker's vision for the ECU offense in 2024, and that will start at quarterback, where there will be a decision between transfers Katin Houser (Michigan State) and Jake Garcia (Missouri). There was little separation between the two coming out of the spring, and neither player offers much from a rushing standpoint. More often than not over the last decade, Houston's teams have deployed a committee approach in the backfield. Baker, of course, oversaw a workhorse at Ole Miss, Quinshon Judkins, who combined for over 540 carries in two seasons. Rahjai Harris, Marlon Gunn Jr., and Javious Bond are no Quinshon Judkins. That said, there is room for improvement with four starters back on the offensive line, and the lone vacant spot likely to be filled by a senior transfer from Maine. The starting wide receivers were solidified in the spring with Chase Sowell and Anthony Smith on the outside, with former Florida State and West Virginia transfer Winston Wright in the slot.

Year 1 for Tom Herman did not go as planned, inheriting a relatively experienced roster, yet finishing the season with a 4-8 record and losing all four games in the month of November. Herman does not have that same benefit entering 2024, as FAU will be one of the least experienced teams in the country, bringing back just one starter on offense from a group that finished 88th in scoring (23.8 PPG). Last year, LaJohntay Wester was FAU's top fantasy option, as he led the entire country in targets (152). The slot receiver in Herman's offenses has finished as the team's WR1 in five of the last seven seasons now, averaging 21.3 FPPG and hitting the 100-target threshold in all five years. Who starts in the slot this season is not as concrete with multiple options still in play. Appalachian State transfer Milan Tucker was the early frontrunner, but the spring game performance from sophomore Omari Hayes opened eyes, as he finished with seven receptions in the first half. That said, 14 different players caught a pass in the scrimmage with Herman telling the media afterwards they do not want to be over-reliant on any one receiver like they were with Wester in 2023. As for who will throw passes for FAU, competition will rage on in the summer between Marshall transfer Cam Fancher and junior Tyriq Starks, with the latter having the better spring game of the two. We have moderate interest in the outcome here given Herman's usage of his QB1 in the running game, averaging around 26% volume share. Backfield duties will likely be shared by Zuberi Mobley and Florida State transfer CJ Campbell.

Will Memphis have the best offense among G5 schools in 2024? The Tigers finished last season with the 6th highest scoring offense in the country at 39.4 PPG, were 14th overall in yards per game (458.6), and the offensive core remains largely intact, ranking 29th in returning production. Veteran quarterback Seth Henigan is back for his fourth season as a starter after finishing as QB10 in CFF, averaging 28.5 FPPG. Perhaps not the ceiling of a dual-threat quarterback, but Henigan's fantasy owners could confidently start him without worry in redraft as he scored at least 20 fantasy points in every single regular season game. Henigan's top two options in the passing game are also back, seniors Roc Taylor and DeMeer Blankumsee who combined for 185 targets and 33% of the team's receiving touchdowns. With senior tight end Anthony Landphere also returning, combined with the addition of transfer Jyaire Shorter, there's little reason to expect any regression occurring with this passing attack. Blake Watson was a CFF superstar in 2023, but South Carolina transfer Mario Anderson feels like a plug-and-play solution. His versatility was on display from the jump in the spring game with a 40-yard reception on the first play. Offensive coordinator Tim Cramsey has as good a reputation as any OC in college football at producing high-level CFF running backs, with a pair of top five finishers in the last three seasons, Watson and Rasheen Ali. The biggest question will be up front where the Tigers must replace three starters from a group that finished 94th in line yards.

Just one season in and HC Brian Newberry already made a coordinator change, hiring former Mercer head coach Drew Cronic to lead the offense. The new scheme is being described as a "hybrid Wing-T" offense that will marry principles between the standard flexbone triple option we're accustomed to from Navy and the spread option. The common theme with Cronic is that he's flexible and will customize the offense to his personnel. Last season, his Mercer squad ran the football 63% of the time. The year prior to that, Cronic had a quarterback throw for 32 touchdowns. We won't see 32 passing touchdowns from Navy this season, but the examples speak to how Cronic will adapt to the roster he inherits. In an ideal setting, the new OC stated to the media that he "would like to throw the ball 25% of the time and complete 75% of those attempts." With all that said, we'll take a wait-and-see approach for CFF to get a sense of how this offense operates before adding any Navy players to our roster. The likeliest candidate would be fullback Alex Tecza, who led the Midshipmen with 760 yards and five touchdowns at 6.0 yards per carry. For what it's worth, Cronic's RB1 at Mercer in 2021 did rush for 14 touchdowns.

The offense certainly wasn't the reason North Texas failed to make a bowl game in the first year of Eric Morris' tenure, as they finished 20th nationally in scoring (34.5 PPG) and sixth in yards per game (495.8). As expected under Morris, the Mean Green ran a ton of plays and were reliant on throwing the football, ranking 32nd in pass rate with quarterback Chandler Rogers, who finished as QB21 despite not starting the opener. Rogers departed for Cal via the portal, though we're not expecting much of a downgrade with the addition of TCU transfer Chandler Morris. Because of the Air Raid concepts and Morris' dual-threat ability, there is legitimate QB1 upside if everything clicks. Receiver is a question mark, having to replace standout Ja'Mori Maclin and Roderic Burns. Senior Damon Ward is the veteran of the group, finishing last year with 39 receptions and five touchdowns, though he had the same number of drops as Maclin with about half the targets. Last year's preseason darling DT Sheffield transferred over from Washington State because of his familiarity with the coaching staff. 5-foot-11 Landon Sides was impressive as a freshman with 30 catches on 39 targets, including two TDs in the finale vs. UAB. Those three wideouts are worth a dart throw with an ADP beyond Round 15. Despite the philosophical change to an Air Raid, North Texas still produced a 1,000-yard rusher in Ayo Adeyi, though he jettisoned to James Madison. Junior Ikaika Ragsdale and Minnesota transfer Zach Evans will handle the bulk of the rushing duties behind an OL that returns just two starters.

Things you did not expect to say today when Rice hired Mike Bloomgren back in 2018 – The Owls run an Air Raid offense. Well, not technically, but the offensive philosophy has certainly shifted since Bloomgren hired Marques Tuiasosopo three years ago. Rice threw the football 47% of the time in 2022, 5% more than in 2021. Last season, the Owls ranked 22nd nationally in pass rate at a 52% clip. And similarly to a year ago, the offensive personnel alludes to Rice being pass-happy in 2024. Bloomgren hit the portal again for his QB1, adding Temple transfer and two-year starter EJ Warner, who has thrown for 3,000 yards in back-to-back seasons. Expect a seamless transition, but Warner remains a limited CFF option as a non-runner. Sharing the backfield with Warner is senior Dean Connors, who finished fourth among running backs with 57 targets. For obvious reasons, Connors' value increases immensely in PPR formats, and there's some untapped potential as a runner after averaging 6.5 yards per carry with a 55.7% breakaway rate on just 122 attempts. Rice also returns four starters along the offensive line, lending to better rushing production as a whole. Rice likely won't have another 120-target receiver like Luke McCaffrey, now in the NFL, but the pieces are in place to sustain the levels of success throwing the football. Landon Ransom-Goelz and Rawson MacNeill combined for 52 receptions and five touchdowns as freshman and will step into full-time starting roles as sophomores. Tight end Boden Groen finished third on the team with 39 targets on 51 targets, functioning as a third receiver lining up in the slot 44% of the time.

Can Alex Golesh now be deemed a certified quarterback guru? Sure, he's worked under offensive-minded coaches in the past like Josh Heupel and Matt Campbell, but the resume is growing rapidly. The last six quarterbacks Golesh has coached have combined to average 29.1 FPPG, the most recent being sophomore Byrum Brown, who finished as QB4 in 2023 with over 4,000 total yards and 37 combined touchdowns. In fact, Brown joined Heisman Trophy winner Jayden Daniels as the only players in college football to post 3,000 passing yards and 800 rushing yards in a season. The sophomore quarterback enters 2024 with the surrounding pieces largely intact, including his No.1 target Sean Atkins, as USF ranks 5th nationally in returning production. Maybe the only concern for Brown is the roadblocks in the non-conference portion of the schedule with a road trip to Alabama in Week 2, followed by an in-state battle with Miami. This offense should cruise outside of those two weeks. Atkins emerged from relative obscurity to finish sixth in the country in receptions (92) on 120 targets, continuing the streak of successful slot receivers within this offensive scheme. The USF backfield is talented with returning starter Nay'Quan Wright and Bowling Green transfer Ta'ron Keith, but neither will receive the requisite volume to become a weekly CFF starter. This is typically a system where you'll see a healthy split between the RB1 and RB2 for carries, along with a heavy dosage of rushing attempts for the quarterback.

The Temple football program is in a bad spot with just 10 wins over the last four years, and just saw its best offensive player, quarterback E.J. Warner, transfer to Rice. Suffice to say we should not be using any CFF draft capital on a Temple player, but is there a position to target potentially on waivers if someone emerges? The Owls have been extremely pass-happy the last two seasons under offensive coordinator Danny Langsdorf at a 60% clip, so our focus initially should go to the pass-catchers. Former Colorado State transfer Dante Wright is the most experienced of the bunch, leading the team with 77 targets in 2023, and did have a strong close to the year with 12 receptions in the final two weeks. Tight ends have been a focal point with David Martin-Robinson and Jordan Smith, who combined for over 100 targets last season. Both have since graduated, but sophomore Reese Clark had a standout spring game with 87 yards on five receptions. He'll be a watchlist candidate during fall camp. With Warner moving on, there's also a chance we see Temple shift more towards the run in 2024. After all, HC Stan Drayton is a former running backs coach. Sophomore Joquez Smith should lead the group and did have a 29-point fantasy performance in Week 3 last season, rushing for 142 yards against Norfolk State. Transfers Antwain Littleton (Maryland) and Tyrei Washington (San Francisco) will provide depth.

Tulane made the best hire of the coaching carousel. All Jon Sumrall did in two seasons with the Troy Trojans was accumulate a 23-4 record and back-to-back Sun Belt Conference championships. There is some roster turnover on the offensive side of the football, namely at quarterback with Michael Pratt headed to the NFL, but Sumrall backfilled several spots by shrewdly utilizing the transfer portal. Oregon transfer Ty Thompson battled last year's backup Kai Horton in the spring, though Sumrall stated the team will not be naming a starter anytime soon. Thompson, a former 4-star recruit, looks the part at 6-foot-4, 220 pounds with dual threat ability. Offensive coordinator Joe Craddock did wonders last season tutoring Gunnar Watson, who finished last season as QB33 with over 3,500 passing yards and 28 total touchdowns. This was also the best possible hire for CFF owners of sophomore running back Makhii Hughes, as Craddock has often featured a bell cow in the backfield when calling plays, as evidenced recently with Troy's Kimani Vidal. Hughes' 49% volume share was one of the highest marks in the country last season, showing even as a freshman that he can handle a heavy workload. Wide receiver should also be a strength, as Sumrall added a pair of transfers in Mario Williams (USC) and Shazz Preston (Alabama). CFF drafters of Williams are hoping he can replicate the success Craddock has had the last two seasons with slot receivers, as Tez Johnson and Jabre Barber both flourished. Tight end Alex Bauman is an underrated piece of this passing game with 35 receptions and five touchdowns on 46 targets a year ago.

We've witnessed worse debuts from first-year head coaches, and Kevin Wilson seems to have the arrow pointed upwards entering 2024. Outside of the two-game stretch when Tulsa was outscored 111-20 in late October, the Golden Hurricane were competitive most weeks with an offense that finished 22nd nationally in pace and 7th in the AAC in yards per game. And that was with three different quarterbacks starting at least one game due to injuries. Wilson hit the portal following spring practices to shore up the position, nabbing former Utah State grad transfer Cooper Legas, who likely winds up as QB1 with 15 starts of experience over the last two seasons. Three of last year's top four receivers left via transfer, including Devan Williams and Marquis Shoulders, who landed at Houston after spring ball. Don't be surprised to see Kamdyn Benjamin's ADP rise throughout the summer, as Tulsa's lone returning starter at the position. The 5-foot-9 senior had a strong close to last season with 37 of his 74 targets coming in the final three weeks with a combined 86 fantasy points scored in that stretch. Sixth-year senior running back Anthony Watkins is deserving of late-round consideration after rushing for 889 yards on 197 carries. Dating back to his time at Indiana, Wilson does prefer a bell cow in the backfield with his RB1 averaging 240 carries per season between 2014-16. We'd be more interested in Watkins if Tulsa did not need to replace four starters along the offensive line. The schedule sets up nicely in 2024 with the only challenging opponent on the slate being a matchup at home with Oklahoma State.

The UAB offense was one of the biggest unknowns in CFF entering last season with first-time head coach Trent Dilfer and coordinator Alex Mortensen, who had zero play-calling experience. Those that invested in any UAB players were pleased with the results. Jacob Zeno was a revelation, completing 73% of his passes for over 3,100 yards and 24 total touchdowns, finishing at QB41. Drafters of Zeno will be hoping for a bit more consistency in 2024, as he had three performances of 13 fantasy points or less last season. WR1 Tejhaun Palmer graduated, but there is untapped potential at receiver with Amare Thomas, Iverson Hooks, and T.J. Jones. The 5-foot-11 Thomas led UAB last season in both targets (67) and receptions (53) as a freshman and led all Blazers with eight catches in the spring game. Mortensen's lack of historical tendencies to reference are our only hesitation with Thomas, given he finished with just 16% of the target share. Does Mortensen prefer to spread it around on an annual basis? Or was that a one-off and we see the targets funneled within a tighter rotation? There was a period between Weeks 4-7 where Thomas posted double-digit targets in three of four games, including 12 vs. Georgia. RB1 for UAB is a hot-button topic this offseason between Isaiah Jacobs and Lee Beebe, and questions were left unanswered, as Jacobs was unavailable in the spring due to injury. Jacobs was the RB2 behind Jermaine Brown Jr. to begin the year, though Beebe significantly outperformed him in several areas, including yards per attempt and yards after contact. The Blazers return four starters on an offensive line that finished 3rd in line yards.

Last season was a disappointment given CFF expectations for UTSA players. Looking back at the preseason guide, three Roadrunners were within our top 15 at their position – Frank Harris, Joshua Cephus, and Kevorian Barnes – and just one met the mark. In fairness to Harris, he did play without the services of his top playmaker De'Corian Clark, as he recovered from a gruesome knee injury suffered in November of 2022. Early reports in the spring suggest UTSA may still be without Clark for the foreseeable future, as head coach Jeff Traylor said the Roadrunners are "hoping" Clark will be available at some point during the season. Doesn't sound promising. Sophomore Devin McCuin should lead this year's group of receivers with Clark and Cephus out of the picture, coming off a promising freshman season in which he was second on the team with 43 receptions and three touchdowns. Texas Tech transfer J.J. Sparkman was a spring game standout and brings plenty of size to the group at 6-foot-4. With the moving pieces at receiver, and Frank Harris now graduated, it is reasonable to expect 'some' regression in 2024 with this passing game. The Roadrunners will not start from scratch at quarterback, however, with sophomore Owen McCown at QB1 after starting two games a year ago. The son of former NFL quarterback Josh McCown looked very capable in his appearances, completing 18-of-20 passes at Tennessee in Week 4, and 251 passing yards in the bowl game win vs. Marshall. This was an unexpected committee in the backfield with Barnes, Robert Henry and Rocko Griffin Jr. splitting carries all year. All three return with an offensive line that brings back three starters.

Others may disagree, but there isn't a player in CFF with a wider range of possible outcomes than Thomas Castellanos. The junior quarterback set a school record last season with his legs, rushing for 1,113 yards and 13 touchdowns, with more designed runs than any quarterback in college football outside of the academies. Does that change with new head coach Bill O'Brien now in charge, someone who has primarily worked with pocket passers? Throwing the football was also an adventure, as he completed just 57% of his throws with a near 1-to-1 touchdown to interception ratio. The hope is that O'Brien can remedy some of Castellanos' issues given his prior work with quarterbacks like Tom Brady and Bryce Young. Working in favor of Castellanos is an improved group of receivers that include Jerand Bradley (Texas Tech), Jayden McGowan (Vanderbilt), and promising talents like sophomore Jaedn Skeete and Lewis Bond. BC's 119th ranked pass rate would have to spike considerably to allow for one of these receivers to be a viable CFF option. Tight end usage under O'Brien was prevalent at both Penn State and Alabama, averaging around 29 receptions and four touchdowns over the span of four seasons, so North Carolina transfer Kamari Morales should be a watch list candidate. In the backfield, RB1 Kye Robichaux returns after rushing for 780 yards and eight scores in 2023, but he will now be joined by Kansas State transfer Treshaun Ward, whose presence could alter the rushing distribution. Three starters are back from an offensive line unit that finished 28th in line yards and 15th in EPA per rush play.

Justin Wilcox will be on his third offensive coordinator in three years after Jake Spavital left after one season to take the same position at Baylor. Wilcox hired from within, elevating offensive line coach Mike Bloesch, who does have play-calling experience as an OC from his days at North Texas from 2020-22. Bloesch's offenses have been geared more towards run, which would be a sensible thing to do in 2024 having a potential star in Jaydn Ott, who finished last season as RB17 with 1,300 yards and 14 total touchdowns. Ott was a bell cow with 68% volume share, and particularly so down the stretch, as he averaged almost 26 touches per game over the final six weeks. The slight hesitation with Ott is the depth at the position with transfer Kadarius Calloway (Old Dominion) and Byron Cardwell. Asked how many running backs can play in a game assuming everyone is healthy, Bloesch stated, "probably four. I think is probably realistic." A mild surprise in the spring was Fernando Mendoza closing camp with a lead in the quarterback competition over North Texas transfer Chandler Rogers, who finished last season at QB22. Mendoza played well in spots last year, including a 40-point fantasy performance against USC in Week 9, but he should be considered a streaming option only. Junior Trond Grizzell should garner mild fantasy interest as Cal's projected WR1. Despite his 6-foot-4 stature, Grizzell played 74% of his snaps in the slot last year. In all three years at North Texas, Bloesch's leading target-getter played in the slot. Tight end Jack Endries was outstanding as a freshman with 35 receptions on 56 targets, but his value is hazy now with the addition of Maryland transfer Corey Dyches.

The optimistic view for Clemson is that the second year under offensive coordinator Garrett Riley produces better results, because as we know, the Tigers didn't upgrade this roster via the transfer portal. Improved health will help, as the Tigers played the bulk of the season without its starting left tackle and 2022 leading receiver Antonio Williams due to injury. In limited action, Williams was extremely effective again with 21 receptions on 28 targets, splitting his time in the slot and on the boundary. Expect Williams to start outside in 2024 with the emergence of sophomore Tyler Brown, who was equally as effective inside with a 77% catch rate. While having both on the field is a huge boost to the Clemson passing attack, neither player presents much CFF value with their low aDOT (average depth of target) being within 10 yards of the line of scrimmage. Former 5-star Adam Randall and 4-star freshman Bryant Wesco will compete for the third starting spot, with the latter being a premier dynasty option. One prediction theCFFSite nailed last year was Jake Briningstool becoming Clemson's top pass-catcher, as he finished at TE9 with a team-high 74 targets. Leading the Tigers again in that category is a realistic possibility. Senior running back Phil Mafah is solidly a late first or early second-round pick in CFF following Will Shipley's departure. 220+ carries is a distinct possibility for Mafah with the backup running backs having just 20 carries of collegiate experience. Second year starting quarterback Cade Klubnik is a perfect option for zero-QB (drafted beyond Round 20) builds in CFF, as there is no competition for the starting job and his 2024 floor is likely last season's QB52 finish.

A basketball school like Duke will never be able to retain a coach that wins 17 games in two seasons like Mike Elko did, especially when Texas A&M and their unlimited checkbook comes calling. In is former Miami head coach Manny Diaz to usher in a new era of Duke football that is not entirely starting from a blank slate, especially offensively with some key playmakers who should be of interest in CFF. Something about the month of November makes Jordan Moore come alive. The former QB turned WR made a successful position switch in 2023, leading the Blue Devils with 62 receptions and eight touchdowns. Even with the injuries at quarterback, Moore was heavily involved the second half of the year, posting double-digit targets in four of the final six weeks. As for who will be throwing Moore the ball, the early favorite is Texas transfer Maalik Murphy, who is a physical specimen at the position at 6-foot-5, 235 pounds, and has a cannon on an arm. Where that ball goes is a different story, as accuracy has been a flaw since his high school days. There are no shortage of target options alongside Moore with Old Dominion transfer Javon Harvey and returning starters Samir Hagans and tight end Nicky Dalmolin. RB1 is in good shape with senior Jaquez Moore, who averaged close to six yards a carry in 2023. He's expected to handle the lion's share of the workload, even with the addition of New Mexico State transfer Star Thomas, but the duo will run behind an offensive line that returns just one starter and appeared shaky in the spring. Moore is a late-round PPR option in an offense under OC Jonathan Brewer - formerly of SMU - that often features running backs in the passing game.

On paper, it's tough to envision the Florida State offense not regressing some in 2024 after finishing first in the conference in scoring (34.6 PPG) a season ago. The Seminoles bring back just 56% of their offensive production and will incorporate an influx of unproven transfers at the FBS level. That doesn't pertain to starting quarterback D.J. Uiagalelei, who has now started 40 games at the collegiate level and should provide stability at the position replacing Jordan Travis. There's a high floor to DJU from a fantasy perspective entering this system under Mike Norvell, as his QB1 has rushed for seven touchdowns in each of the last four seasons. We question the ceiling, though, as he is a career 59% passer combined with an unproven group of receivers. High on promise, low on productivity with Florida State wideouts, many of whom are former 4-star prospects with little on-field production. Former Alabama transfer Malik Benson was the best of the bunch in spring and certainly worth a dart throw beyond Round 15 in CFF drafts. Tight end Kyle Morlock played well in a secondary role behind Jaheim Bell with 19 receptions on 30 targets, and his 6-foot-6 frame makes him a clear red-zone threat. In the backfield, our initial expectation is a committee approach with as many as four different rushers being featured, including veteran Lawrance Toafili, transfers Roydell Williams (Alabama) and Jaylin Lucas (Indiana), and 4-star freshman Kam Davis. Norvell hasn't featured a bell cow in the backfield since his days at Memphis.

2024 Outlook

One of the bigger surprises in college football and perhaps the 'biggest' surprise in college fantasy last season was Georgia Tech under first-year head coach Brent Key. The Yellow Jackets finished third in the ACC in yards per game (424.6) and fourth in scoring (31.1), resulting in multiple players being difference makers in CFF. Once an afterthought at Texas A&M, quarterback Haynes King revitalized his career in 2023, finishing as QB11 with over 3,500 total yards and 37 touchdowns. The consistency was unmatched among fantasy quarterbacks, as King scored 20 or more fantasy points in every start, with eight performances of 30+ fantasy points. Third-string wide receiver turned starting running back Jamal Haynes was a revelation, rushing for 1,059 yards with seven touchdowns. His usage increased as the season progressed, averaging 17 touches per game over the final six weeks. The passing game should be proficient with 77% of the receiving production back, including sophomore Eric Singleton Jr., who led Georgia Tech as a freshman with 714 yards and six touchdowns. Starting slot receiver Malik Rutherford excelled with a 67% catch rate and only one drop on 66 targets. While the Yellow Jackets bring back almost the entire offensive core, the reluctance for completely buying in for 2024 is the schedule. The Yellow Jackets have three bye weeks, one of which occurs during the first round of the fantasy playoffs, and they have a backloaded schedule, which includes matchups against Notre Dame, Miami, NC State and Georgia.

As we all predicted (sarcasm), the Louisville offense under Jeff Brohm was dominant on the ground in 2023, producing two top 50 fantasy running backs, Jawhar Jordan and Isaac Guerendo, who combined for nearly 2,000 yards rushing and 24 total touchdowns. Expect that to shift this season, as the backfield looks light on talent with Jordan/Guerendo graduating and the unexpected departure of Peny Boone, who transferred in from Toledo during the offseason but left post-spring seeking a more lucrative NIL bag. The offense likely centers around the passing game with new starting quarterback Tyler Shough, who has been good when healthy, averaging 32 FPPG in three games last season at Texas Tech, and he owns a career completion rate of 63%. The problem is Shough's durability, having been limited each of the last two seasons with collarbone and shoulder issues. With the likelihood Brohm reverts back to his pass-happy ways in 2024, Shough could be a bargain in CFF drafts if he makes it through the year unscathed. The wide receiver situation is somewhat murky with South Alabama transfer Caullin Lacy arriving in the summer. Lacy's absence, and JaCorey Brooks (Alabama) not being available for portions of spring allowed for others to emerge, namely junior Chris Bell, who had over 100 yards and two scores in the spring game. Nine of the last 10 WR1s for Brohm have been boundary receivers, which Bell is, having played 98% of his snaps out wide last season. We'll be paying close attention in fall camp to see who stands out, as the WR1 for Brohm has regularly been a highly productive fantasy asset, averaging 81 catches per season.

The Hurricanes have unlimited resources in the NIL era, so Mario Cristobal will continually field one of the most talented rosters in the ACC for years to come. Bad news for conference foes, but good news for CFF players, as Miami added (bought) several high-end fantasy options at every skill position. Washington State transfer Cam Ward looks to be a seamless fit for OC Shannon Dawson's system, as he reportedly dazzled all spring, and that was evident in the spring game, completing 17-of-23 passes for 260 yards with a pair of touchdowns. From a skillset standpoint, Ward is comparable to Clayton Tune, whom Dawson coached back at Houston and finished as QB5 in 2022. There are no shortage of weapons for Ward at receiver with Xavier Restrepo returning in the slot after posting an 85-catch season, finishing as WR27. His rapport was strong with Ward in the spring and Restrepo should be a top 10 fantasy receiver by season's end. Dawson's WR1 has now hit 100+ targets in five of the last seven seasons. Second-leading receiver Jacolby George is also back, but the staff felt the need to add more weaponry with Houston transfer Sam Brown, who led the Cougars with 62 receptions in 2023. It's debatable as to which player is the WR2 behind Restrepo entering this season. Oregon State transfer Damien Martinez gives Miami a bell-cow running back, something the Hurricanes haven't had in almost a decade. He is expected receive the bulk of the carries as sophomore Mark Fletcher works his way back from a late-season injury. Incoming freshman tight end Elija Lofton, who garnered rave reviews in the spring while also spending time at running back, should be a dynasty stash for 2025.

If there's a P4 team that takes a step back offensively in 2024, North Carolina feels like a prime candidate, returning just 44% of its offensive production from a year ago (112th), and they have to replace one of the best quarterbacks in program history, Drake Maye. The plan as of now at QB1 appears to be former Texas A&M and LSU transfer Max Johnson, who does bring a wealth of experience as a 22-game starter with nearly 6,000 career passing yards. Bringing back Jacolby Criswell via transfer following spring ball did raise an eyebrow, though, possibly indicating the staff's confidence in the QB room as it currently stands. Omarion Hampton finished as RB6 last year, rushing for 1,500 yards and 15 touchdowns with over 50% of the backfield volume share. The concern for Hampton owners would be the surrounding pieces. In addition to identifying a new quarterback, the offensive line must replace four starters. On the other hand, there doesn't appear to be a serious threat to Hampton's workload with just Darwin Barlow (USC) added as backfield depth. DeVontez Walker left early for the NFL, but four of the top five receivers from last year return, including Nate McCollum, J.J. Jones and Kobe Paysour. Is there a difference maker amongst that trio? 6-foot-1 freshman Jordan Shipp looked the part in the team's spring game with a 16-yard touchdown. Expect Shipp to be a factor in 2024. Junior Bryson Nesbit posted the highest mark ever for a tight end under offensive coordinator Chip Lindsey, finishing as TE10 with 41 receptions on 62 targets.

If you watched the spring game, you'd have thought Grayson McCall and offensive coordinator Robert Anae had worked together for years. This looks as if it'll be a seamless transition for the former Coastal Carolina quarterback, as he completed 16-of-20 passes in the scrimmage with a pair of touchdowns. Ultimately, McCall's fantasy value will be determined by how much he runs the ball in 2024, which Anae has not been shy about getting the position involved, with his QB1 averaging 159 carries per season over the last six years. We've read that the staff does not want to run McCall as much as they did Brennan Armstrong last season, for what it's worth. Duke transfer running back Jordan Waters was the star of spring camp and is solidified as the starter. Running back production under Anae is hit or miss. We have examples like last year where the RB1 didn't get 100 carries. On the flip side, Anae's RB1 hit 200+ attempts in 2017-18 at Virginia and with Syracuse in 2022. The biggest difference between this year's NC State offense and 2023 is the upgrade in talent at wide receiver. KC Concepcion was a one-man wrecking crew as a freshman, finishing as WR20 with 71 receptions and 10 touchdowns on 28% target share. The next closest receiver had just 247 yards. Not an issue this season with a trio of transfers in Noah Rogers (Ohio State), Wesley Grimes (Wake Forest) and tight end Justin Joly (Connecticut). Anae has exhibited in the past that he'll feature the tight end position, and Joly's usage (80 targets) with the Huskies last season is intriguing, as he spent 50% of his time lined up in the slot.

Pat Narduzzi made a change at offensive coordinator this offseason, hiring 31-year-old Kade Bell, who spent the last three seasons at Western Carolina. In 2023, Bell's offense finished fourth in the FCS in scoring, averaging 37.5 points per game, and they averaged just over 500 yards per game. The most prominent difference between Bell's offense and what we've witnessed from previous Pitt teams is the increased pass rates, as Western Carolina threw the ball around 53% of the time in the past three years. Junior Nate Yarnell likely gets the nod at QB1 after his successful two-game audition in 2023, scoring 22 fantasy points against both Boston College and Duke to close the year. Not exactly fleet of football at 6-foot-6, but Yarnell did show surprising mobility with 48 rushing yards in those two starts. Three of Pitt's top four receivers from last season are back, most notably Konata Mumpfield, who led the team with 44 receptions. Excluding Mumpfield, the WR depth chart feels unsettled. Returnees Daejon Reynolds and sophomore Kenny Johnson figure to be in the mix – the latter was a spring game standout with six receptions and 77 yards. Bell also brought with him a pair of transfers from Western Carolina, Censere Lee and Raphael Williams Jr., who combined for over 2,000 receiving yards and 20 touchdowns the last two seasons. Expect the backfield to be a two-man show featuring returning starter Rodney Hammond and Western Carolina transfer Desmond Reid, who topped 800 rushing yards in each of the last two years.

The biggest spring development at SMU was starting quarterback Preston Stone announcing that he's cleared to play after suffering a leg injury in the season finale against Navy. Stone played as expected in his first year as a full-time starter, completing 60% of his throws for 3,200 yards and 32 total touchdowns, despite not having a go-to receiver. Post Week 6, Stone was a consistent CFF producer, scoring 30 or more fantasy points in six of the last seven games. For all the transfers Rhett Lashlee brought in last season at receiver, not one developed into a reliable option for Stone. No wideout had more than 13% of the target share with seven different receivers having at least 30 targets. Six of the seven wideouts return in 2024, with former TCU transfer Jordan Hudson being the only one selected currently in drafts, as believers are banking on his 4-star profile. Lashlee's offense has produced four 1,000-yard receivers in the last six seasons, so there is precedent of someone emerging. Tight end RJ Maryland led the team with 57 targets and seven touchdowns, closing the year as TE12. Maryland is a P4-level talent, so he'll look the part in the ACC. Three of the top four rushers are back, Jaylan Knighton, Camar Wheaton, and LJ Johnson, so we're anticipating another year of a full-fledged committee. Johnson, the former Texas A&M transfer, was starting to come on before a late-season injury, as he posted 100-yard performances against North Texas and Memphis, and he led all SMU running backs with 26 red zone carries.

Despite the 3-9 record in 2023, there are several reasons to be excited for the potential of this Stanford offense in Year 2 under head coach Troy Taylor. First and foremost, the returning production, as the Cardinal rank second nationally, bringing back nearly every starter on offense with the exception of running back EJ Smith, who transferred to Texas A&M. It was an up and down season for first-year starting QB Ashton Daniels, as he threw for 2,220 yards and 11 touchdowns. The highs did show flashes of elite fantasy potential, scoring 40 fantasy points against both Colorado and eventual national runner-up Washington. No head coach in the country deploys their QB1 in the running game more than Taylor at 29.8% volume share, and that was evident with Daniels, who averaged around nine attempts per game. At receiver, Elic Ayomanor and Tiger Bachmeier return as starters, though both missed spring camp with injuries. Ayomanor became the first 100-target receiver under Taylor since Cooper Kupp in 2016, and he had a dominant stretch between Week's 7-9, when he combined for 43 targets in three games, including a 60-point fantasy performance vs. Colorado. With the duo out for spring, freshman Emmett Mosley ran primarily with the 1's and was a versatile piece for the offense in camp as a deep threat, and he was utilized out of the backfield. Tight end Sam Roush played well in relief of the injured Ben Yurosek with 37 of his 43 targets coming in the final six games. Stanford's top two rushers were its quarterbacks, Daniels and backup Justin Lamson, so our interest in sophomore running back Sedrick Irvin in standard redraft leagues is minimal, though the offensive line remains largely intact from last year.

Syracuse ripped the band-aid off by moving on from Dino Babers, who had just two winning seasons since being hired in 2016. In to ignite the football program is former Georgia DB coach Fran Brown, who is widely known as one of the best recruiters in the country. There is a limited number of data points for us to decipher what this Syracuse offense will look like in 2024 with Brown's background being primarily defense and OC Jeff Nixon having spent the last four years as a positional coach in the NFL. Brown sought out an established signal-caller to begin his regime, landing Ohio State transfer Kyle McCord, who threw for 3,100 yards and 24 touchdowns last year. McCord's presence and experience should boost the offense as a whole, but he is unlikely to be a CFF asset given his lack of mobility. The receiver room looks promising, namely with Georgia transfer Zeed Haynes, who was deemed the offensive MVP of the spring, closing camp with six receptions and a touchdown on eight targets in the spring game. Oronde Gadsden II returns after playing just two games last season due to injury, and he retains his TE/WR designation on Fantrax, making him a potential cheat code at the position. While a defensive-minded coach, Fran Brown knows a thing or two about star tight ends after spending the last two years around Brock Bowers. The Cuse will have a 'Thunder and lightning' pairing in the backfield with returning starter LeQuint Allen and true freshman Yasin Willis, the latter of which rushed for over 100 yards in the spring game. Don't overthink Allen's CFF value as Syracuse returns four OL starters and his offensive coordinator is a former RB coach.

It wasn't reflected in the W / L column, but Virginia made modest strides in 2023, particularly on offense, as the Cavs scored almost a touchdown more per game than the year before. HC Tony Elliott mandated there's an ongoing quarterback battle between senior Tony Muskett and promising sophomore Anthony Colandrea and no decision would be made until fall camp. Colandrea was the more impressive of the two quarterbacks last year, completing 63% of his throws with 13 touchdowns, along with 227 yards rushing. While not a high-end fantasy option, Colandrea provided consistency to those who rostered him, scoring 20 or more fantasy points in six of his seven starts. There are 144 vacated targets with the graduation of CFF superstar Malik Washington, who finished last season as WR3, scoring 20 or more fantasy points in all but one game in 2023. No team in the country funneled targets to their top two receivers more than Virginia with Washington and Malachi Fields, who accounted for 66% of the total target share. There's a chance we see that replicated this season with Fields and incoming Notre Dame transfer Chris Tyree, who is expected to slide into the same slot role Washington held. That said, UVA also added several other transfers to the room, namely Trell Harris (Kent State) and Andre Greene Jr. (North Carolina), so it is not out of the question that the targets are more dispersed in 2024. Virginia was abysmal running the football last season, averaging 3.12 yards per carry as a team. We're not projecting significant improvement, but UVA does return four OL starters. Projected RB1 Kobe Pace is preparing for a "work horse" role according to his positional coach.

There may not be a team in college football headed into 2024 with more optimism and momentum than Virginia Tech. The Hokies won five of their last seven games, including a dominant victory over Tulane in the Military Bowl, and they will essentially bring back the entire starting lineup from last season. Offensively, the Hokies are No. 1 in the country in returning production, led by starting quarterback Kyron Drones, who was exceptional down the stretch with three straight 30-point fantasy performances. Two things need to happen for Drones to be a top 10 fantasy quarterback in 2024. (1) better performances against top-tier defenses. Drones struggled mightily against Florida State, Louisville, and NC State. (2) More red-zone opportunities, as RB1 Bhayshul Tuten held a 39-26 advantage in that area. Benefitting both players, assuming Drones and Tuten remain healthy this season, is the centralized rushing volume as the duo accounted for 68% of the team's carries and 75% of Virginia Tech's rushing touchdowns. Collectively, Virginia Tech boasts one of the better wide receiver units in the ACC with Da'Quan Felton, Jaylin Lane, and a healthy Ali Jennings. The problem is Virginia Tech's 104th ranked pass rate which likely won't equate to consistent fantasy production with all three in the lineup. Jennings looked like his old self in the spring game with three receptions for 45 yards in the first half. The lone departure was starting tight end Dae'Quan Wright who landed at Ole Miss, though veteran Nick Gallo has plenty of experience with 55 career receptions. TE1 for Virginia Tech has had 49 targets in each of the last two seasons.

All good things come to an end eventually, such as Wake Forest's streak of averaging 31 PPG or more dating back to 2017. The offense cratered largely because of inept quarterback play, as neither Mitch Griffis nor Michael Kern proved to be the answer replacing Sam Hartman, the school's all-time leading passer. HC Dave Clawson brought in transfer Hank Bachmeier during the offseason, now at his third school in three years, but he is seemingly a stop-gap solution, at best, with no rushing upside. If there is a true freshman quarterback in the country not named Dylan Raiola with a chance to start Week 1, our best bet is Jeremy Hecklinski who tossed three touchdowns in the spring game. If not immediately, Hecklinski is likely to see the field at some point this season with Bachmeier's injury history. 65% of last year's targets hit the transfer portal, with slot man Taylor Morin being the only returning starter. Junior wideout Donavon Greene has missed two of the last three seasons because of injury, but possesses WR1 ability, averaging nearly 19 yards per catch in his career. Juniors Horatio Fields and Walker Merrill are talented enough to fill the void left by Jahmal Banks on the outside, as they combined for 10 receptions and a touchdown in the spring game. Currently, no Wake receiver is being selected before Round 20 in CFF Drafts. Junior running back Demond Claiborne is the team's most talented offensive skill player - the problem is the system. RB1s under Clawson averaged just 29% volume share and 145 carries per season over the last decade. Just once has the RB1 averaged more than 12 FPPG, Kenneth Walker in 2020. Can Claiborne break the mold?

The Arizona administration did well in replacing Jedd Fisch by hiring former San Jose State head coach Brent Brennan, who compiled a 26-19 record during his time with the Spartans, making a bowl game in three of four seasons. Brennan, a former Arizona assistant back in 2000, hired a familiar face in former Syracuse head man Dino Babers, who was on staff that year with the Wildcats. Babers did not reveal the style of offense Arizona intends to run in 2024, but he does inherit a few building blocks in quarterback Noah Fifita and star receiver Tetairoa McMillan. The sophomore QB was sensational last season once pronounced the starter, throwing for nearly 2,800 yards and 25 touchdowns in just nine starts. Fifita's value in CFF might be capped with his lack of rushing ability – negative yardage on just 38 attempts in 2023 – but there is no doubting his abilities as a passer. Both Babers and Brennan have also shown they're willing to get the QB1 involved in the run game, ala Garrett Shrader or Chevan Cordeiro. McMillan is arguably the best wide receiver in the nation, finishing last season as WR5 with 90 receptions and 10 touchdowns on 134 targets. His 29% target share is exactly what we look for from a top-end fantasy receiver, and that number could grow with Jacob Cowing now graduated. The WR2 job is up for grabs between Montana Lemonious-Craig and redshirt freshman Malachi Riley, who caught a 50-yard TD in the spring game. Quali Conley came with Brennan from SJSU and is the clear frontrunner for the RB1, although new Mexico transfer Jacorey Croskey-Merritt was added to the roster in June.

It shouldn't come as a surprise when a team that played five different quarterbacks – one of which is a running back by trade – finished dead last in the Pac-12 in both total offense (322 YPG) and scoring (17 PPG). We could say nowhere to go but up for the Sun Devils in Year 2 under Kenny Dillingham, but the roster went through mass turnover with over 20 players hitting the portal, including projected starter QB Jaden Rashada and top wideout Elijah Badger. Former Michigan State transfer Sam Leavitt came in and won the job during spring while Rashada was nursing an injury, resulting in Rashada's departure. Leavitt, a former 4-star recruit, offers a dual-threat element to the position, which Dillingham has preferred with his prior pupils in Jordan Travis and Bo Nix. There was a stretch of four straight years from 2019-22 when the QB1 under Dillingham had at least seven rushing touchdowns. The wide receiver depth chart is littered with P4 transfers, though collectively the group is pedestrian at best. If healthy, sophomore Jordyn Tyson has the most upside, but he is still trying to come back fully from the 2022 knee injury when he tore his ACL and MCL. Do-everything running back Cameron Skattebo is back after rushing for 788 yards and nine touchdowns, catching 24 passes on 33 targets, and finishing as the team's fourth-leading passer while working out of the wildcat. The inclination is that this may be more of a shared backfield in 2024 following the additions of Alton McCaskill (Colorado) and Raleek Brown (USC). Cincinnati transfer Chamon Metayer will look to assume the 77 vacated targets at tight end with last season's top two options both transferring out.

The Bears bottomed out in 2023, finishing tied for last in the conference in scoring (23.1 PPG) en route to a 3-9 record with a five-game losing streak to end the season. Inevitably, head coach Dave Aranda made a change at OC, hiring Jake Spavital, who spent last season with California. Criticized by some, Spavital oversaw a group that dramatically improved, going from 96th in scoring in 2023 to 40th at 31.6 PPG this past year, while also coordinating the leading rusher in the Pac-12, Jaydn Ott, who averaged over 114 yards per game on the ground. Any thoughts a Baylor running back could replicate Ott's production this year were quickly squashed as RB coach Khenon Hall said to the media that he's "big on a unit where we use multiple guys. I'm an RBBC guy." Junior Richard Reese emerged from the spring as the frontrunner to start but expect a heavy rotation of sophomore Dawson Pendergrass and Dominic Richardson. De'Quan Finn transferred to Waco in the offseason after finishing as QB26 last season. The former Toledo quarterback could either be a massive steal for early drafts as QB46 or wind up a wasted selection as Finn is still locked in a quarterback battle with incumbent Sawyer Robertson. Collectively, Baylor has a solid group of receivers with returnees Monaray Baldwin and Ketron Jackson, along with Texas State transfer Ashtyn Hawkins, whom Spavital is familiar with from their time together at Texas State in 2022. No Baylor receiver is going before Round 23 according to ADP. Former 5-star recruit TE Michael Trigg is now at his third college destination and is a watch list option only. The highest a tight end has finished under Spavital is TE42.

An unusual position for BYU headed into its second year in the Big 12, coming off the school's first losing season since 2017. Why Kilani Sitake thought it was a good idea to roll with Kedon Slovis as his QB1 is unbeknownst to us, but the offense was bad as a result, finishing last in the conference in yards per game and tied for last in scoring (23.1 PPG). Addition by subtraction with Slovis not on the roster, but there is little clarity coming out of spring between incumbent Jake Retzlaff and USF transfer Gerry Bohanon for the starting job. Retzlaff completed just 50 percent of his passes after taking over for Slovis, and BYU lost all four of his starts, while Bohanon hasn't attempted a pass since 2022. Yikes! With that said, it wouldn't shock us to see the winner here become a potential waiver wire addition given both are solid running options. Sophomore LJ Martin transformed his body this offseason, adding 20 pounds to his 6-foot-2 frame in preparation for a bigger workload with Aidan Robbins out of the picture. BYU is expected to lean on the run more in 2024, and Martin should benefit from continuity on the OL with four starters returning. Every notable wide receiver is back – good for the team overall, but bad for CFF purposes, as last year's top option (Chase Roberts) finished as WR158 with just 19% target share. Only tight end Isaac Rex is gone from last year's roster, and he finished second on the team in both targets (60) and catches (34). Senior Keanu Hill becomes an intriguing option if Fantrax decides to give him tight end eligibility at any point, as he switched positions in the spring.

Was there a more perfect transfer addition in the portal this offseason than KJ Jefferson, who pairs with Gus Malzahn? We know exactly what UCF intends to do offensively – play at warp speed, utilize power play-action and RPOs, and get the quarterback on the move in the run game. Jefferson is perfectly suited for all three elements. The former Arkansas transfer is guaranteed 100+ carries in Malzahn's system, and when that has occurred in the past, the QB has flourished in CFF, averaging 23.5 FPPG in those five seasons. Our one word of caution with Jefferson is don't reach for him in drafts thinking he'll wind up a top five quarterback. The highest finish for a Malzahn quarterback was QB19 with Nick Marshall back in 2014. It's debatable if any player will see their fantasy stock fall further this offseason than RB RJ Harvey, who is a victim of circumstance, as UCF added former Toledo running back Peny Boone late in the spring window. There's no doubt Harvey was exceptional last season rushing for over 1,400 yards with a 6.3 yards per carry average, but part of what made him the RB9 in CFF was his 41% backfield market share. That is unlikely to happen with Boone potentially vulturing carries, along with Jefferson's added usage around the goal line. Upperclassmen Kobe Hudson and Xavier Townsend are solidified in starting roles at receiver after combining for 1,200 yards and 11 touchdowns a year ago. UCF hit the portal hard late in the spring to find a replacement for Javon Baker, adding Jacoby Jones (Ohio), Ja'Varrius Johnson (Auburn) and Agiye Hall (Texas). Because of UCF's run-based approach under Malzahn, there's rarely more than two viable fantasy options at receiver.

It was a rough transition for the Bearcats moving to the Big 12 with a first-year head coach in Scott Satterfield, as they finished last in the conference with a 3-9 record, losing nine of their last 10 games. Predictably, the passing game was below average with Emory Jones at quarterback, but the position should get a boost with Indiana transfer Brendan Sorsby, whose dual-threat ability fits the Satterfield mold. Sorsby rushed for 286 yards and four TDs last year with the Hoosiers. In fact, there has not been a QB1 under Satterfield in the last decade that hasn't surpassed at least 400 rushing yards in a season. Sorsby will be surrounded by a talented group of receivers, namely last season's WR1 Xavier Henderson, along with former UTEP transfer Tyrin Smith. We expect Cincinnati to surpass their 110th ranked pass rate from a year ago with Sorsby at QB, but not by an extreme amount. Satterfield's run-based offense doesn't typically supply us with many high-end options at the wide receiver position and it's likely Henderson / Smith will eat into each other's target share. Senior Corey Kiner somehow managed to become the fourth RB1 in the last 10 seasons under Satterfield to hit the 1,000-yard rushing mark, and that was behind an offensive line replacing four starters. In 2024, with what is expected to be an improved offensive unit, Kiner will run behind an OL that returns all five starters and finished 16th in line yards in 2023.

Another chaotic offseason for Colorado that included Twitter (X) spats between Coach Prime and former players, a book tour, a recorded rap song by the starting quarterback, and Travis Hunter being revealed as the cover star of the upcoming EA Sports College Football video game. Also adding to the chaos is what seemingly was a complete overhaul of the roster, taking into account the 40 incoming transfers (as of May) and 41 players from last year's roster seeking new destinations. The first priority for the Buffs was fixing the offensive line, which gave up the second-most sacks in college football last season, resulting in a back injury for quarterback Shedeur Sanders. Just two linemen from last year's group returned, but Colorado proceeded to add five transfers with FBS starting experience, along with the No. 1 OL recruit in the country. The Buffs were dead last in the Pac-12 by a considerable margin in rush yards per game (68.9) and saw their top four rushers all hit the portal. Ohio State transfer Dallan Hayden looks primed for a heavy workload, as the only depth currently behind him is a walk-on and a redshirt freshman transfer. The receiver position is fully stocked with playmakers for a team that was third nationally in pass rate at 57%. LaJohntay Wester (FAU), Will Sheppard (Vanderbilt) and Travis Hunter are widely expected to start at receiver. Will those three replicate the 57% target share of last year's starting trio or will more options emerge? Sanders finished as QB31 throwing for 3,230 yards and 27 TDs in 11 games. His upside as a CFF option is limited by being a pure pocket passer with -77 rushing yards in his career.

The Dana Holgorsen era mercifully came to a close after Houston finished 4-8 in its Big 12 debut, losing five of its last six games. In is Willie Fritz, coming over from Tulane after a historic two-year run, accumulating a 23-4 record in that span with a Cotton Bowl victory over USC in 2022. As evidenced in the last two seasons, Fritz's offenses are notorious for establishing a dominant run game, and they have produced some standout fantasy performances, including Tyjae Spears in 2022 and Makhi Hughes in 2023. If the spring game was any indication, sophomore Parker Jenkins could be next in line, as he dazzled the crowd with several impressive runs, which included a 60-yard touchdown. Patchworking the offensive line may determine his relevance with four starters gone from last year's group. Returning starting quarterback Donovan Smith missed most of the spring as he continued to recover from a torn labrum in his throwing shoulder, though he was reported to be ahead of schedule and expected to be ready for fall camp. While his inconsistencies can be maddening, Smith closed last season as QB27 with six performances of 30 fantasy points or more. He is a preferred candidate for best ball leagues over redrafts. The WR room needed some retooling as three of the top five receivers hit the portal, leaving just one returning starter, Joseph Manjack IV. Fritz backfilled the position with a pair of transfers from Tulsa within a few days of each other, Devan Williams and Marquis Shoulders. 6-foot-6 Michigan State transfer Maliq Carr had a breakout season in 2023 with 30 receptions and three touchdowns and is expected to step right into a starting role.

The Cyclones enter 2024 with the most returning production of any team in college football, including 10 of 11 starters on offense, having only to replace a nominal third wideout. Now in his ninth season coaching Iowa State, Matt Campbell will have a new offensive coordinator for the third straight year, elevating tight ends coach Taylor Mouser. Balance has been the calling card of Campbell's offense, and last year was no different with a near 50-50 pass-to-run ratio. It's fair to say we know what to anticipate from this passing game with starting quarterback Rocco Becht having a full season under his belt with two experienced wideouts, Jayden Higgins and Jaylin Noel. Despite finishing ahead of Higgins in season-long standings, Noel has been drafted on average five rounds later than his counterpart in early CFF drafts. The strong close to 2023 likely being the primary reason, as Higgins was the best player on the field vs. Memphis in the bowl game, posting 214 yards and a touchdown on 13 targets. In seven of the last nine seasons, Matt Campbell's WR1 has played on the boundary, which is where Higgins lines up. Sophomore tight end Benjamin Brahmer was the third option with 28 receptions and two touchdowns, though he struggled mightily with drops (5), resulting in a 47% catch rate. There is potentially a wide range of outcomes when it comes to sophomore running back Abu Sama III, which was evident at the end of last season. His 48-point performance against Kansas State in the season finale was followed by 14 yards on 12 carries in the bowl game. Despite returning all five offensive linemen, it's a group that continues to underwhelm, as they finished 132nd in line yards last year.

The offensive core returns mostly intact for the Jayhawks entering 2024, though the biggest change will be on the coaching staff, as Lance Leipold's longtime confidant Andy Kotelnicki took the coordinator job at Penn State. In is former Baylor OC Jeff Grimes, whose impact may be minimal with Leipold overseeing the offense. Quotes from the KU players in the offseason suggest Leipold is "inventing a new offense" and that it's been "unique." The talk of the spring was the availability of starting quarterback Jalon Daniels, who missed most of last season with a cryptic back injury that limited him to just three games. When healthy, Daniels can be a borderline QB1 option in CFF, and he will benefit by having all three starting receivers back in 2024 (Lawrence Arnold, Luke Grimm, and Quentin Skinner). The hesitancy is his back injury, as Daniels did not partake in padded practices in the spring. If healthy, the passing game will be strong collectively, but there doesn't seem to be a receiver with standout fantasy appeal. Arnold posted the best statistical season from a KU wideout in the last three seasons, yet the result was only a WR95 finish. Senior running back Devin Neal bypassed the NFL Draft to return for his senior season in Lawrence after finishing last season as RB11 with 1,200 yards and 16 rushing TDs. Neal's consistency last year was unmatched, as he scored 20 or more fantasy points in nine games – the most of any running back in CFF. The offensive line does lose three starters, including two NFL Draft picks, from a group that finished ninth in line yards.

All Chris Klieman does is win and produce high-end CFF players. The Wildcats are 39-24 in the last five seasons with Klieman at the helm, with five different players finishing inside the top 20 rankings at their respective positions. The offense is centered around the running game and it will be once again in 2024, especially with a standout like junior DJ Giddens, who rushed for 1,200 yards and 13 total touchdowns last year without having assumed a full-time starting role until Week 4. Giddens’ utilization in the passing game is what sets him apart from others, as he totaled 29 receptions on 41 targets. Klieman did add to the room this spring, signing electric sophomore Dylan Edwards from Colorado. How might Edwards presence impact Giddens? The system generally leans on its RB1, a position which has averaged 218 attempts per season over the last decade. The lone concern for Giddens is along the offensive line, where four starters depart, but this staff has proven it can repeatedly withstand roster turnover. Klieman is handing the keys to sophomore quarterback Avery Johnson, who is a dual threat in every sense of the term. This staff is not shy about incorporating the QBs into the run game, with six seasons of 100+ rushing attempts in the last 10 years. There was talk from new OC Matt Wells about limiting Johnson’s legs to keep him healthy for the season, which might explain why the Wildcats added UConn transfer Ta’Quan Roberson. Because this scheme is run-based, the wide receivers are rarely impactful in CFF, though this is a strong starting trio with Jayce Brown, Keagan Johnson, and Penn State transfer Dante Cephas. Tight end Garrett Oakley will look to assume the vacated 75 targets with Ben Sinnott having graduated.

2024 Outlook

For being a P4 school, Oklahoma State coverage is tough to come by, and we did not get a glimpse of the team’s spring game for a second-straight season because of construction inside Boone Pickens Stadium. Luckily for us, not much guess work is needed when it comes to the Cowboys, as they return 90% of their offensive production, having only to replace last year’s WR3. Kudos to Mike Gundy for transforming a former fifth-string quarterback at Michigan into an adequate starter in the Big 12, as Alan Bowman threw for 3,400 yards and 15 touchdowns. There is limited fantasy upside in Bowman as a non-runner, but he offers enough to give him spot-start consideration, as he scored 20 or more fantasy points in six of nine starts. Also back are Bowman’s two leading target-getters, Brennan Presley and Rashod Owens, who combined for 164 receptions and 11 of the team’s 18 receiving touchdowns. As a slot receiver, Presley has broken the mold the last two years, as Gundy’s WR1 has historically played on the boundary. Presley’s WR21 finish in 2023 may be the ceiling, though, if he continues to average just 9.8 YPC. Former Washington State transfer De’Zhaun Stribling had his season cut short due to a hand injury, but he should return as the WR3. Stribling averaged almost seven targets per game through the first four weeks. With five offensive linemen returning, there’s no reason to expect a drop-off from Ollie Gordon, who finished as RB1 in CFF last season, despite not starting the first three weeks. His stretch from Week’s 7-13 are almost unheard of in college fantasy, finishing as the No. 1 running back four times in that span with five 40+ point performances.

Now two years removed from a National Title appearance, the challenge for head coach Sonny Dykes is getting the Horned Frogs back to bowl eligibility after a disappointing 5-7 record last season. Naturally, a group losing 75% of its offensive production from the year prior took a step back, as TCU averaged almost a touchdown less per game than it did in 2022. The roster upheaval is not as severe entering this season, but there are several key positions with question marks. Projected QB1 Josh Hoover missed all of spring nursing an injury, but the sophomore is cleared to return in the summer. While enigmatic at times, Hoover brought a jolt to the TCU passing game, as he passed for 300+ yards in five of his final six starts, averaging 33.6 FPPG in that span. The wide receiver room remains largely intact, sans Jaylon Robinson who graduated, and they added talented transfer Eric McAlister, who averaged 18 yards per catch last season with Boise State. The targets were spread out evenly amongst six different receivers with WR1 Savion Williams getting just 13% target share. Most spring reports did not suggest an alpha amongst the group, so an early lean is towards a committee approach again in 2024. Running back Cam Cook was the star of the spring, garnering almost all the first-team reps ahead of Trey Sanders. The 195-pound redshirt freshman reportedly broke off multiple 60+ yard runs in the practices. Expecting Cook to replicate the production of a Kendre Miller or Emani Bailey is overly optimistic, considering TCU is having to replace all five starters on the offensive line, but he seems worth the investment with a spring ADP around RB89.

If you simply looked at statistics on a spreadsheet and did not know with what team or coaches they were associated, you would have never guessed Zach Kittley was calling plays for Texas Tech last season. The 49.8% pass rate is the lowest ever, by a substantial margin, for a Kittley-led offense. Kittley almost exclusively has had an RBBC in six seasons calling plays, yet his RB1 Tahj Brooks wound up leading the entire country in rushing attempts with 61.6% of the team's volume share. And for the second straight season, there was not a single fantasy-relevant option at the receiver position, as Myles Price finished WR199. The assumption at the onset of spring ball was that Kittley would revert closer to his pass-happy ways in 2024. That was before Tech shut down QB1 Behren Morton halfway through the spring with an ambiguous message released by the team's official account on social media. The lack of clarity regarding Morton's status for the regular season puts a damper on the passing game components, which were boosted by transfers Josh Kelly (Washington State), Caleb Douglas (Florida) and tight end Jalin Conyers (Arizona State). Kelly spent much of spring in the coveted slot position in a standard Kittley offense that has (had) college fantasy WR1 upside, seen previously with Jerreth Sterns at Western Kentucky. Sophomore Coy Eakin, who will start outside as the WR2, had a strong rapport with Morton late in the year with 26 of his 36 receptions coming in the final five games. As for Brooks, last year's RB21, his volume is sure to come down simply because 22 carries a game in back-to-back years in this system seems highly unlikely.

Injuries took a toll on the Utah offense last year, as they posted the lowest scoring output (23.2 PPG) of the Kyle Whittingham era dating back to 2005. The signs were there, too, when all summer long we had zero transparency about quarterback Cam Rising and star tight end Brant Kuithe's availability for the season. Add in a hobbled RB1 for much of the season and you get an offense that ranked 94th in yards per game and 96th in scoring. Both Rising and Kuithe returned for spring practices and are expected to be ready for the regular season, with early reports suggesting more balance between the run and pass. When healthy, Rising is a rotational option at the QB position in CFF, as he averaged 25.5 FPPG in 2022. Kuithe was off to a blazing start that year with 30 targets in four games before his season-ending injury. There isn't a coach in college football that has produced more top 10 fantasy tight ends in the last six seasons than OC Andy Ludwig. A healthy Brant Kuithe has legitimate TE1 upside. Former USC transfer Dorian Singer was one of the biggest busts in college fantasy a year ago, but he received rave reviews in the spring and is solidified as the team's WR1. Singer posted 92 yards on five receptions in the spring game. How often has it been said that the Utah RB1 is a complete mystery? Veteran Micah Bernard will compete with Jaylon Glover for the starting job, though this looks to be a committee in 2024, barring a late transfer add.

2024 Outlook

2023 was a job-saving season from head coach Neal Brown, who led the Mountaineers to a 9-4 record and a dominant bowl victory over North Carolina. Brown rightfully transformed the offense into a run-heavy system behind an offensive line returning all five starters, as West Virginia finished fifth in the country in rush rate and 29th in rush success rate. Handing the keys to Garrett Greene full time and letting him scramble around was a winning formula, as he finished as QB19 in CFF with 3,100 yards of total offense and 29 touchdowns in just 11 games played. For Greene, there is room to improve, especially as a passer, as he finished last in the Big 12 in completion percentage. The wide receiver room is expected to be a strength, led by talented sophomores Traylon Ray and Hudson Clement, along with Oklahoma State transfer Jaden Bray. The 6-foot-3 Ray emerged as the team's top target in the spring and closed last season on a high note with 91 yards and a touchdown in the bowl game. The receivers should only garner late-round consideration in CFF drafts, playing in a system that threw the ball just 37% of the time in 2023. Tight end Kole Taylor was the de facto WR1 for West Virginia, leading the team in targets (60), receptions (35) and touchdowns (4), while lining up in the slot 38% of the time. Jahiem White and CJ Donaldson both return to lead the running back room, but is there a true RB1 here? Early CFF drafters think so with a 15-round disparity in ADP favoring White. Not surprising considering White was the second-highest rated running back in the Big 12 according to Pro Football Focus, averaging 7.7 yards per carry and a 55% breakaway rate.

2024 Outlook

After an eight-win season in 2022, the Illini fell to a familiar spot within the Big Ten, back to obscurity as they failed to reach a bowl game with a 5-7 record. Offensively, Illinois was mediocre, finishing middle of the pack in scoring (24.5 PPG) with slight increases in both yards per game and success rate through the air (24th). Veteran Luke Altmyer played well in nine starts, completing 65% of his throws with 13 touchdowns, along with 282 yards and three scores on the ground. The former Ole Miss transfer is a late-round option in deeper formats, as he scored 20 or more fantasy points in six of nine weeks. The biggest uncertainty is how the passing game functions without star wideout Isaiah Williams, who posted back-to-back 100-target seasons. Veteran Pat Bryant is expected to assume a hefty chunk of those vacated targets, finishing with 45 catches and seven touchdowns a year ago. If there's a secondary option that could emerge, sophomore Malik Elzy had 85 yards on 10 targets in the spring game. OC Barry Lunney has now had a 100-target receiver in three of his four years as a play-caller and might've had a fourth had Zakhari Franklin played the entire season back in 2020. Ironically, Franklin announced in mid-June that he is transferring from Ole Miss to Illinois, so it will be interesting to see how the receiving 2-deep shakes out in preseason camp. We did not get a clear picture of how the backfield might shake out as promising sophomore Kaden Feagin was unavailable for much of spring camp recovering from his season-ending injury. When healthy, the coaching staff was not shy about leaning on the 250-pounder, with games of 19, 24, and 22 carries in his three starts. Expectations are that Feagin should be fully healthy by fall camp, and we know this staff will feed a workhorse if they have one.

2024 Outlook

The Indiana Hoosiers will be James Madison North in 2024 under new head coach Curt Cignetti, bringing seven assistants with him from his previous job, along with 29 incoming transfers, many of which are former JMU players. Cignetti is developing a reputation as a QB whisperer if the last three years are any indication, transforming journeymen like Todd Centeio and Jordan McCloud into elite fantasy quarterbacks. His new understudy for this season will be Ohio transfer Kurtis Rourke, who should be a late-round option given the recent successes of Cignetti's quarterbacks. The RB room is made up entirely of transfers with Kaelon Black (JMU), Ty'Son Lawton (JMU), Justice Ellison (Wake Forest) and Elijah Green (North Carolina). If the spring game was any indication, this is a room to avoid as the reps were split almost evenly between the quartet. Much like the quarterbacks, Cignetti's offense has produced some high-end CFF wide receivers with the WR1 surpassing 1,000 yards in four of the last five seasons. Elijah Sarratt was the latest to hit that mark, with 82 receptions on 101 targets in 2023, and likely assumes the WR1 mantle this year given his knowledge of the system. Indiana's leading returnee, Donaven McCulley, flirted with the transfer portal during the offseason and received some criticism from coaches in the spring. Myles Price (Texas Tech), Miles Cross (Ohio) and Ke'Shawn Williams (Wake Forest) will factor into the mix. Tight end Zach Horton also joined Cignetti from JMU, finishing as TE38 last season with six receiving touchdowns. Assuming all the new pieces gel together, Indiana has a chance to start fast with a non-conference slate featuring FIU, Western Illinois, and Charlotte in the first four weeks.

With an opportunity to make a splash hire, and finally transform the Iowa offense to fit modern day college football, Kirk Ferentz hired a coach whose offense averaged just 19 PPG the last time he called plays. Probably an unfair criticism of new OC Tim Lester, but can we really expect an offensive overhaul if the elder Ferentz is still around? Good news is it can't get worse than last season, averaging just 234.6 yards per game, which was dead last in the entire country. The issue is that the personnel largely remains the same on offense, with eight starters back from last year's paltry unit, and their big ticket transfer portal addition was a backup receiver from Northwestern. Anything is better than last season's results, but we're again not investing any significant CFF draft capital on the Hawkeyes. QB Cade McNamara will return from injury as the QB1, but he is nothing more than a game manager. Running back should be a strength with Leshon Williams and Kaleb Johnson returning, along with spring standout Kamari Moulton. The hope is that one emerges from the pack as Lester's RB1, because his RB1 at Western Michigan rushed for over 1,000 yards in five of six seasons. Iowa's offensive line returns largely intact with four starters, though the unit underperformed again last season. Tight end usage for Iowa is never going to change regardless of the play caller, so Luke Lachey remains a top 5-10 option at the position. He was excellent prior to the season-ending injury with 15 targets in the first two games. Receiver Kaleb Brown isn't a draftable CFF option, but he was Iowa's best pass-catcher late in the year with 21 receptions in the final five games.

For the first time since 2019, the Terps will not have Taulia Tagovailoa under center, as he departed the school's all-time leading passer in both yards and touchdowns. Notable coming out of the spring were several indications that Maryland might run more than in years past. First and foremost, the quarterback position is far from being settled in the competition between Billy Edwards Jr. and NC State transfer Mike Morris. Neither player distinguished themselves in camp or the spring game. All jokes aside, Locksley's hiring of Brian Ferentz is also notable in that the head coach stated he's leaning on the former Iowa offensive coordinator to help "invigorate" the rushing offense. While the Terps are undergoing reconstruction on the offensive line with zero returning starters, the strength of the offense resides in the backfield with two-year starter Roman Hemby and redshirt freshman Nolan Ray. Hemby's ability in the passing game is among the best in college football, with 71 receptions and four touchdowns in the last two seasons. Ray, the top-rated running back out of the state of Michigan in 2023, ran for 96 yards on just nine carries in the spring game, with Locksley calling him a "big-play threat" and a "guy that people take notice of this year." Locksley has always favored a committee approach in the backfield, so don't overspend on Hemby, as Locksley has never had a 200-carry running back in his career. The receiver room is in good shape with Kaden Prather and Tai Felton returning, as they combined for 11 touchdowns a year ago. Maryland has had a top 25 fantasy tight end in each of the last three seasons, so sophomore Preston Howard is a watchlist candidate.

The reigning national champions will look entirely different in 2024 as the Wolverines are 132nd in returning offensive production with just one starter back (Colston Loveland) from last year's undefeated squad. A step backwards is expected with the roster turnover, but don't anticipate much of a philosophical change on offense with Michigan promoting former offensive coordinator Sherrone Moore to head coach. Moore has already adopted the catchphrase 'SMASH', which should make it crystal clear the identity he intends for the Wolverines. Michigan was 13th nationally in offensive rush rate in 2023 and the strength of the roster still resides in the backfield, as senior Donovan Edwards returns, and he will be joined by Kalel Mullings, along with underclassmen Benjamin Hall and Jordan Marshall. After a disappointing junior season where he was rarely 100 percent healthy, Edwards appeared rejuvenated this spring, gaining 14 pounds this offseason to prepare his frame for a bigger workload. Will Edwards see the 46% volume share that Blake Corum had in 2023? The quarterback competition is down to three following the spring competition between junior Alex Orji, senior journeyman Jack Tuttle and walk-on Davis Warren. Orji's athletic traits give him the slight edge heading into the summer. Wide receivers are rarely fantasy relevant in this run-oriented system, and the Wolverines are in dire need of depth beyond Semaj Morgan and Tyler Morris. Roman Wilson had the best statistical season from a Wolverine WR in the last six seasons and still finished outside the top 50 at his respective position in CFF.

Jonathan Smith will succeed at Michigan State eventually, but this is arguably the worst roster in the Big Ten headed into 2024. Offensively, the Spartans are essentially starting from scratch, with zero returning starters on the line, just 39% of the receiving production back, and they will have a first year starting quarterback. The good news is sophomore quarterback Aidan Chiles is immensely talented, and he displayed glimpses of his potential in limited time last season, completing 69% of his throws for 309 yards and seven total touchdowns. This is also a quarterback that rushed for over 1,300 yards during his high school career, though this system does not typically design a ton of rushing packages for QB. The receiver room is a complete unknown outside of returning starter Montorie Foster. Incoming freshman Nick Marsh has a chance to start immediately if the spring game is any indication, as he caught three passes for 105 yards. Smith did not have a receiver finish inside the top 70 at the position in CFF in any of the last four years, and we don't foresee that streak ending in 2024. Tight end Jack Velling joined Smith in East Lansing after finishing as TE17 last year with 29 receptions and eight touchdowns. It would not surprise us if Velling is Michigan State's leading target-man by season's end. Running backs are the featured position in Smith's offense, with the RB1 averaging around 18 FPPG and 192 rushing attempts per season over the last decade. Last year's starter Nate Carter was widely assumed to be the clear RB1 until MSU added Kay/Ron Lynch-Adams late in the portal window. The Spartans desperately were in search of depth but did not think they'd add a 1,100 yard back into the mix.

There may not be a more intriguing storyline to monitor than the running back room for Minnesota, which has been a source of CFF brilliance at times under head coach P.J. Fleck. The Gophers have a budding superstar in sophomore Darius Taylor, who shined in five starts as a freshman, rushing for 799 yards and five touchdowns, averaging 27 carries per game. Then injuries set in, and Taylor missed the entire month of November. Furthermore, Taylor did not finish camp healthy, either. As a result, Fleck and staff strengthened the depth in the offseason, adding three transfers in Sieh Bangura (Ohio), Marcus Major (Oklahoma) and Jaren Mangham (Michigan State), along with the return of RB5 Jordan Nubin, who had a 200-yard rushing performance in 2023. We know what Minnesota is going to do offensively, as they've finished in the top 15 nationally in rush rate in each of the last three seasons and return four starters along the offensive line. How will the carries be distributed amongst 3-4 realistic backfield options, and will the coaching staff take extra precautions to keep Taylor healthy? If unleashed, Taylor has RB1 and 300+ rushing attempts upside. WR1 Daniel Jackson returns after posting 107 targets and 50 percent of the team's receiving touchdowns (8). His 37.8% target share from last season is the highest from a Fleck receiver in over a decade. Expect former Charlotte transfer Elijah Spencer to have a bigger role with Corey Crooms and Brevyn Spann-Ford now graduated. Minnesota upgraded the QB position, bringing in grad transfer Max Brosmer from New Hampshire, but the Gophers won't throw the ball enough for him to be impactful in CFF.

Year 1 of the Matt Ruhl era was close to being a resounding success had it not been for a four-game losing streak to end the year, three of which were by three points or less. That hasn't swayed the optimism heading into 2024 with a roster largely intact from a year ago, ranking 20th nationally in returning production and the Huskers have the 18th ranked recruiting class, headlined by quarterback Dylan Raiola. In the spring game, the 5-star did not disappoint, completing 16-of-22 passes for 239 yards and two touchdowns, hitting passes on all levels of the field. We're tempering expectations from a fantasy perspective, though, as Raiola is a prototypical pocket passer that had -41 rushing yards during his high school career. His arrival boosts the Nebraska offense as a whole, but he is not a selectable CFF prospect in redrafts. The Huskers' 128th ranked pass rate will undoubtedly rise with Raiola under center, along with a rebuilt wide receiver room that features a mix of transfers and impact underclassmen. Jahmal Banks (Wake Forest) was a stabilizing veteran in the spring and will likely be joined in the starting lineup by deep threat Isaiah Neyor (Texas). Sophomore Jaylen Lloyd is a game-breaker, averaging almost 40 yards a catch (six receptions) as a freshman, and he had a 64-yard touchdown from Raiola in the spring game. Incoming freshman Jacory Barney Jr. might've generated the most buzz of any wideout with 163 all-purpose yards in the spring game. This group is vastly improved, combined with the return of tight end Thomas Fidone, who led Nebraska with four TDs last season. Expect the running back room to be a committee with returnees Gabe Ervin Jr. and Emmett Johnson, along with Oregon transfer Dante Dowdell.

There may not have been a better feel-good story last season than David Braun, who resurrected Northwestern from a potentially disastrous situation following the Pat Fitzgerald debacle to lead the Wildcats to eight wins and a bowl victory. Now the full-time head coach, Braun overhauled the coaching staff, bringing in Zach Lujan, who spent the last three seasons as South Dakota State's offensive coordinator and QBs coach. Most notable when looking at Lujan's resume is his preference to keep the ball on the ground, as the Jackrabbits ran it around 60% of the time between 2021-23. That run rate includes the quarterback position, as his starter the last two years, Mark Gronowski, had 20 rushing touchdowns and over 200 attempts. It makes sense now that Northwestern added Vanderbilt transfer Mike Wright, who should step right into the QB1 job, as Lujan's clear preference at the position is a mobile option. Wright has 1,229 rushing yards in 38 career appearances. The backfield is mostly intact with the return of last season's top two rushers, Cam Porter and Joseph Himon II. The advanced stats for Porter will not paint a pretty picture, as he averaged just 3.92 yards per carry and had a 17.3% breakaway rate. That said, the RB1 production under Lujan is as good as it gets, with five 1,000-yard rushers in the last six years, with over 230 rushing attempts in each of the last three. Northwestern also gets back four starters along the offensive line, although they graded out as one of the worst units in the Big Ten last year. A.J. Henning and Bryce Kirtz combined for 94 receptions and nine touchdowns in 2023, but this is expected to be a low volume passing offense.

Looking from afar, it appears as though Ohio State is emulating Michigan's National Championship-winning approach, by constructing the offense around a dominant running game. The pieces are certainly in place for this to be the best rushing attack in the country, now led by offensive coordinator Chip Kelly, who left his perch at UCLA to call plays for the Buckeyes. The Ohio State collectives also backed up the Brinks trucks to add a highly sought-after transfer, Quinshon Judkins, who will team up with TreVeyon Henderson to form the top RB tandem in the country. What is unknown is how the backfield split will shake out between the two. Will one emerge as the team's top option, or do we see a 50-50 volume share ala UCLA last season with TJ Harden and Carson Steele? While the competition remains open following the spring, it's difficult to see a scenario where the Buckeyes don't roll with Will Howard as QB1 given his starting experience and fit within Kelly's offense as a dual threat. And when Ohio State has had a dual threat in the past - Justin Fields / JT Barrett - a top 20 fantasy ranking at the position is usually what ensues. Kelly's QB1 for UCLA hit at least 100 rushing attempts in three of the last five years. Emeka Egbuka should assume the WR1 mantle, but the battle for WR2 is up for grabs between sophomore Carnell Tate and incoming 5-star Jeremiah Smith. Our question is...does the WR2 even matter with Chip Kelly as OC? In six seasons with UCLA, the WR2 for the Bruins did not finish within the top 100 at the position. Smith is a first-round pick in dynasty drafts, but likely offers little in any other CFF format.

There's been no shortage of offense in Eugene since Dan Lanning assumed the head coaching job, as the Ducks have ranked 9th and 2nd, respectively, in scoring the previous two seasons. From a talent standpoint, this should once again be one of the best offenses in college football, ranking 45th in offensive returning production and No. 1 in offensive SP+. Oklahoma transfer Dillon Gabriel is a consensus top 5 CFF quarterback as he enters into a system directed by OC Will Stein, one that has produced consecutive top 4 fantasy quarterbacks, Frank Harris (UTSA) and Bo Nix, both of whom combined for 92 total touchdowns over the last two seasons. There's little reason to think that trend won't continue with returnee Tez Johnson and Texas A&M transfer Evan Stewart at receiver. The debate is which Oregon receiver should be given higher priority in drafts? If sticking to system trends, the WR1 under Stein has primarily played on the boundary (Stewart). Johnson is the proven commodity with 86 receptions and 10 touchdowns on 106 targets in 2023. Both players should be drafted within the top two rounds of CFF drafts this offseason. Junior Jordan James steps into the coveted RB1 role after rushing for 11 touchdowns as the secondary option behind Mar'Keise Irving. Our greatest concern with the Ducks for CFF purposes is the move to the Big Ten where they'll face stingier defenses, as the schedule includes a home bout with Ohio State and trips to Michigan and Wisconsin in the month of November.

The Nittany Lions failed to meet expectations last season in large part due to an offense that crumbled when the moment was too big. Despite leading the conference in scoring (36 PPG), Penn State averaged just 17.3 PPG in its three losses to Ohio State, Michigan, and in the bowl game to Mississippi. James Franklin made a change at offensive coordinator, hiring away Andy Kotelnicki from Kansas, who is expected to diversify the offense and not be as rigid as his predecessor, as it relates to meshing personnel with scheme. As we saw with the Jayhawks, expect Kotelnicki to lean on the ground game with returning co-starters Nick Singleton and Kaytron Allen, who combined for 1,600 yards and 14 touchdowns in 2023. Just one rushing attempt separated the two, but Singleton's improved utilization in the passing game was the difference, as he finished with an impressive 26 receptions on 30 targets. Expectation remains that this will be close to a 50-50 split again in 2024, though Kotelnicki's 11th ranked rush rate last season was significantly higher than Penn State. More volume = more fantasy production? The positives outweighed the negatives with QB Drew Allar in his first year as a starter, as he finished the year with a 25-to-2 touchdown to interception ratio, finishing as QB37 in CFF, but he collapsed when the moment was too big. Kotelnicki has not been shy about incorporating his quarterbacks into the running game, and Allar displayed surprising athleticism with 210 rushing yards and four TDs. Senior tight end Tyler Warren could be primed for a monster year, finishing as TE21 with seven receiving touchdowns a year ago, all while splitting time with Theo Johnson who is now in the NFL.

It was the defense that let Purdue down in 2023 under first-year head coach Ryan Walters, as the Boilermakers finished last in the league in scoring and 12th in yards allowed. Offensively, Purdue was middle of the pack within the Big Ten and with many of the core pieces returning, there should be some optimism in West Lafayette. QB Hudson Card was adequate in his first year as a starter, finishing as QB70 with nearly 2,600 yards of total offense and 20 TDs. The former Texas transfer was lights out in his final two starts, scoring 80 fantasy points combined vs. Minnesota and Indiana. That momentum carried into the spring game, as he completed 11-of-17 passes for 160 yards and a touchdown. He’ll benefit from an offensive line that returns around 60 percent (3.5 starters) of the snaps played from 2023. What will make or break the offense is finding playmakers at the wide receiver position, as five of last season’s top six pass catchers are gone, including All-Big Ten performer Deion Burks. Former Florida Atlantic transfer Jahmal Edrine missed all of 2023 and was unavailable for much of the spring but he is expected to be “one of the go-to receivers.” Sophomore tight end Max Klare excelled in five games played before a season-ending injury, averaging five targets per game with an 88% catch rate. Offensive coordinator Graham Harrell, known primarily for employing the Air Raid offense, ran the football 55% of the time in 2023, the highest mark in any of his eight seasons calling plays. Don’t be surprised if that continues this year with returning starter Devin Mockobee and Illinois transfer Reggie Love in the backfield.

CFF players were keen to draft the RB1 for Rutgers last offseason given the successes of the position under offensive coordinator Kirk Ciarrocca, averaging 225 carries and 1,100 yards per season over the last decade. The problem is we chose the incorrect option. Samuel Brown, the projected starter by most, was never fully healthy last summer and we should’ve seen the signs. Brown’s pain was Kyle Monangai’s gain, leading to a breakout season with 1,262 yards and eight touchdowns on 47% of the backfield market share. At this point, there is no reason to think Monangai doesn’t get a similar workload with Ciarrocca’s track record as a play-caller, though it should be noted the depth Rutgers boasts at the position with Brown, sophomore Ja’shon Benjamin, and two highly touted freshmen in Gabe Winowich and Edd Guerrier, who showed out in the spring game. Adding to Monangai’s intrigue in CFF is the schedule, as there are zero roadblocks with Rutgers avoiding Ohio State, Oregon, Michigan, and Penn State. There is no reason to do a deep dive into the Rutgers passing game from a fantasy viewpoint, though it was mildly surprising that Minnesota transfer Athan Kaliakmanis forced Gavin Wimsatt into the transfer portal following spring. Hope abounds that the ‘Greek Rifle’ can uplift this passing attack to a respectable level. If that happens, maybe someone like leading returner Christian Dremel or sophomore Ian Strong can become a potential fantasy option. Dremel’s 23.1% target share is in line with what Bo Melton received in 2020 when he averaged 18 FPPG, so there is a chance.

UCLA fans sure aren't acting like a salty ex after Chip Kelly left for Ohio State. Not with the way new head coach DeShaun Foster has reinvigorated the program with his enthusiasm for recruiting and willingness to attack the portal, adding 18 transfers since his hire. The additions in the portal resulted in a considerable jump in ESPN's post-spring SP+ rankings, moving up from 37th in February to No. 26. Both Foster and new offensive coordinator Eric Bienemy are cut from the same cloth as former running back coaches, so the initial sense is a heavy dosage of RB1 TJ Harden, who 'should' have the position all to himself after sharing carries with Carson Steele. Keegan Jones, a wide receiver by trade, moved to running back in the offseason to provide depth behind Harden, but was apparently impressive enough to garner plenty of first-team reps in the spring. Do we have another committee brewing? Junior Ethan Garbers will start at quarterback after his strong stretch of performances in the second half of last season, including the bowl game against Boise State, when he replaced an injured Collin Schlee to throw for 152 yards and two touchdowns, garnering MVP honors. In three of five starts, Garbers did score at least 22 fantasy points, yet he is going unselected in CFF drafts. From the surface, wide receiver appears to be a strength with returning starters Logan Loya and J. Michael Sturdivant, along with Notre Dame transfer Rico Flores Jr., who was impressive as a freshman with 392 yards on 27 receptions. The Bruins should pass a bit more under Bienemy, but no UCLA receiver finished inside the top 100 at the position last year.

It's been a while since we've had mild uncertainty from the quarterback position under HC Lincoln Riley. Bowl game MVP Miller Moss remains the odds-on favorite to start at quarterback, but his spring game performance was uninspiring, as he tossed a pair of interceptions. Riley assured Moss that he wouldn't bring in a veteran transfer to compete with him for the job, but the Trojans did add former UNLV quarterback Jayden Maiava, who threw for 3,085 yards as a true freshman. His abilities as a runner could make for an interesting competition, as Riley's QB1s have typically been mobile. As far as high ceiling / low floor CFF prospects in 2024, Miller Moss tops the list, and we'll be paying very close attention to this situation in fall camp. Plug-n-play at running back with Riley adding Mississippi State transfer Woody Marks. The RB1 in this system has averaged at least 15 FPPG in each of the last four seasons. As for the WR1 under Riley, it has not accounted for more than a 17% target share in the last four seasons. Even previous Biletnikoff Award winner Jordan Addison was going to fall short of 100 targets in 2022 had he been healthy the entire year. Given that stat, CFF owners might want to wait until after Round 15 and spend less draft capital on a receiver not named Zachariah Branch who has the highest ADP of the bunch. Sophomore Ja'Kobi Lane and Makai Lemon, both of whom scored touchdowns in the bowl game against Louisville, are being drafted on average 13 rounds after Branch, who failed to make an impact in that same contest.

This year's Washington team feels a lot like TCU of 2023. Coming off a National Championship loss, the Huskies will have an entirely new roster that is 125th in returning production and a new head coach in Jedd Fisch, who takes over after Kalen DeBoer left for Alabama. From a skill position lense, Fisch did well in bolstering the talent, adding QB Will Rogers (Miss St.), RB Jonah Coleman (Arizona), and WR Jeremiah Hunter (California), all of whom will step into immediate starting roles. Despite being a marginal CFF option, Rogers will provide Washington with an experienced signal-caller, having 40 starts under his belt. Fisch's offenses at Arizona threw the ball around 54% of the time, which should mesh with Rogers, who played primarily in the Air Raid system at Mississippi State. Coleman is a talented running back who already knows the scheme after rushing for 871 yards and five touchdowns on 128 attempts with the Wildcats. Coleman is also adept in the passing game with 25 receptions on 31 targets. The issue for both Coleman and Rogers is this could be the worst offensive line among all P4 teams with zero returning starters from the group that won the Joe Moore award in 2023. Washington added transfers from San Diego State and Portland State to fill in gaps, but the inexperience of the group during spring camp was evident. The frontline receivers are the undoubted strength of the offense with veteran Jeremiah Hunter and redshirt freshman Denzel Boston, who was arguably Washington's best player during spring ball. Fisch had a 100-target receiver in each of his three seasons with Arizona, including 2021 with Stanley Berryhill III, who was catching passes from Will Plummer (who?).

2024 Outlook

As expected, the differences were apparent between the Wisconsin offenses of old and the new "Dairy Raid" system under OC Phil Longo. The Badgers finished 20th nationally in pace, running 71 plays per game, and they threw the football at a 51% clip, an 11% jump from the past decade of Wisconsin football. The prevailing thought is that the offense should be better in Year 2 under Longo with a ton of returning experience. Miami transfer Tyler Van Dyke should stabilize the quarterback position, and he was excellent in the spring game, leading three touchdown drives. As a non-factor in the running game, TVD should primarily be selected late and only prioritized in 6-point passing TD leagues. The 18-round difference in ADP between running backs Chez Mellusi and Oklahoma transfer Tawee Walker is fascinating given that Longo has primarily deployed a committee approach in the backfield. Mellusi was effective through the first five weeks of 2023, averaging six yards per carry on 51 attempts before injuries set him back for the third straight season. Mellusi made it through spring healthy, but should he be sidelined for a fourth year in a row, Walker is a tremendous late-round value that should be involved heavily in the offense regardless. Will Pauling continued the long-standing tradition of slot receivers thriving under Longo, with 73 receptions and six touchdowns on 109 targets. The debate is how high should Pauling be selected, as his numbers translated into a WR55 finish a year ago, scoring 20 or more fantasy points in just one game. Redshirt freshman Trech Kekahuna, also a slot receiver, is a savvy dynasty stash as he was the second-best receiver in the spring.

Through four weeks it appeared as though head coach Mike MacIntyre had FIU on the path towards bowl eligibility with a 3-1 start. The Panthers proceeded to lose seven of their next eight games with the lone win coming in double-overtime against winless Sam Houston State. The offense deserved much of the blame for the downfall under coordinator David Yost, ranking 113th in yards per game, 117th in points per game, 124th in turnover margin, and 116th in offensive EPA per play. Entering 2024, the hope is that continuity generates better results as FIU is 34th in returning offensive production, starting with sophomore quarterback Keyone Jenkins. QB84 and a FPPG average of just 17.7 for the entirety of the season doesn't jump off the page, but Jenkins did score 20 or more fantasy points in over half his starts. The problem was his lows were.... LOW. Consider him a Best Ball candidate only. FIU's top two rushers from last season – Shomari Lawrence and Kejon Owens – both return along with 2022 starter Lexington Joseph, who missed the year due to injury. Yost has always employed a running back by committee approach, so this is a spot to avoid. Kris Mitchell became the first WR1 under Yost to hit both 100 targets and 1,000 yards in a season. Junior Dean Patterson, who was third on the team in targets (51) with a 15.1 YPC average, caught a touchdown pass in the spring game. Yost does feature the tight end position frequently in his system, with the TE1 averaging around 39 targets per season. First team All-Name candidate Rocky Beers had a strong close to 2023 with 10 receptions on 14 targets in the final three weeks.

Not shocking that Rich Rodriguez led Jacksonville State to a 9-4 record and bowl game victory in the Gamecocks' inaugural season at the FBS level. The core principles of Rodriguez's offense are the exact same as when he was coaching West Virginia and Arizona. JSU's 76.7 plays per game were the 7th most in the country, quarterbacks Logan Smothers and Zion Webb combined for over 200 rushing attempts, and the Gamecocks' 35.1 percent pass rate was bottom-third in the country. All of that combined makes for an offense that is easily projectable if we can lock down a depth chart. Webb has since graduated, leaving the QB1 job to either Smothers or UConn transfer Zion Turner, neither of whom separated from the other in spring ball. Will we see another quarterback carousel in 2024? The running back room was short on numbers at one point during the spring, with Anwar Lewis looking like the only returnee. That is no longer the case as Ron Wiggins chose to return after a brief stint in the portal. Rodriguez also added a pair of transfers in former 4-star Andrew Paul (Georgia) and Michel Dukes (USF) who will undoubtedly figure into the mix. A room once low on numbers now has the look of a RBBC Because of how Rich Rod incorporates the QB in the running game, his RB1 is usually a spot-starter in CFF at best depending on the matchup. Jacksonville State doesn't throw the ball enough for a receiver or tight end to hold much value.

We've seen teams in the past – UAB and Jacksonville State come to mind – that have moved up to the FBS level and found instant success. Kennesaw State does not look to be one of those examples with back-to-back losing seasons in 2022-23 and ranking 86th in returning production entering this year. The offensive scheme under long-time head coach Brian Bohannon will rival that of a Navy or Army if you're not familiar – a version of the triple-option offense with the primary ball-carrier being the quarterback. Bohannon's offenses over the last nine seasons have thrown the ball on average just 19.3 percent of the time, and this year is unlikely to deviate much as the returning QBs on the roster have a combined total of 11 career passing attempts. If not this year, perhaps down the line the QB1 for the Owls will be impactful in CFF given the position's utilization in this scheme – hitting 30 percent volume share in each of the last three seasons with 41 total touchdowns in that period. Senior running back Michael Benefield is a talented player that averaged over six yards a carry in 2023, but this is a QB-centric rushing attack. The lack of volume simply eliminates the running back position from CFF significance. Former Virginia Tech transfer Christian Moss should function as the team's WR1, though the best finish for an Owls' receiver in the last nine years in CFF (if Kennesaw State were at the FBS level) would have been WR157.

A banner season for the Liberty Flames in 2023 under first-year head coach Jamey Chadwell, finishing 13-1 with an appearance in a New Year's Six bowl game as the G5 representative. After a brief flirtation with the transfer portal during the winter, Kaidon Salter is back after ending the season as QB3 in CFF, averaging nearly 32 FPPG with eight weeks of scoring 30-plus fantasy. The junior quarterback is perfectly-suited for Chadwell's spread option that requires a dual-threat under center, as Salter was one of three quarterbacks – Jayden Daniels and Thomas Castellanos being the others – to surpass 1,000 yards on the ground. Salter remains a consensus top three fantasy quarterback and first-round CFF selection, but there is some concern with the receiving corps as the Flames do lose leading wideout CJ Daniels who transferred to LSU. No clear frontrunners emerged from the spring to become the team's X receiver, though Division II transfer Donte Lee fits the physical profile at 6-foot-3, 180 pounds. Lee held almost 30 offers this winter, with the list including NC State, Iowa State, and West Virginia among others. Chadwell's WR1 has averaged over 1,000 yards receiving in each of the last four seasons, though Liberty adding multiple wide receivers in the portal at the conclusion of spring camp may signal they don't have 'a guy' just yet. 100 percent of last season's rushing production is back with starter Quinton Cooley, backup Billy Lucas and rising sophomore Vaughn Blue. Murmurs of Liberty lessening Cooley's workload in 2024 could lead to some fantasy regression. Three OL starters are back from a group that finished second nationally in Line Yards created.

Welcome to the hot seat, Sonny Cumbie, after consecutive 3-9 seasons in which the defense bottomed out in 2023, finishing last in the conference in points allowed (34 PPG). Offensively, Louisiana Tech dealt with a rash of injuries to some of its top playmakers, namely to running back Marquis Crosby, who was coming off a 900-yard season as a freshman and was limited to just one appearance in 2023. Scarce reporting during the spring on Crosby's health status has dropped his ADP to RB108, which could end up being a bargain should he regain his 2022 form. Last year's starting quarterback Hank Bachmeier transferred to Wake Forest in the offseason, leaving incumbent Jack Turner and former Southern Miss transfer Ty Keyes to battle it out for the QB1 job. Turner completed just 57 percent of his passes in spot duty last season when Bachmeier dealt with injury, while Keyes threw for over 3,300 yards and 33 touchdowns last season with East Mississippi C.C. Neither should be selected in CFF drafts but could be potential streaming options in an offense that throws the ball around 52 percent of the time since Cumbie was hired. We'll see if that philosophy shifts in 2024 as the Bulldogs are unproven at receiver, having to replace over 60% of the production with Smoke Harris, Cyrus Allen, and Kyle Maxwell no longer on the roster. 6-foot-2 sophomore Marlion Jackson was impressive down the stretch, with 11 catches in his final four games. The offense will continue to be middling if the line doesn't improve, ranking 127th and 124th, respectively, in Line Yards the last two years, and just two starters return.

A new era in Murfreesboro, as Middle Tennessee moved on from the longest-tenured coach in program history in Rick Stockstill. Brought aboard was former Vanderbilt head coach Derek Mason who is the polar opposite of Stockstill, an energetic and vibrant personality that is very present on social media and in tune with the changing landscape of college football, something his predecessor was not. With a defensive background, our focus shifted towards Mason's offensive coordinator hire, as he landed on former North Texas and Eastern Washington OC Bodie Reeder. Calling plays from 2017-19, Reeder's offenses were generally pass-first, throwing the ball over 53 percent of the time in two of three seasons, with the QB1 combining to average 25.6 FPPG over that span. Last season at Northern Iowa, Reeder's offense finished 15th in passing offense with 268.2 yards per game through the air. Those numbers bode well for the fantasy outlook of starting QB Nick Vattiato, who finished last season as QB34 with over 3,500 total yards and 25 combined TDs. While three of the top four receivers have either graduated or hit the portal, Vattiato seemingly developed a strong rapport in camp with Auburn transfer Omari Kelly, who led all wideouts with six receptions for 93 yards in the spring game. In all three seasons with Eastern Washington / North Texas, Reeder's WR1 hit at least 100 targets. WR/TE hybrid Holden Willis is back, though early indications sound like he may play a more conventional tight end role in the new offensive scheme which could limit his fantasy impact. Upperclassmen Frank Peasant and Jaiden Credle are again expected to lead the RB room behind an offensive line bringing back just two starters.

The Aggies will go from one of the best program builders in all of college football, Jerry Kill, to a coach in Tony Sanchez, who compiled a 20-40 record at UNLV that did not include a winning season in five years. The Aggies will also enter this season with a depleted roster that is 124th in returning production overall, losing its starting quarterback, top two rushers, and top three receivers, all of which hit the portal. Sanchez, who did serve as New Mexico State's wide receivers coach the last two seasons, stayed within for his OC hire by elevating Tyler Wright from tight ends coach who will be calling plays for the first time in his career. With a roster lacking talent and minimal historical data to reference, we'd advise not using any draft capital for New Mexico State players. The quarterback battle includes former Iowa backup quarterback, Deuce Hogan, and a junior college transfer. Leading returning receiver, senior Kordell Davis, caught just 19 passes on 42 targets, averaging just 9.4 yards per catch with a team-high four drops. If there is a prospect worth monitoring, former TCU transfer Monte Watkins would be the name to know after averaging nearly 10 yards per attempt on 60 carries in 2023. In three of the five seasons that Sanchez was at UNLV, his RB1 surpassed 200+ attempts with over 1,000 yards rushing in each year.

Quarterback Keegan Shoemaker (now graduated) scored 20 or more fantasy points in eight straight weeks. His favorite target, Noah Smith, finished with 101 targets on the season and three 100-yard receiving games. Even running back John Gentry, who averaged just 3.3 yards per carry, scored 18 or more fantasy points in four weeks because of his usage in the passing game, finishing the year with 36 catches on 40 targets. However, we may want to temper expectations for 2024. Sam Houston's 54.9% pass rate was the highest ever by an offense led by OC Brad Cornelsen. Historically, that number has been around 42%. How does that impact a receiver like Noah Smith, who is being selected within the first five rounds of CFF drafts? Smith's 24.3% target share was also on the high end for a WR1 in this system, and the Bearkats will get back senior Ife Adeyi, who missed most of last year due to injury. Adeyi posted 54 receptions and 10 touchdowns in 2021. Central Michigan transfer Jase Bauer is the likeliest candidate to start at quarterback, and his dual-threat ability is perfectly suited for this system, as the QB1 generally averages around 122 rushing attempts per season. As we know, any quarterback with potential to total 100 rush attempts in a season has fantasy appeal on draft day. The aforementioned John Gentry and Memphis transfer Jay Ducker will likely share duties at running back.

There may not be a more energetic personality in the college football ranks than new UTEP head coach Scotty Walden, who comes over from Austin Peay, where he's spent the last four seasons compiling a 26-14 record. Walden brings an offensive background to the Miners, having spent time previously as the OC at Southern Miss in 2019-20 and prior to that at East Texas Baptist. Walden's offenses at Austin Peay were fast-paced, averaging around 73 plays per game, and yielded multiple standout performers like 1,300-yard rusher Jevon Jackson in 2023 and Drae McCray (now at Texas Tech), who posted 76 receptions for 1,021 yards in 2022. While there was plenty of roster turnover – 118th in returning production – the cupboard isn't totally bare, as Walden imported 11 transfers from Austin Peay, including Jevon Jackson and several wide receivers with starting experience. Jackson appears to be a shoo-in for the team's RB1 spot, but he will be running behind an entirely new offensive line that has limited snaps at the FBS level. At receiver, Kam Thomas is of the most intrigue, as he'll line up in what is termed the "Miner Back" role, a dual-threat run-receiver position. Thomas was the second-leading receiver for Austin Peay with 621 yards and five touchdowns, while also adding 88 yards on 21 rushing attempts. Junior quarterback Cade McConnell came out of the spring with a slight edge over transfer Skyler Locklear who was the backup at Austin Peay a year ago.

2024 Outlook

This will be the fourth straight year in which Western Kentucky will have a new offensive coordinator, though this time around is not a result of someone being hired away. Head coach Tyson Helton demoted Drew Hollingshead to a co-coordinator role and proceeded to hire long-time confidant Will Friend, whom Helton had worked with previously at both Tennessee and UAB. Primarily coaching the offensive line in the past, Friend does have play-calling experience dating back to 2017 at Colorado State, where the Rams' offense ranked 11th nationally in yards per game (492.5) and 31st in points per game (33.4). More notably, those Colorado State offenses threw the ball on average 43.1 percent of the time while Friend was the OC – a stark contrast from the 62.3 percent pass rate at which Western Kentucky has thrown the ball the last three seasons. That's reflected in our QB rankings, as we do not have the Western Kentucky QB1 in our Top 30, a noticeable change compared to last few seasons. Bowl game hero Caden Veltkamp returned to the team after a brief stint in the portal, and he will battle Texas State transfer TJ Finley in the fall for the starting job. WKU loses the program's all-time leader in career receptions, Malachi Corley, who posted three-straight 100-target seasons, but they do return starters Dalvin Smith and Easton Messer, while also regaining the services of Michael Mathison, who missed last year due to injury. Leading returning rusher Elijah Young could provide fantasy value if WKU is more balanced under the new OC.

The momentum gained from Jim Mora Jr.'s first season with Connecticut faded in 2023, as the Huskies fell to 3-9 after reaching bowl eligibility the year prior. Want to know why UConn underperformed? A run-based offense couldn't push the pile despite returning four starters upfront, including a day two NFL Draft selection in Christian Haynes. The Huskies averaged just 4.2 yards per carry as a team (4.73 YPC in 2022) and fell to 119th in Line Yards created. There was turnover on the staff this offseason as OC Nick Charlton left the team at the onset of spring ball to take a job with the Cleveland Browns. Mora Jr. elevated OL coach Gordon Sammis to offensive coordinator, and he will be calling plays for the first time in his career. As for what to expect offensively, we're anticipating that a former OL coach prefers to run the ball, which has been the identity of the Huskies since Mora Jr. arrived in Storrs. UConn has deployed a full-fledged committee in the backfield the last two seasons with no running back topping 140 carries in that span. Mora Jr. called the running back room one of the deepest areas on the team with returnees Victor Rosa and Cam Edwards, along with Charlotte transfer Durell Robinson and "jitterbug" Jayden Brown, who transferred in from Gardner-Webb. The passing game components were also bolstered by transfers in the offseason, but they will likely have little fantasy impact with Connecticut's emphasis on running the ball. Quarterback Nick Evers (Wisconsin), and receivers TJ Sheffield (Purdue) and Skyler Bell (Wisconsin) were added to the mix.

A total whiff by many last year in thinking that we could ignore the UMass offense entirely, as running back Kay'Ron Adams went on to rush for 1,157 yards and 12 touchdowns, finishing the year as RB34. That said, it's tough to blame anyone for not drafting a UMass player considering they were a team that had thrown just four passing touchdowns in 2022, while the collective group of running backs combined to score the second fewest fantasy points in all of college football that season. With Adams now at Michigan State and just two starters returning along the offensive line, are we back to disregarding the Minutemen in 2024? New offensive coordinator Shane Montgomery does have a strong reputation for developing productive fantasy running backs over the years with six 1,000-yard rushers in his last eight seasons as an OC – most recently with Dylan McDuffie at Buffalo in 2021. Montgomery is also not shy about leaning on one guy in the backfield, with the RB1 hitting 200+ rushing attempts in each of those seasons. The system checks boxes, but it's questionable whether or not there is anyone capable on the roster, as the leading returning rusher, former Arizona transfer Jalen John, had just 31 rushing yards in eight games. We'll be watchful in the summer to see if the staff adds a capable runner to the room via the portal. Wide receiver Anthony Simpson is back after posting 792 yards and three touchdowns on 96 targets. Montgomery's WR1 hit 100+ targets in both years at Buffalo.

2024 Outlook

This will be a new-look Notre Dame offense in 2024, with the Irish having to replace its starting quarterback, running back, leading receiver, and three starting offensive linemen. Not to mention there is a new play-caller in town, as head coach Marcus Freeman hired away OC Mike Denbrock from LSU after captaining the No. 1 scoring offense in the country in 2023. The headliner of the roster additions begins at quarterback with former Duke starter Riley Leonard, who did miss the entirety of spring after undergoing ankle surgery in January. Expected to start in 2024, Leonard's dual-threat ability should mesh well with Denbrock, who has produced four top 15 fantasy quarterbacks in as many seasons, including last season's Heisman winner Jayden Daniels. At running back, expect the tandem of Jeremiah Love and Jadarian Price to shoulder the load, along with Leonard, though the line could be a question mark with just two starters back. Denbrock's RB1 has averaged 17 FPPG over the last six seasons, but we're not anticipating a workhorse in 2024. Freeman bolstered the WR room with transfers Kris Mitchell (FIU) and Beaux Collins (Clemson), and a second-year jump is projected from sophomore Jaden Greathouse, who was deemed the spring offensive MVP by some beat writers. Tight end Mitchell Evans also sat out the spring as he rehabs a torn ACL, but he was the team's best pass-catcher in 2023, leading the Irish in receptions despite missing five games. The latest update on Evans is that he has been cleared medically and will be available in preseason camp. However, a quick injury turnaround means draft at your own risk.

Circumstance has led to Joe Moorhead's offenses being extremely pass-happy the last two seasons, finishing inside the top 10 nationally in pass rate. Just twice in the eight years prior to landing at Akron had a Moorhead-led offense thrown the football at a 50 percent clip. The Zips have now thrown the football 55 percent of the time in each of the last two seasons, mostly due to the Zips often playing from behind, as Moorhead is 4-20 since being hired in 2022. Naturally, Moorhead's reputation for producing top-tier fantasy running backs has taken a nosedive. From 2014-21 between stops from Fordham to Oregon, his RB1s were averaging 22.8 FPPG with five seasons of producing a top seven running back in CFF. Last year's starter, Lorenzo Lingard, finished as RB58 simply because the volume wasn't there with a passing game script. Barring a Year 3 surprise from the Zips, our focus again will be on the passing game components, primarily receivers Alex Adams and rising sophomore Adrian Norton. Adams, the former LSU transfer, was derailed by injury last season, but is just one year removed from finishing as WR38 back in 2022 with 855 yards and nine touchdowns. Norton played sparsely as a freshman but drew rave reviews in spring camp. Both the WR1 and WR2 for Akron hit at least 88 targets in each of the last two seasons. Quarterback remains unsettled coming out of spring camp with California transfer Ben Finley battling dual-threat option Tahj Bullock.

Administrators giving HC Mike Neu another year at the helm was certainly a choice. Ball State finished 4-8 this past season, with Neu's record now sinking to 37-56 overall and 23-39 during MAC play over the last eight years. The inability to locate a starting level quarterback has been the root cause of the decline since winning the MAC in 2020, culminating in a last place finish in passing, averaging a paltry 136.6 yards per game through the air. We do expect that number to rise considerably in 2024 with r-freshman Kadin Semonza likely being QB1. Semonza saw playing time in the first four weeks of last season, including an impressive outing in the opener at Kentucky with 165 yards and a touchdown, completing 75 percent of his passes. Semonza's performance in the first four weeks is notable considering that it directly correlated with the best fantasy stretch of the season for tight end Tanner Koziol. 30 of his season-long 55 targets came in the month of September. Colorado transfer WR Ty Robinson was fifth on the team in receiving yards despite only playing in two games. Our projected WR1 for Ball State, Robinson was targeted seven times by Semonza against both Kentucky and Georgia. With increased passing volume, might we see another relevant Ball State receiver in CFF? Neu typically prefers to feature his RB1, which has averaged 44.6 percent backfield volume share over the past eight seasons. We just don't know for certain who that will be with Marquez Cooper transferring to San Diego State. Late in the transfer window, Ball State added Eastern Kentucky transfer Braedon Sloan, who ran for 765 yards and 10 touchdowns last season.

The 2023 season was as 'on-brand' as it gets for Bowling Green. As has been the case for the last three years, the Falcons upset a P5 (now P4) school in Georgia Tech. The team secured a spot in the Quick Lane Bowl for the second straight year, coincidentally losing to the Minnesota Gophers, a team they have beaten each of the prior two seasons. And there were minimal CFF relevant players outside of star tight end Harold Fannin, who finished the year as TE6. Somehow in this NIL and transfer portal era, HC Scot Loeffler was able to retain Fannin, who remains a top 2-3 fantasy option at the position after finishing last year with 44 receptions and six touchdowns. That's now three consecutive seasons in which the Bowling Green TE1 has hit 40+ catches in a season. Fannin's target share could rise even further in 2024 as the Falcons lost all three starting receivers, along with backup running back Ta'ron Keith who finished second on the team in targets (59). A pair of P5 transfers will likely nab starting roles, RJ Garcia (Kansas State) and Malcolm Johnson (Auburn). The quarterback play last season was adequate enough to reach bowl eligibility, but the position is simply irrelevant from a fantasy perspective with returning starter Connor Bazalak and backup Camden Orth expected to split snaps. Starting running back Terion Stewart was on pace for the best season of his career, averaging six yards per carry with eight TDs in nine games before a leg injury ended his year. In five conference games, Stewart averaged 103.2 YPG and 19.7 FPPG.

It's addition by subtraction for Buffalo this offseason, as former head coach Maurice Lindquist resigned from his post to take an assistant job with Alabama following two losing seasons in three years. In comes Pete Lembo, who spent the last nine seasons as a special teams coordinator and assistant head coach, most recently at South Carolina. Lembo walks into a potential Year 0 situation with a roster devoid of proven talent, ranking 101st in returning production, and a severe lack of playmakers on the offensive side of the ball. The quarterback competition will feature senior CJ Ogbonna, who completed just 38% of his passes in 2023, and transfer Jack Shields, who was the backup at Old Dominion. Buffalo loses 67% of its rushing production from last year with Mike Washington Jr. and Ron Cook Jr. departing - though neither player made a huge impact for a team that averaged just 3.7 YPC. Offensive coordinator Dave Patenaude does have a prior history of producing valuable CFF running backs, including four 1,000-yard rushers in five seasons between 2014-18 at both Coastal Carolina and Temple. Wait-and-see approach with the Buffalo backfield. If there is a glimmer of hope that a name emerges as a legitimate CFF option, sophomore Nik McMillan is the one to know. He had six receptions for around 140 yards and two scores in the team's spring game.

Jim McElwain's tenure in Mt. Pleasant started strong, winning nine games in two of his first three seasons with Central Michigan. The Chips have since won just nine games combined in the last two years, failing to reach bowl eligibility in 2023 after ending the season on a three-game slide. To avoid another bowl-less season, McElwain must figure out the quarterback situation as CMU was 112th in pass play success rate and lost last year's starter Jase Bauer to the transfer portal. Early CFF drafters are assuming dual-threat Bert Emanuel Jr. regains the starting role despite being replaced just two weeks into last season. The upside is undeniable, after witnessing his torrid close to 2022 with 496 rushing yards and seven TDs in just four games. The floor is a wasted draft pick, as former 4th string Iowa backup Joey Labas was the more impressive of the two QBs during spring practices. CMU's leading receiver, senior Jesse Prewitt III, finished as WR236 in CFF. Quite simply, this is not a passing game in which to invest any draft capital. Regardless of the starter at quarterback, RB Marion Lukes should be the centerpiece of the CMU offense after leading the MAC with over 1,600 all-purpose yards in 2023. After splitting time with Myles Bailey the first half of the season, Lukes averaged 19.3 touches per game over the final six weeks, including a 200-yard rushing performance in the Week 11 victory over Northern Illinois. With three returning starters along the offensive line, the running game should be functional as a baseline, and McElwain has a history of producing top-tier fantasy running backs – Lew Nichols (2021) and Jonathan Ward (2019).

Having an offensive-minded head coach like Chris Creighton remain at one job for 10 years means we have a lot of data points to reference when trying to project this Eastern Michigan offense in 2024. While we know the system, the roster is in a bit of flux with just four returning starters on the offensive side of the ball. At quarterback, Creighton brought in a two-year starter via the portal in Cole Snyder, who comes over from Buffalo, so there will be familiarity with opposing defenses within the conference. While not a statue in the pocket, Snyder will not provide fantasy points with his legs like previous EMU quarterbacks Mike Glass III or Preston Hutchinson. Incoming freshman Jace Stuckey could be a sneaky dynasty stash that the coaching staff is high on – he rushed for a 60-yard touchdown in the team's spring game. 97% of last year's rushing production is gone with Samson Evans graduating and backup Jaylon Jackson transferring to Iowa State. Gleaning from the minimal reporting on EMU football, it does not sound like any candidate to replace Evans established themselves in the spring. Fantasy owners should take a wait-and-see approach at running back. Just twice in the last decade under Creighton has an EMU receiver finished inside the top 50 in CFF at the position, so it's generally good practice to just wait until in-season waivers to see if someone pops as a legitimate option. JB Mitchell returns at one starting spot, and the team brought in two experienced transfers, Porter Rooks (NC State) and Oran Singleton (Akron), to bolster the group.

No surprise that the team with the least amount of returning experience in all of college football entering 2023 finished dead last in the conference with just one win on the season. This was always going to be a rebuild under first-time head coach Kenni Burns with the amount of roster turnover dealt with last offseason, and the results showed it, finishing last in the MAC in both scoring offense (14.7 PPG) and defense. Predictably with a former RB coach leading the team, the Flashes skewed towards running the football offensively, ranking 48th in rush rate, though not particularly successful at doing so, averaging under three yards a carry. Leading rusher Gavin Garcia is back, along with former Minnesota and Kansas transfer Ky Thomas, who Burns has a long-standing history with, having coached Thomas back with the Gophers. Kent State finished 122nd nationally in passing, averaging just 164 yards per game through the air, and they didn't significantly upgrade the position in the transfer portal. Incumbent Tommy Ulatowski is the odds-on favorite to start, and he did have a 35-point fantasy performance in Week 11 vs. Akron. Outside of that, the junior completed just 49 percent of his passes for the year. The biggest news of the offseason for Kent State was receiver Chrishon McCray being healthy and very active in the spring. The 5-foot-10 sophomore was a revelation once Kent State hit conference play, as he was targeted 10 or more times in four straight games before suffering a season-ending ankle injury. McCray caught a touchdown in the team's spring game.

Miami (Ohio) is typically one of the straightforward teams to project given we have a decade's worth of data to look at under head coach Chuck Martin. There were several outliers, though, last season. In most years, running backs are completely irrelevant for the RedHawks, averaging just 22.3% volume share with only one season of the RB1 hitting double-digit rushing TDs. Rashad Amos was an anomaly, finishing the year as RB46 with 41.6% volume share and became the first 1,000-yard running back since Martin was hired. As most G5 players do following that type of performance, Amos parlayed his big year into an NIL package with Ole Miss. Veterans Keyon Mozee and Kenny Tracy return, but Martin hit the portal, bringing in Purdue transfer Dylan Downing, so we don't anticipate depth being an issue. Early indications suggest that Miami (Ohio) will revert to being a backfield committee again. Brett Gabbert is entering Taysom Hill territory, returning for his sixth season of college football after playing in just eight games last year. Gabbert will stabilize the passing game after the lowest mark (165.4 YPG) of the Chuck Martin era, but he is a backend roster option at best because of his lack of mobility. Miami (Ohio) is becoming WRU among G5 teams with the level of talent it produces, from Jack Sorenson to Mac Hippenhammer and most recently Gage Larvadain. The latter has since transferred to South Carolina, but history tells us someone will be relevant here. Eight of the last 10 WR1s for the RedHawks played on the boundary, so early money should be on sophomore Javon Tracy or Arizona State transfer Andre Johnson.

Through the month of September, it appeared as though Thomas Hammock's tenure in DeKalb was coming to a close, as the Huskies were 1-4 out of the gate. This all coming following the 2022 season, just the fifth losing campaign in the last 20 years at NIU. After a mid-season change at offensive coordinator, the Huskies rebounded by winning six of their final eight games, which included a bowl victory over Arkansas State. Barring a surprise, the offense will once again be centered around all-conference running back Antario Brown, who rushed for nearly 1,300 yards and 10 touchdowns, which ranked him RB36 in CFF. Because of NIU's offensive inconsistencies, Brown is better served being rostered in bestball formats rather than redrafts, as he failed to score 10 fantasy points in five of 12 regular season games. Further limiting Brown's ceiling is his lack of usage in the passing game, as backup Gavin Williams comes in on throwing downs. Williams posted 23 receptions on 30 targets last year. New OC Wesley Beschorner, former head coach at Wisconsin Eau Claire, does have a penchant for supplying a bell-cow in the backfield, giving his RB1s 225 rushing attempts in both 2021 and 2022. There are talented pass-catchers on the roster, namely Trayvon Rudolph and TE/WR hybrid Grayson Barnes, but this is a run-first offense that was 99th in pass play rate a year ago, and that was with an experienced quarterback like Rocky Lombardi. We don't expect the pass rate to increase after spring reports suggest little to no separation in the competition between Ethan Hampton, Jalen Macon, and Josh Holst. Take stabs at drafting Rudolph or Barnes beyond the 20th round.

Head coach Tim Albin has done a marvelous job continuing Ohio's winning ways since taking over the job in 2022, but he has a big challenge this season, as the Bobcats are 127th of 134 FBS teams in returning production. They lost their starting quarterback, running back, and top five pass-catchers. The Myrtle Beach Bowl did give us a glimpse at the future, primarily at running back with 203-pound redshirt freshman Rickey Hunt Jr., who took home MVP honors after a program-record five touchdowns in the win over Georgia Southern. Flash in the pan or breakout candidate? Only two starters return on the offensive line and Northwestern transfer running back Anthony Tyrus was brought in to compete with Hunt. In five of the last eight seasons, the RB2 for the Bobcats has posted 100+ rushing attempts, and we did see Sieh Bangura's volume fluctuate last season with O'Shaan Allison vulturing carries. We're expecting a run-based offense from Ohio in 2024 given the personnel, but there's a definite path to this being a committee approach given Albin's play-calling history. As of June, Ohio has yet to bring in a quarterback via the portal to compete with senior Parker Navarro, so we're assuming he's the guy. While he won't blow anyone away with his physical attributes, Navarro does offer a running element at the position, and that was on display in the bowl game, as he ran for 71 yards on 15 attempts, which puts him on our radar as a potential weekly streaming option. Over 90% of last year's receiving production either graduated or hit the portal. Wide receiver Chase Hendricks is the most experienced returnee with 21 targets as a freshman.

Toledo was one of the most experienced offensive units in college football last season, so it wasn't a surprise that they led the MAC by a considerable margin in both total offense (419.2 YPG) and scoring (32.3 PPG). That's not the case entering 2024, as the Rockets are 126th in returning offensive production, having to replace a three-year starting QB, a 1,400-yard rusher, and all five starting linemen. On a positive note, the Rockets are not starting from scratch at the quarterback position, as junior Tucker Gleason saw considerable playing time when Dequan Finn was on the shelf due to injury. There's also a very high floor when drafting a Toledo quarterback since Jason Candle took over as head coach, as seven of the last eight QB1s under his direction have averaged at least 21 FPPG. We expect Toledo to throw more in 2024 with returning starters Jerjuan Newton and Junior Vandeross III at receiver, who together combined for 43% of the team's target share and 13 of the 26 receiving touchdowns. Newton has been one of the best receivers in the MAC for two years now, racking up 18 TDs in that time, but he has never finished higher than WR62. The expected uptick in passing volume with Gleason under center could make Newton a steal in drafts. The biggest question mark for the Rockets is at running back after Peny Boone chased an NIL bag to Central Florida. Senior Jacquez Stuart will undoubtedly get the first crack at the job with his 297 career rushing attempts, but there is some concern about whether or not his 178-pound frame is capable of 15-plus touches per game.

Had the entire coaching staff remained intact entering 2024, we'd have been more bullish on this Western Michigan offense, which finished third in the conference in yards per game (365.0) and sixth in scoring (23.7 PPG). Alas, OC Billy Cosh took a head coaching job at Stony Brook, and in comes Walt Bell, who is now on his fifth coaching stop in the last decade. Bell's resume is not promising for WMU's fantasy outlook. Bell has not coordinated an offense that has averaged over 27 PPG since 2015, when he was at Arkansas State. Since 2016, Bell's QB1s have combined to average just 13.2 FPPG, with Florida State's Deondre Francois the best performer of the bunch, finishing as QB77. Just once since 2015 has Bell's RB1 finished inside the top 60, UMass' Ellis Merriweather, whose fantasy production was entirely volume dependent (218 rush attempts), resulting in just five rushing touchdowns. Merriweather's 2021 season was the only occurrence in the last decade where Bell's RB1 hit 200 carries. He'll inherit a proven talent in Jalen Buckley, who ran for 1,000 yards and 10 TDs as a freshman, but there is some wonder about how he'll be utilized, as Bell's track record shows he typically prefers a committee system. Senior receiver Kenny Womack was one of 44 players to hit 100 targets for the season with 28% of Western Michigan's target share. All that volume resulted in just 12.6 FPPG and one touchdown, averaging just 9.1 yards per catch with a 5.1-yard aDOT. Barring a change in utilization under Bell, Womack holds little value in any non-PPR formats.

We are looking at a potential Year 0 situation in Corvallis with new head coach and former defensive coordinator Trent Bray, as the Beavers are 124th overall in returning production, have just one starter back on offense, and lost the team's best player to the transfer portal (RB Damien Martinez). The star running back was one of 13 players to hit the portal since the April 16 spring window opened, signaling a true rebuild at Oregon State in 2024. As a result, we do not suggest investing any draft capital on Oregon State players, unless you wait until the later rounds. Spring concluded with very little separation at quarterback, as Idaho transfer Gevani McCoy seemed to have a slight nod over veteran backup Ben Gulbranson. McCoy does offer something as a potential runner at the position, but who will he throw to with 80% of last year's receiving production no longer around? Not to mention, projected WR1 Jimmy Valsin is expected to miss fall camp and potentially time during the regular season. Former Cal transfer and last year's TE2, Jermaine Terry, could be a breakout candidate in place of Jack Velling who followed head coach Jonathan Smith to Michigan State. Oregon State has had a long-standing tradition of producing top-notch fantasy running backs but they will enter the season with a pair of journeymen running backs, Anthony Hankerson (Colorado) and Jam Griffin (Ole Miss).

It's no secret as to what Washington State and OC Ben Arbuckle want to do offensively. The Cougars ranked No. 2 nationally in pass play rate in 2023, throwing the football 59.9 percent of the time, totaling over 4,000 passing yards and 27 touchdowns in 12 games. That production was with Cam Ward, who has since transferred to Miami. Barring a late transfer, Arbuckle will have a choice at quarterback between incumbent John Mateer, who served as the backup to Ward, and Bryant transfer Zevi Eckhaus, who was the Big South Offensive player of the Year last season. Spring reports suggest Mateer maintained a slight lead coming out of camp, but the competition is expected to continue into the fall and could possibly spill over into the season according to head coach Jake Dickert. Whoever wins out has fantasy Top 10 potential at the position because of Arbuckle's pass-happy scheme. Unsurprisingly, running backs are a non-factor and should be ignored in drafts. At receiver, veteran Kyle Williams is back after catching six touchdowns on 88 targets while playing 89% of his offensive snaps outside. It is important to note that the WR1 in each of the last two seasons (Wash St. and Western Kentucky) has come from the slot. In the mix for that coveted role is veteran Josh Meredith and Oregon transfer Kris Hutson, both of whom consistently ran with the 1s during the spring. Much like the QB position, the player that lands the starting role has top 10 fantasy potential.

As was the case a year ago, Air Force is entering 2024 with a considerable amount of roster turnover, as they rank last in the FBS for returning production. The backfield will look entirely new, as quarterback Zac Larrier, fullback Emmanuel Michel, and tailback John Lee Eldridge III have all exhausted their eligibility. In total, 31 of the team's 36 rushing touchdowns came from players no longer on the roster. Having to replace a surplus of graduated players is not a foreign concept to Air Force or the other Academies. The difference between this year, and last, will be the attrition along the offensive line, as the Falcons go from bringing back four starters in 2023 to replacing all five starters entering this season. Expected to step in at the coveted fullback position is sophomore Dylan Carson, who averaged 7.0 yards per carry on 68 attempts, including 80 or more rushing yards in three of the final four games. Expecting 300+ carries ala Brad Roberts in 2022 is probably wishful thinking, but Carson has the requisite size of a fullback at 210 pounds, and that is typically the position to prioritize in this scheme. Junior Aiden Calvert played sparingly as a sophomore, but he is projected to step into the John Lee Eldridge roll at tailback. As is typically the case with Air Force's 132nd ranked pass play rate, the quarterback and wide receiver positions are non-factors for fantasy owners..

Boise State removed the interim tag by promoting Spencer Danielson to head coach after leading the Broncos to three consecutive wins to close the regular season and a convincing victory over UNLV in the Mountain West title game. Danielson's first hire was former offensive coordinator Dirk Koetter, who served in the same position back in 2022, when the Broncos won eight of their final 10 games, averaging 32.5 PPG in that span. There's plenty to work with this time around, especially with one of the top ranked fantasy players going into 2024, junior running back Ashton Jeanty, who 'should' have the backfield all to himself with the graduation of George Holani. Despite splitting carries for much of the season, Jeanty still managed to average over 29 FPPG with seven performances of 30 fantasy points or more. When Jeanty comes off the field, promising sophomore Jambres Dubar is likely to assume his fair share of the 133 vacated attempts from Holani's departure, making him a shrewd late-round selection in drafts, and somewhat of an insurance policy on Jeanty. Former 5-star recruit Malachi Nelson seized the QB1 job coming out of spring ball, as he seemingly progressed rapidly throughout camp according to beat writers. We question if the 5-star status may cause Nelson to be over-drafted, as he is more of a conventional pocket passer. Boise State's depth at receiver improved drastically in the offseason with the additions of Cam Camper (Indiana) and Chris Marshall (Texas A&M), while they also return Latrell Caples, who missed last year with injury. Senior Austin Bolt is a potential cheat code with WR/TE eligibility on Fantrax if he nabs a starting spot.

Incremental improvements were made in Year 2 of the Jay Norvell tenure in Fort Collins. The win total jumped from three to five. Colorado State doubled its points-per-game output to 26.2. The highly criticized offensive line allowed just 14 sacks in 2023 after giving up a whopping 59 sacks the year prior. With many of the key offensive pieces intact from last season and a soft schedule outside of the opener at Texas, bowl eligibility is the next step. After reportedly spurning multiple NIL offers from other schools, QB Brayden Fowler-Nicolosi returns after throwing for almost 3,500 yards and 22 touchdowns as a freshman. Fowler-Nicolosi posted three performances of 30+ fantasy points last season in an offense that ranked 8th in pass play rate at nearly 42 att/g. While the passing volume will be high, Fowler-Nicolosi should be prioritized more in 6-pt passing TD leagues as he will be a non-factor in the running game. The wide receiver room is fully stocked again with consensus CFF first-round selection Tory Horton, who as a senior is in search of his third-straight 1,000-yard season. 100 targets for Horton is a realistic expectation once again with the departures of star tight end Dallin Holker and WR2 Justus Ross-Simmons, who combined for 188 targets last year. Former Washington State and Cincinnati transfer Donovan Ollie will be a factor, along with slot receiver Dylan Goffney. Redshirt freshman running back Justin Marshall burst onto the scene the final three weeks with 319 rushing yards on 58 attempts, but the amount of depth returning is a concern, as Avery Morrow and Kobe Johnson are both back. We would recommend resisting the temptation to overdraft Marshall in a pass-happy system.

For a team that was having to replace one of its best quarterbacks in program history, a 1,300-yard rusher and 1,000-yard receiver, Fresno State didn't see a dramatic decline in production offensively in 2023. The Bulldogs still managed to finish in the top half of the Mountain West in scoring (30.5 PPG) despite not having their starting quarterback in Mikey Keene for a chunk of the second half of the season. While the system wasn't altered drastically under new offensive coordinator Pat McCann, the uptick in throwing the football was notable, as they ranked 7th nationally in pass play rate and attempted almost 40 passes per game. When healthy, Keene was a serviceable CFF asset at the position, finishing as QB59 with three performances of 30+ fantasy points. His upside remains limited, though, with -185 career rushing yards. 159 targets and 11 receiving touchdowns from last year have been vacated due to the graduation of slot receivers Erik Brooks and Jaelen Gill, but little drop off is expected with veteran Mac Dalena returning. Plus, the Bulldogs added Idaho State transfer Chedon James, who posted 102 receptions in 2023. Projected WR1 Jalen Moss moonlighted at times in the slot during spring ball, but he is expected to operate at his conventional outside spot, as will last year's preseason darling Josiah Freeman. Senior running back Malik Sherrod remains the top fantasy option on the team after rushing for 966 yards and nine touchdowns, in addition to his 44 receptions on 51 targets in the passing game. Sherrod's numbers are even more impressive considering he didn't become the team's primary ball-carrier until mid-October.

Progress was made in the second season of HC Timmy Chang’s tenure, improving the team’s win total by two after closing the year on a high note, winning three of the last four games. To secure bowl eligibility, the run-and-shoot offense needs to yield better results after finishing 10th in the Mountain West in scoring (21.4 PPG). With the system now fully implemented, the Warriors ranked No. 1 nationally in pass play rate, averaging 41.3 att/g, yet were 94th in EPA per pass play and 66th in pass play success rate. Much of that falls on the shoulders of veteran quarterback Brayden Schager, who is in a make-or-break season as a junior. In regards to fantasy output, Schager finished as QB35 last season with 26 TDs, and the rate at which Hawaii throws the ball keeps him in the conversation as a late-round option. He’ll also have plenty of weapons at his disposal, namely breakout star Pofele Ashlock, who was targeted 128 times in the coveted slot role in the Run-n-Shoot. Sidekick Steven McBride also hit 100+ targets and was tied for the team lead with nine receiving touchdowns and had a 20% target share. Both should be selected within the top 5-6 rounds in drafts this summer. Junior Tylan Hines was a colossal disappointment, averaging just 8.5 touches and 3.4 YPG in four games played. His speed can be a game-changer, but this system doesn’t allow for running backs to have much value.

The staff at theCFFSite is trying to devote equal attention to all 134 teams in our preseason guide, but the Wolfpack make that goal difficult to achieve. Nevada posted a Mountain West worst 17.3 PPG in 2023, leading to a second straight 2-10 season and the eventual firing of Ken Wilson. In comes a defensive-mind head coach in former Texas coordinator Jeff Choate, who inherited a roster already devoid of talent, and since April has witnessed 16 players hit the portal, including a pair of starting receivers. Adding another layer to the situation, the Wolfpack went through spring camp without its offensive coordinator Matt Lubik, who is battling cancer. The Wolfpack roster does possess several former P5 transfers, including running backs Sean Dollars (Oregon), Pat Garwo III (Boston College), quarterback Brendon Lewis (Colorado) and receiver Cortez Branham Jr. (West Virginia), but there isn’t a draftable CFF prospect in the bunch. At best, the Wolf Pack may offer in-season streaming options.

The Lobos doubled their win total in 2023, but the results weren't good enough to save Danny Gonzales, as he was dismissed after four-straight losing seasons. In comes former Virginia head coach Bronco Mendenhall to rebuild another program and inject life into a New Mexico offense that has generally finished towards the bottom of the conference. The quarterback is the cornerstone of Mendenhall's offenses, producing some CFF studs in the past with the likes of Tayson Hill, Bryce Perkins, and Brennan Armstrong. He also inherits a potential building block at the position in sophomore Devon Dampier, who appears to have a stranglehold on the QB1 spot heading into the fall. Playing in nine games as a freshman with one start, Dampier flashed playmaking ability as a dual-threat option, averaging nearly six yards per carry on 59 attempts, while completing 63 percent of his throws. Between 2018-21, Mendenhall's QB1 finished inside the top 20 at the position in CFF every year, averaging well over 28 FPPG. That kind of upside for Dampier is worth investing drafts capital, especially with his ADP sitting at QB67. The receiver depth chart is a bit murky beyond 6-foot-3 junior Caleb Medford, who led the team in targets (67) and yards per catch (18.3), so we'd advise not using any draft capital amongst the group. As this tends to be a quarterback-centric offense with the position heavily incorporated in the run game, we're likely to avoid the running backs here. Expect a rotation between Andrew Henry, former Iowa State transfer Eli Sanders, and sophomore Javen Jacobs.

Aztec Fast doesn't have the same ring to it as Flash Fast, but San Diego State is adopting the phrase after hiring former Kent State head coach Sean Lewis. The change is a breath of fresh air for both fans of the program and CFF players alike, as the program had gone stale in recent years, finishing in the bottom-half of the Mountain West in scoring in each of the last six seasons, including a new low of 20.5 PPG in 2023. The changes will be unrecognizable offensively. San Diego State was 124th in pace and 108th in pass play rate last season. Colorado, where Lewis was the offensive coordinator last year, was 11th and 3rd, respectively, in those same categories. Does Lewis have the personnel to succeed in Year 1? Helping matters immensely is the late portal addition RB Marquez Cooper, who spent three seasons with Lewis at Kent State, racking up over 2,800 rushing yards. There is tread on those tires as Cooper has carried the ball 227 or more times in each of the last three seasons – a rarity in college football nowadays. The starting receivers appear to be set with three transfer additions – Louis Brown IV (Colorado State), Ja'Shaun Poke (West Virginia), and Nate Bennett (Portland State). When prioritizing in drafts, Brown would be the choice after catching a 36-yard touchdown in the spring game. Every WR1 under Lewis the last 10 seasons has played on the boundary. Former Florida State transfer AJ Duffy is the favorite to start at quarterback and is deserving of a late-round selection given the scheme.

We get our first introduction to the new Spread N' Shred scheme at San Jose State with former Navy head coach Ken Niumatalolo taking over the reins for the Spartans. Don't be frightened off here by Niumatalolo's previous experience with the Midshipmen running a stale triple-option offense. His hiring of Craig Stutzmann as offensive coordinator should squelch those concerns. Stutzmann arrives from Texas State, where he served as the WRs coach in 2023 and had previous stops at Utah Tech as OC and Washington State as Co-OC. As a play-caller in those three seasons, his offenses threw the ball on average 57% of the time. Looking at the roster in its entirety, the star power resides at wide receiver with the return of both Nick Nash and Justin Lockhart. Come fall, identifying the starting slot receiver will be paramount, as the WR1 under Stutzmann has hit 99 or more targets in three of four seasons, and it would have been four had COVID not shortened the 2020 season. Interestingly, Lockhart and Nash have played at least 90 percent of their starting snaps out wide. Grambling State transfer Floyd Chalk IV is expected to start at running back, and is essentially free in spring drafts, going beyond Round 20. Stutzmann's pass-happy tendencies limit Chalk's potential value, but the RB1 in this system averages 48 percent of the backfield volume share. Junior Walker Eget leads the quarterback battle coming out of spring, but our primary interest is with the skill positions.

Quite the debut for head coach Barry Odom and the Runnin' Rebels in Year 1. The nine victories were tied for second most in program history – 11 wins back in 1984. Unsurprisingly, the offense under OC Brennan Marion was the catalyst for success, as they led the Mountain West in scoring 34.4 PPG and ranked third in yards per game (412.7). While much of the core remains intact, the quarterback position will go through a transition, as Doug Brumfield medically retired and Jayden Maiava parlayed his freshman success into a spot at USC. In comes a pair of transfers, Holy Cross' Matthew Sluka and Campbell's Hajj-Malik Williams, to compete for the starting job. Both possess a dual-threat skillset that meshes with the Go-Go system. Sluka, the projected starter by most, was not on campus in the spring, leaving Williams the upper hand coming out of camp. At running back, Vincent Davis and Donavyn Lester depart, but the cupboard is far from bare, as talented sophomore Jai'den Thomas is the expected starter after rushing for 12 touchdowns as a freshman. NC State transfer Michael Allen will provide insurance behind Thomas. Last year's WR7 in CFF, Ricky White, returns for his senior year after flirting with the transfer portal in the offseason. His 135 targets were good for fifth in the country, and the 33.4% team target share is exactly what we want out of a fantasy receiver.

Another tumultuous spring for the Aggies, though that's become a commonplace for G5 teams in this transfer portal era. After losing 31 players last offseason to the portal, this year's roster wasn't decimated as much, but had more than a dozen players opting to transfer, including multiple projected starters. The QB room saw the most turnover with Cooper Legas and McCae Hillistead seeking other opportunities after HC Blake Anderson named former Iowa quarterback Spencer Petras the starter coming out of spring ball. The hope for fantasy owners is that Petras is serviceable enough throwing the football to support what looks to be another talented group of receivers for the Aggies, primarily senior Jalen Royals, who burst onto the scene with nearly 1,100 receiving yards and 15 touchdowns. Royals became the fourth receiver in the last five years under Blake Anderson to average more than 20 FPPG and reach the 1,000-yard mark. While outside receivers have been the most productive in Anderson's system, there's room for another fantasy-relevant wideout with 122 vacated targets now that Terrell Vaughn has graduated. And almost always, the top two WRs in this system consist of an outside - slot receiver tandem. As to who replaces Vaughn, that is up in the air with senior Kyrese White, who primarily ran with the first team in the camp, in the mix along with JUCO transfer Robert Freeman, who posted over 3,000 all-purpose yards at American River C.C. WR3 Micah Davis was unavailable throughout the spring after getting injured in the bowl game. Robert Briggs Jr. and Rhsul Faison will share the workload at running back behind a line that returns all five starters and was 25th in Line Yards last season.

The more things change, the more they stay the same. Craig Bohl retired this offseason after overseeing the Wyoming program for over a decade, but the structure will remain in place with the promotion of defensive coordinator Jay Sawvel to head coach. Sawvel went outside the program to hire former Michigan State OC Jay Johnson, who is expected to deploy a run-oriented offense. A roundabout way of stating that the quarterbacks and wide receivers should continue to have a nominal impact in CFF. Junior Evan Svoboda is expected to start at QB following the graduation of Andrew Peasley, and like his predecessor, does possess a dual-threat element to his game. Johnson has produced just one top 30 CFF quarterback in the last decade, so Svoboda should be a streaming option at best. Just 45% of last season's receiving production returns, with the one true difference maker looking to be tight end John Michael Gyllenberg, who finished third on the team in receiving yards (360) and caught three touchdown passes. If we see a stylistic shift at any point with the new staff, true freshman receiver Chris Durr Jr. could be a long-term dynasty option after catching 12 passes for 121 yards in the spring game. Running back remains the strength of the roster with the headliner being projected starter Harrison Waylee. He is joined by Dawaiian McNeely, who is returning from injury, and North Carolina transfer D.J. Jones. Coaches praised the RB depth repeatedly, so given the possibility carries could be dispersed evenly amongst the group, fantasy expectations for Waylee should be tempered.

Not often has a quarterback been the top fantasy producer for Appalachian State, but that's what happened in 2023 with junior Joey Aguilar finishing the season as QB12 in CFF, throwing for a school record 3,737 yards and 33 touchdowns. What was most impressive was his consistency, as he scored 24 or more fantasy points in all but one game during the regular season, and 30 or more fantasy points eight (!) times. Aside from the matchup with Clemson in Week 2, Aguilar should be a reliable weekly starter in CFF. Returning with Aguilar is his top target in wideout Kaedin Robinson, who posted 905 yards and 10 touchdowns. That feels like his ceiling given the fact App State has never had a 100-target receiver, but Robinson was reportedly unstoppable in spring scrimmages according to one team writer. Another reason to be overly optimistic is Robinson's potential move to the slot, where he played in the bowl game vs. Miami (Ohio) and posted 8-118-0 on 10 targets. The Mountaineers should have one of the deepest running back rooms in the conference on paper with returnees Kanye Roberts, Anderson Castle, Maquel Haywood, and Ahmani Marshall. For on-field purposes, that's great news for App State. From a CFF viewpoint, that muddies the waters for a team that has not had a 200-carry running back since 2019. Roberts was explosive in the spring, averaging 14.2 yards per carry in scrimmages. Castle out-carried Roberts 20 to 10 in the bowl game, en route to 119 yards on the ground. It might be wise to nab both in drafts if investing in the App State backfield.

It's time for Butch Jones to win big at Arkansas State after incremental improvements in three seasons and leading the Red Wolves to its first bowl appearance since 2019. They rank 27th nationally in returning production overall and bring back nine starters on offense, including quarterback Jaylen Raynor, a potential star. The sophomore QB took over the reins in Week 4 and proceeded to score nearly 100 fantasy points in the next two games, totaling 11 total touchdowns against Southern Miss and UMass. While there's some work to do as a passer, Raynor possesses the dual-threat element we adore from our CFF quarterbacks, as he accounted for 10 or more rushing attempts in 8 of 10 starts. If Jones and OC Keith Heckendorf continue to deploy their QB1 in the run game at a similar rate, Raynor has top 10 potential. In five seasons as the primary play-caller with Arkansas State, Heckendorf has not produced a Top 75 CFF running back. Last year's starter Ja'Quez Cross did have a pair of top 12 weekly finishes, including a 35-point performance against Texas State, but this is a system that generally incorporates multiple backs with frequency. Drops were a major issue for Corey Rucker in his return to the Red Wolves, yielding just a 46% catch rate on 81 targets. He'll start on the outside with senior Courtney Jackson in the slot. Likely joining them in the starting lineup is former Texas State and Arkansas QB Malik Hornsby, who is expected to play multiple positions in 2024. As it stands currently, Raynor is the only draftable CFF option for Arkansas State.

Many questioned the hire of Tim Beck as head coach of Coastal Carolina given his declining offenses in the final three seasons at NC State. Those groans and jeers quickly dissipated as the Chanticleers finished 8-5, including a bowl victory over Hawaii. Offensively though, Coastal was mediocre, ranking 8th in the conference in scoring (27.2 PPG) and 7th in yards per game (416.2), and they will now forge ahead without the best quarterback in program history, Grayson McCall. First crack at replacing McCall likely belongs to Ethan Vasko, who started four of the final five games of 2023 and completed 63% of his passes, which included seven touchdowns. Vasko's intrigue comes via his legs, though, after bursting onto the scene in Week 10 vs. Old Dominion with 184 rushing yards on 17 carries. At QB60 in ADP, going beyond Round 20, Vasko is worth a dart throw because of the potential rushing usage. The WR room starts from scratch with 192 vacated targets following the departures of Sam Pinckney and Jared Brown. 6-foot-2 junior Jameson Tucker was a distant WR3 with just 20 catches on 34 targets, but he was a constant in the starting lineup, playing over 70% of the team's offensive snaps. Coastal didn't add any notable names in the portal which may signal their confidence in the returnees. Beck has not had a 200-carry running back in any of the last eight seasons, and we don't anticipate Braydon Bennett suddenly becoming a workhorse. Four starters are back on an OL that was 107th in Line Yards.

It was a seamless transition to the FBS level for James Madison, going 19-4 over the last two seasons, but the staff and roster underwent a massive overhaul this offseason. Curt Cignetti took the head coaching job at Indiana and brought 11 transfers and all three coordinators with him to Bloomington. Taking over is former Holy Cross head coach Bob Chesney, who developed his own winning pedigree at the FCS and Division III level, compiling a 111-46 career record. He'll have his work cut out for him with a roster that ranks 126th in returning production, ahead of only Georgia State among Sun Belt teams. Washington transfer Dylan Morris will provide a veteran presence at quarterback, but he is a non-factor in the run game and will have an entirely new WR room. Only dual-threat QBs under Chesney have been fantasy relevant in the past, of which Morris is not. Running back should be the strength of this offense with incoming transfers Ayo Adeyi (North Texas) and George Pettaway (North Carolina). Chesney fostered three 1,000-yard rushers in his six seasons with Holy Cross, though fixing the offensive line in the offseason will be a priority. JMU was 12th in the conference in rushing, but return just two starters from a unit that ranked 123rd in Line Yards. Onlookers at JMU practices during the spring stated that UConn transfer Cam Ross and Morris had rapport in the passing game, so he is your potential WR1. Holy Cross' WR1 the last two seasons, Jalen Coker, combined for 26 receiving touchdowns and nearly 2,000 yards. Taji Hudson and standout freshman Dylan Williams could join Ross in the starting lineup.

Two years ago, Georgia Southern went through one of the most extreme philosophical shifts a program can make, transitioning from the triple option to the Air Raid. The Eagles finished inside the top two nationally in each of the last two seasons in pass attempts per game, and they were 4th in pass play rate in 2023. We may see a slight shift this year with new offensive play-caller Ryan Aplin, the former Arkansas State quarterback who served as the team's passing game coordinator the last two seasons. As the OC with both Western Kentucky in 2020 and at North Alabama in 2018, Aplin's offenses were more balanced than what we've witnessed at Georgia Southern the last two years, as they threw the football less than 50 percent of the time. A shift towards balance in 2024 makes sense given the returning personnel. Quarterback Davis Brin and leading receiver Khaleb Hood both graduate, but the team does return starting running back Jalen White who's rushed for over 1,800 yards and 18 touchdowns in the last two seasons combined. Health is White's biggest obstacle, having yet to play a 12-game season as a starter. QB1 remains up for grabs coming out of the spring with incumbent JC French (pass-first) battling Indiana transfer Dexter Williams (dual-threat). The two combined for over 350 passing yards in the team's spring game. Leading receiver Khaleb Hood graduated, but the WR room is fully stocked, with returning senior Derwin Burgess, promising sophomore Dalen Cobb, and Oklahoma transfer LV Bunkley Shelton.

The downside to the new transfer portal rules is that non-power conference schools are getting poached for the talent they've recruited over the years. And we saw that situation play out at Georgia State with Shawn Elliott resigning as head coach just a week into spring camp to take an assistant role at South Carolina. The timing was poor, but understandable given the Panthers lost 36 players in total to the portal, including its top running back and receiver. Consequently, Georgia State ranks 131st in returning production and will look entirely different under new head coach Dell McGee who spent the last eight years as Georgia's running backs coach. Offensively, we're expecting a pro-style approach with McGee hiring long-time SEC coordinator Jim Chaney, who he previously worked with at UGA from 2016-18. Two transfer quarterbacks were brought in to compete for the starting job, Zach Gibson (Georgia Tech) and Christian Veilleux (Pittsburgh) – both of whom coincidentally are at their third school. Neither is a draftable CFF option. Georgia State has been a hotbed for CFF wide receivers over the last decade, so the hope is that either Gibson or Veilleux is functional enough to boost someone to fantasy relevance. Senior Ja'Cyais Credle caught six passes for 62 yards and a touchdown in the spring game. The biggest debate for Georgia State this offseason will be senior running back and captain Freddie Brock. His 276-yard rushing performance against Utah State in the bowl game was extremely impressive, but the Panthers must replace four starters along the offensive line and two transfers were added via the portal, CJ Beasley (Coastal Carolina) and Sy'Veon Wilkerson (Georgia State).

Louisiana secured bowl eligibility in Year 2 under head coach Michael Desormeaux, but it was a struggle down the stretch, as they lost four of five games, including the New Orleans Bowl to FBS newcomer Jacksonville State. Suffice to say Desormeaux needs a big year to avoid the hot seat, as the roster remains largely intact, ranking 13th nationally in returning production. From a fantasy standpoint, there's almost nothing to speak of here. Louisiana hasn't had a wide receiver hit 20% target share since 2019. The stable of running backs combined for just three performances of 20+ fantasy points last year, with leading rusher Jacob Kibodi now graduated. Dre'lyn Washington, Elijah Davis and Zylan Perry have all shown potential at times, but this continues to be a rotating door at running back. Senior QB Ben Wooldridge has shown potential, scoring 30 fantasy points in his first two starts last year, but he has suffered multiple season-ending injuries in his career. Perhaps the most fantasy-relevant player on the roster is sophomore tight end Terrance Carter, who caught 28 passes and three touchdowns in a backup role to then-starter Neal Johnson, whose graduation leaves behind 47 vacated targets and five touchdowns. We'll monitor fall camp to see if a name or two emerges here because the Ragin' Cajuns have a chance to start fast in 2024, opening with Grambling State and Kennesaw State in the first two weeks.

Louisiana-Monroe will have a new coaching staff in 2024, are 133rd in returning production, had their spring game cancelled, and has little to no media coverage about the football team. That is roundabout way of suggesting CFF owners wait 1-2 weeks into the regular season before contemplating giving a roster spot to any ULM players. The one area which could pique our interest is the RB1 under new head coach Bryant Vincent. A long-time coordinator within the Sun Belt and most recently with New Mexico, Vincent employs one of the slowest-paced offenses in the country that emphasizes running the football, typically with a bell-cow. Five of Vincent's previous six RB1s have hit the 40 percent volume share threshold, dating back to 2018 with UAB's Spencer Brown. Each of those five running backs also hit double-digit rushing touchdowns in their respective seasons. Last year's leading rusher Hunter Smith is back after averaging over five yards a carry as a sophomore, but he does not fit the size profile Vincent typically seeks with his RB1 - Brown, DeWayne McBride and New Mexico's Jacory Croskey-Merritt were all 200+ pounds. Stay vigilant with ULM fall camp reports (if you can find them), because the inevitable winner of the RB competition could be a viable CFF option, either this year or next. Due to the nature of Vincent's offenses running the ball approximately 60% of the time, the components of the ULM passing game are of no interest.

The Marshall offense will look vastly different entering 2024, as they spent the entirety of spring implementing a new Air Raid scheme under the direction of OC Seth Doege, the former Texas Tech quarterback. Doege has yet to call plays during his career, but the expectation is that his scheme will parallel Graham Harrell's, especially after spending a year at Purdue as a tight ends coach under Harrell. What the spring did not provide is clarity at quarterback, as there was little separation between Cole Pennington, Colin Parachek, and Tulsa transfer Braylon Braxton. The conversion to the Air Raid could make the starter here a viable CFF option, but we would advise taking a wait-and-see approach. Seven transfers were added to the mix at receiver to aid the expected uptick in passing volume. Middle Tennessee transfer Elijah Metcalf is the most experienced of the group and our projected WR1 for the Herd, as he finished last season with 56 receptions and six TDs on 81 targets. P4 transfers Tychaun Chapman (North Carolina), Bralon Brown (Ole Miss) and Christian Fitzpatrick (Michigan State) should all be in the mix. Junior tight end Cade Conley could be a sleeper at the position, as he was on pace for a 60-target season before suffering an injury. The string of three straight 1,000-yard rushing seasons by the RB1 under HC Charles Huff likely comes to an end with the change in offensive philosophy, so we wouldn't suggest prioritizing Jordan Houston or Ethan Payne in CFF drafts with the thought they'll replicate Rasheen Ali's numbers.

There was plenty of optimism surrounding Old Dominion for CFF purposes headed into 2023 with the hiring of offensive coordinator Kevin Decker, who was coming off a season in which his Fordham offense averaged nearly 50 PPG and 600 YPG. While the Monarchs did achieve bowl eligibility for the second time in three seasons, it was not due to the offense which finished 11th in the Sun Belt in scoring (23.8 PPG) and 13th in yards per game. For a positive spin, this will be the first time HC Ricky Rahne will have the same coordinator for back-to-back seasons, so perhaps continuity yields better results. 57% of Old Dominion's offensive production from last season returns, namely quarterback Grant Wilson, who threw for 2,100 passing yards and accounted for 21 touchdowns, scoring 20 or more fantasy points five times. Wilson's usage on the ground was a surprise with six games of double-digit rushing attempts. Three of the top five receivers from last season hit the portal, but there were no difference makers among the group, as no wideout had more than 500 yards for the year. Former P5 transfers Diante Vines (Iowa) and Myles Alston (Pittsburgh) both turned heads in the spring game and are expected to be primary contributors. No running back had more than 19% volume share last year in what was a full-blown committee. We expect much of the same in 2024.

There will be a level of continuity at South Alabama despite losing head coach Kane Wommack, as the school promoted Major Applewhite to lead the program. Applewhite's offensive coordinator hire, Rob Ezell, was also elevated from tight ends coach, so from a structural standpoint the offense won't change much. Roster wise, the story is slightly different, as South Alabama loses its starting quarterback, running back, top receiver, and two starters along the offensive line. Sophomore QB Gio Lopez was widely assumed to be the new starter after his MVP honors in the bowl game, but his 0-for-13 performance in the spring game cast some doubt over that assumption. Lopez possesses a different skill set than his predecessor Carter Bradley as a dual-threat that is suited perfectly for what Applewhite prefers to do offensively – see D'Eriq King / Greg Ward at Houston from 2015-18. 100+ carries from Lopez is a distinct possibility. Back-to-back 1,000-yard rusher La'Damian Webb graduated, leaving the backfield to either Braylon McReynolds or Kentrel Bullock. McReynolds was ahead of Bullock on the depth chart when healthy last season and is an exceptional pass-catcher out of the backfield with 18 receptions on 19 targets in just five games. Regardless of which player has the RB1 title, Applewhite preferred a two-back system pre-La'Damian Webb, which may mitigate the fantasy value of this backfield. That should not be the case at receiver where Applewhite generally features one guy, as his WR1 has hit 100+ targets in six of his last seven years as a play-caller. Junior Jamaal Pritchett is the likeliest candidate to replace Caullin Lacy as the team's top wideout after leading the Jaguars with eight touchdowns on 83 targets.

Will Hall has to get the quarterback situation figured out. Frank Gore Jr., as a running back or super back, is no longer around to bail out this offense. The competition is down to two, sophomore Ethan Crawford and Florida State transfer Tate Rodemaker, with the former having slight lead heading into summer. Projecting how this offense will look under new OC Chip Long is problematic given the two contenders are different styles of quarterbacks, with Crawford being a dual threat compared to Rodemaker as your prototypical pocket passer. Hall hasn't had a QB finish inside the Top 100 in CFF in any of the last three years, so our interest here is minimal. Regardless of who wins the QB1 job, Southern Miss is sure to throw more under Long, whose offenses pass the ball around 46% of the time at his previous stops, Notre Dame, Tulane, and Georgia Tech. Junior Tiaquelin Mims led the team in receptions (39) in 2023, but the depth chart is a mystery beyond him with four of the top five target-getters no longer on the roster. Ole Miss tight end transfer Kyrin Heath was a standout spring performer and could be a deep sleeper at the position. In three of the last four seasons that Long has called plays, his TE1 posted 50 or more targets. A lot of words above on Southern Miss, but realistically the only draftable CFF option is 200-pound bowling ball Dreke Clark, who is a relative bargain in drafts at RB94 in ADP. With limited experience behind Clark, 200 carries is not an outlandish prediction.

There is no team in the Sun Belt with more intrigue for CFF purposes than Texas State under second-year head coach G.J. Kinne. From the first whistle of the season, the offense operated at a high level with a shocking 42-31 win over Baylor in the opener, and then they closed the year with a blowout victory over Rice in the First Responder Bowl. The Bobcats finished the year No. 1 in the Sun Belt in scoring (36.7 PPG), while ranking inside the top 20 nationally in both offensive rush and pass success rate. Despite having a 3,000-yard passer in T.J. Finley, Kinne hit the portal in search of an upgrade at the position. After the Jayden de Laura debacle, Kinne found his man in James Madison transfer Jordan McCloud, who finished last season as QB6 in CFF, averaging over 33 FPPG with nearly 4,000 yards of total offense. While considered by some to be a tier behind Byrum Brown, Kaidon Salter and Dillon Gabriel among CFF quarterbacks, McCloud arguably has a higher upside because of Kinne's up tempo Air Raid scheme. The skill positions surrounding McCloud remain intact with star running back Ismail Mahdi returning, along with Texas State's top two receivers, Joey Hobert and Kole Wilson, who combined for 142 receptions and 16 TDs. Wilson remains a value in CFF drafts, as he is being drafted 7-8 rounds after Hobert despite leading the Bobcats in targets in five of the last seven games. Three full-time starters return up front from a group that finished 30th in the country in line yards.

A G5 school cannot win 23 games in two seasons and back-to-back conference titles without the possibility of its coach getting scooped up by a bigger program. That's exactly what happened to Troy, as Jon Sumrall was hired away by Tulane this offseason, and they now enter 2024 with a brand-new coaching staff that inherits a roster that is 129th in returning production. Head coach Gerad Parker was hired after spending one season in South Bend as the Notre Dame offensive coordinator, where the Irish did finish in the top 10 in both scoring and yards per play. Parker has a limited resume with just three seasons of play-calling experience, and his background has been a mixed bag of both pro-style and RPO-heavy schemes, which will make it difficult to pinpoint exactly what the Troy offense will look like in 2024. The biggest takeaway from spring ball was how the staff plans to replace arguably the best running back in program history, Kimani Vidal. Straight from the horse's mouth, Parker was quoted as saying "I think we'll attack what was lost by attacking it with a group." Juniors Damien Taylor and Jarris Williams, along with Georgia Southern transfer Gerald Green, are among the expected contributors. In three seasons as a play-caller, Parker's QB1s (Sam Hartman / Jarret Doege) have combined to average just 19.2 FPPG, so it's unlikely that either Goose Crowder or Tucker Kilcrease, the two contenders for the job, are viable CFF contributors at any point. The top returnee at wide receiver, junior Chris Lewis, was diagnosed with cancer this offseason, and his playing status for 2024 is unclear.

Did Michigan break Nick Saban with their Rose Bowl victory over Alabama, forcing him into early retirement? It'll be odd to not see Saban strolling the sidelines on Saturdays, but the Tide seemingly hit a home run with his replacement, Kalen DeBoer from national runner-up Washington. The offensive minded DeBoer has found success at every stop during his coaching career, producing CFF standouts at multiple skill positions. He'll have at least one building block at quarterback with junior Jalen Milroe, who finished as QB13 last season with over 3,300 combined yards and 35 total touchdowns. Reports were mostly positive during the spring, as Milroe got acclimated to the new scheme, with DeBoer stating no quarterback on the roster threw an interception during a scrimmage. DeBoer's preference of a pocket passer in the past makes this fantasy prognostication challenging, but the system + Milroe's rushing usage has QB1 upside for CFF if everything clicks. We're expecting co-starters in the Bama backfield with sophomore Justice Haynes and junior Jam Miller, the latter being named as the spring game MVP. Based on what transpired in camp, we're anticipating a near 50-50 split between the two backs. If there's one position that has blossomed in CFF under DeBoer, it is his WR1s, as they have surpassed 100 targets in seven of the last eight seasons, with the exception being the COVID season of 2020, when Jalen Cropper averaged 10 targets per contest in six games. WR2 is yet to be determined between juniors Kobe Prentice and Kendrick Law, along with the arrival of 5-star freshman Ryan Williams.

In a last-ditch effort to save his job, Sam Pittman hired an experienced offensive coordinator and someone who knows the program all too well, former Arkansas coach Bobby Petrino. It's no surprise that Petrino sought out a dual-threat quarterback in the transfer portal, landing Boise State QB Taylen Green, who looked great in the spring game, completing 15-of-21 passes for 242 yards and three touchdowns. Over the last decade, only Stanford's Troy Taylor has deployed his QB1 in the running game more than Petrino, whose quarterbacks have averaged around 29% volume share in that span. And we know Green can run with over 1,000 yards on the ground in the last two years. Former Utah running back Ja'Quinden Jackson also transferred to Fayetteville as one of the bigger busts in CFF a year ago, as he was constantly injured throughout the year with a nagging ankle injury. Jackson looked healthy and spry during the spring game with 65 yards on nine attempts, and while he's a draftable CFF prospect in later rounds, the system doesn't usually produce a bell cow in the backfield because of how much Petrino utilizes the QB in the run game. The RB1 for Petrino has not surpassed 156 attempts in a season in the last 10 years. The receiving corps remains largely intact from a year ago, headlined by Andrew Armstrong, who accounted for 26% of the target share and a team-high five touchdowns. 6-foot-3 tight end Luke Hasz would have been a first-team Freshman All-American had he not suffered a season-ending injury. Prior to the injury, Hasz was sixth in yards among all tight ends.

After being in the mix for several potential transfer quarterbacks in the offseason, Hugh Freeze is running it back with Payton Thorne. While largely unimpressive in his first season starting for the Tigers, Thorne did have three performances of 30+ fantasy points. Of course, Thorne also failed to score more than 16 fantasy points in eight of the remaining nine games on the schedule. He's best suited as a low-end QB in bestball formats because of his rushing ability, totaling 515 yards on 134 attempts. What will help Thorne and the offense is a strengthened receiver room that'll feature a pair of transfers, KeAndre Lambert-Smith (Penn State) and Robert Lewis (Georgia State), that are expected starters, but may not be difference makers in the SEC. The candidate to emerge as an alpha-type would be incoming 5-star Cam Coleman, who shined in the spring game, hauling in four receptions for a game-high 92 yards. Senior tight end Rivaldo Fairweather returns as Auburn's leading pass-catcher from a year ago, finishing as TE22 in CFF. Improved quarterback play could make him a more valuable asset. Jarquez Hunter is also back after leading the Tigers with 909 yards and seven touchdowns on the ground, though Freeze rarely features a RB1 exclusively, as they have averaged just 138 attempts per season. Backups Damari Alston and Jeremiah Cobb should get their fair share of touches in Freeze's offense.

Can we give Billy Napier some credit in unearthing Graham Mertz as a viable starting quarterback in the SEC? The former Wisconsin transfer easily had the best season of his collegiate career, completing 73% of his passes for 2,900 yards and 20 touchdowns with just three interceptions in 11 games. In the second half of the season, Mertz was actually a realistic CFF option in deeper formats, scoring 20 or more fantasy points in his final seven starts. The succession plan is in place at the position with 5-star freshman DJ Lagway looking the part in the spring and should be considered the No. 1 overall pick in dynasty supplemental drafts. Senior Montrell Johnson will assume his role as the team's RB1 having rushed for at least 800 yards in his first three seasons in college. There's a chance his volume increases with Trevor Etienne transferring out in the offseason, but we know Napier prefers a shared backfield dating back to his days at Louisiana. True freshman Jadan Baugh is another coveted dynasty option after impressing in the spring game with 77 yards on 12 carries. He's college-ready at 237 pounds and will battle Treyaun Webb for the RB2 role. Ricky Pearsall graduated, but the WR unit is in great shape with Eugene Wilson III, who was exceptional as a freshman with 61 receptions and a team-high six touchdowns. Zero drops and an 86% catch rate are just absurd numbers for any receiver, let alone a freshman. We're projecting Pearsall's vacated spot will be assumed by Arizona State transfer Elijah Badger, who has 135 receptions over the last two seasons. TE1 Arlis Boardingham was yet another impressive freshman for the Gators last season with 26 receptions on 36 targets.

The No. 1 team in the land should boast one of the best offenses in the country with 75% of their offense returning in 2024. Future first-round NFL Draft selection Carson Beck was impressive in his first season as a starter, completing 72% of his throws for 3,900 yards with 28 touchdowns accounted for, and there is no reason to expect a drop-off because of Georgia's supporting cast at the skill positions. Beck should be prioritized more in 6-point passing touchdown leagues, but he finished 2023 as QB21, so he does hold value in all formats. Florida transfer Trevor Etienne will be the most talented running back the Dawgs have had since D'Andre Swift and he's solidified atop the depth chart. As is typical with Georgia, though, the RB2 will be featured as well, and sophomore Roderick Robinson excelled in the spring according to several reports. Could 2024 be the rare instance that a Georgia receiver is CFF relevant now that Brock Bowers is no longer around? Miami transfer Colbie Young was the most discussed offensive player in the spring and will likely serve as the team's top red-zone option at 6-foot-5. Slot receiver Dominic Lovett was second on the team in receptions (53) and targets (70) last season, and his fantasy production was boosted in the games where Bowers was out due to injury. Georgia should also run about 7-8 deep at the position with the additions of London Humphreys (Vanderbilt) and Michael Jackson III (USC), so this discussion could be all for naught. Even without Bowers, Georgia remains head of the class for tight end talent, returning Oscar Delp and the addition of Stanford transfer Ben Yurosek.

The Wildcats will have their fourth offensive coordinator in as many years, as Mark Stoops hired Bush Hamdan away from Boise State. Kentucky will also be breaking in a new starting quarterback, adding Georgia transfer and former 4-star Brock Vandagriff, so there are several unknowns with this offense heading into 2024. Stylistically, we're not sure how much changes here outside of Hamdan mentioning the Wildcats will operate faster than the 119th ranked pace they played at a season ago. Vandagriff is unlikely to be a CFF asset, but he'll have the benefit of throwing to one of the better wide receiver units in the conference with returning starters Barion Brown and Dane Key, along with North Texas transfer Ja'Mori Maclin. While collectively talented, it's doubtful there is a consistent fantasy option here, as the targets have been evenly distributed the last few seasons. Given Kentucky's recent history, their RB1 is the most coveted position in CFF, and that is the case again with Ohio State transfer Chip Trayanum, who has the requisite size of a potential bell cow at 233 pounds. In three seasons as a coordinator with Washington in 2018-19 and most recently with Boise State, Hamdan's RB1 has hit 40% of the market share in the backfield with double-digit rushing touchdowns each season. The lone hesitation with Trayanum might be Kentucky's flirtations with the transfer portal during the spring window and their attempts to lure multiple running backs to Lexington. Incoming true freshman running back Jason Patterson is a dynasty prospect, having gotten some first-team reps in the spring. With Trayanum in his last year of eligibility, there's a path to Patterson being the starter in 2025.

The 2023 LSU offense was one for the CFF history books, as they led the country in both scoring (45.5 PPG) and total yards (543.5 YPG) with QB1 Jayden Daniels and receivers Malik Nabers and Brian Thomas Jr. finishing inside the top 10 at their respective positions. Despite all the offseason changes, most expect this offense to be explosive once again in 2024. All aboard the 'Nuss Buss' as Garrett Nussmeier takes the reins as QB1. He looked the part in the bowl game vs. Wisconsin, throwing for 395 yards and three scores, and that momentum carried into the spring game, as he completed all seven of his passes for 187 yards and two scores. LSU had several failed attempts in the transfer portal to land a running back, so sophomore Kaleb Jackson will get his shot at pacing the running back room. The 225-pounder was electric in limited opportunities last season, averaging 5.3 yards per carry and 3.68 yards after contact, which was most among LSU running backs. He'll run behind one of the best OL units in the country with four starters back from a group that ranked No. 1 nationally in line yards – a big reason why any offensive drop-off won't be drastic. Wide receiver will be a hotly contested debate until Week 1 gives us a glimpse at who will step into the WR1 role. Super senior Kyren Lacy was repeatedly brought up first by head coach Brian Kelly when discussing the position in the spring. Kelly also made mention that as many as seven different wideouts could make an impact. Transfers CJ Daniels (Liberty) and Zavion Thomas (Mississippi State) will have a say if Lacy fails to assume the WR1 mantle. Tight end Mason Taylor could also see an uptick in targets if no wide receiver separates themselves from the group.

The Jeff Lebbby era begins with a completely rebuilt roster, as Mississippi State has the least amount of returning production in the SEC with just three combined starters back. CFF drafters have taken notice of just how good quarterbacks have been under Lebbby over the years, as Blake Shapen's ADP has risen by 13 rounds since the start of February. The results speak for themselves as Lebbby's QB1 has averaged 29.9 FPPG over the last 10 years. Only Lincoln Riley has produced more elite fantasy quarterbacks in that time span. Shapen looks to be next in line if his spring game performance was any indication, as he threw for 312 yards and three touchdowns in the first half alone. This could also be a premier fantasy situation of positive game scripts for a passing offense that is likely to be trailing in most contests with oddsmakers setting the Bulldogs win total at just 4.5. If Shapen succeeds, so to will one or two Mississippi State receivers, and all three projected starters are transfers, Kelly Akharaiyi (UTEP), Kevin Coleman (Louisville), and Trent Hudson (New Mexico State). Akharaiyi is being selected first among the trio, and for good reason after finishing fourth in the country in yards per catch last season (21.2). It's also worth noting that Akharaiyi did have a 40-yard touchdown reception from Shapen in the spring game. Coleman, going eight rounds later than Akharaiyi, will start in the slot, where three of the last four WR1s have played under Lebbby. We're also intrigued by how Lebbby might choose to utilize TE/WR hybrid Seydou Traore (remember him?), who was Arkansas State's leading pass-catcher in 2022 with 50 receptions and four scores. Utah State transfer Davon Booth will step right into the RB1 role.

Eli Drinkwitz and Kirby Moore were a match made in fantasy heaven, as the Tigers finished 11-2 and averaged over 32 PPG with three players finishing inside the top 20 at their respective positions in CFF. And this Missouri offense could be even better in 2024, ranking 10th in the country in offensive returning production, led by the dynamic QB / WR duo of Brady Cook and Luther Burden. The senior signal-caller finished as QB20 last season, providing his owners with consistent fantasy production throughout the year, as he surpassed 20 fantasy points in all but one start, a road game against Georgia. The entire Missouri receiver room returns intact, led by Burden, who finished tied for 15th in the country in targets (120) and had a whopping 33% of the team's target share. He won't fall out of the first round in CFF drafts. If there's any question marks on offense, it's in the backfield, where the Tigers must replace leading rusher Cody Schrader, who led the entire country with 1,600 yards and 14 touchdowns on 276 rushing attempts. The biggest commonality between Drinkwitz and Moore is their penchant for producing a bellcow in the backfield. Back-to-back years now for Moore having his RB1 surpass 55% of the rushing volume, while Drink has produced a 200+ carry running back in eight of the last 10 seasons. Transfers Marcus Carroll (Georgia State) and Nate Noel (Appalachian State) will vie for the coveted role in this offense, both of which have 1,000-yard rushing seasons under their belts.

'New' was the operative word around spring ball for the Oklahoma Sooners. New starting quarterback, Jackson Arnold, who possesses elite physical traits with as good an arm as there is in college football with mobility in his pocket. New offensive line that doesn't return a single starter from last year, but added four transfers and four freshmen to the two-deep. New offensive coordinator Seth Littrell, who does have familiarity with the roster having spent last season with the Sooners as an analyst. The skill talent in Norman is as good as there is in the sport, but how the new parts coalesce will determine the potency of this offense in 2024. Sophomore Gavin Sawchuk will lead the running back room again after rushing for 744 yards and nine touchdowns last season, as he closed the year with five straight 100-yard performances. While Sawchuk is the undisputed RB1 for the Sooners, the staff is high on its depth with redshirt freshman Kalib Hicks and FCS transfer Sam Franklin. Just once while coaching North Texas for seven seasons did Littrell's RB1 hit 200 carries. Purdue transfer Deion Burks had arguably the best spring performance of any player in college football, racking up 174 yards and two touchdowns on five receptions, showing strong rapport with Arnold. He's likely the WR1, though the Sooners go 5-6 deep at the position with sophomore Nick Anderson (21.0 YPC), Jalil Farooq, Jayden Gibson, Brenan Thompson, and possibly Andre Anthony. 6-foot-5 FCS transfer tight end Bauer Sharp caught 29 passes last season for SE Louisiana, playing over half of his snaps at receiver according to PFF. Littrell utilized his TE1 in the last three years with UNT, averaging 47 targets per season.

Lane Kiffin, aka the Portal King, revamped the Ole Miss roster in the offseason, bringing in 22 incoming transfers and the No. 1 class in the country. As a result, expectations are sky high for the Rebels in 2024, particularly on offense with 83% of last year's production back in the fold. No excuses now for Jaxson Dart entering his third season as the starter, as he finished 2023 as QB16, averaging 26.5 FPPG. Consistency will be key for Dart to reach the upper echelon of CFF quarterbacks, as he failed to score 20 or more fantasy points in five of seven regular season starts. Ole Miss should have one of the best WR units in the country with returning starters Tre Harris and Jordan Watkins, who will be joined by South Carolina transfer Antwane Wells. Harris only finished the year as WR46, but he had some dominant performances with 213 yards on 14 targets against Texas A&M and 135 yards in the bowl game vs. Penn State. Bestball might be the preferred format for selecting Harris with the depth of the receiver room. Tight end Caden Prieskorn gives Dart yet another talented option to throw to, converting on 30 of his 37 targets in 2023 with four touchdowns in just 10 games. Ole Miss could be dependent on the pass this season as the backfield is a mess. Logan Diggs may not play this season. Ulysses Bentley IV was injured in the spring. Henry Parrish is back for his second stint with the Rebels, and Rashad Amos finally decided on a school after transferring three times in the offseason. Three starters on the OL return, and Kiffin added two starting guards from Washington's elite unit from last year.

It's not unusual at South Carolina under head coach Shane Beamer that there aren't many obvious CFF candidates, particularly this year after the Gamecocks' offense finished 12th in the conference in scoring (26 PPG) last year. That could change if LaNorris Sellers delivers on the promise he displayed in the spring game, completing 9-of-11 passes while rushing for 38 yards and a touchdown on five attempts. The redshirt freshman quarterback impressed the staff so much in the spring that Beamer went ahead and pronounced Sellers as the team's starting QB heading into the summer. His dual-threat ability is what's most intriguing, rushing for 1,338 yards and 17 touchdowns as a high school senior. The most glaring weakness coming out of spring ball was at wide receiver, where nobody established themselves as a potential WR1 option. No returning wideout had more than 12 receptions in 2023. The only player of mild interest is sophomore Nyck Harbor and that's strictly due to his WR / TE positional flexibility on Fantrax. Reports suggest that the coaching staff was dissatisfied with incoming transfers Gage Larvadain (Miami OH) and Jared Brown (Coastal Carolina) in practices. That likely means another season of heavy tight end usage between returning starter Joshua Simon and Ball State transfer Brady Hunt. The position combined for 65 receptions and four touchdowns in 2023. Beamer is hopeful that Raheim Sanders can rediscover his 2022 form where he led the SEC in rushing at Arkansas. 'Rocket' shed approximately 12 pounds of weight in the offseason and will be working with the same position coach he had at Arkansas during his 1,400-yard season.

The Tennessee offense is going to benefit greatly by not having Joe Milton under center anymore. And that was clear as day in the bowl game vs. Iowa, as prized freshman Nico Iamaleava operated the offense flawlessly in his first career start, completing 12-of-19 passes with four total touchdowns in the victory. Nothing occurred in the spring to sway our opinion away from Iamaleava being a top 10 CFF quarterback in 2024, and this system under Josh Heupel is proven for generating high-end QB production, as the position has averaged 28.6 FPPG over the last six seasons. Milton had the worst statistical season in that span and still finished as QB32. 2023 was a down year for the Tennessee receivers, as the group struggled mightily with drops. Slot receiver Squirrel White should pace the room again, as he finished the year with 68 receptions and 24% of the team's target share, which is directly in line with what Heupel's WR1 generally produces. The big difference last year being a significantly lower aDOT (9.2) for White, compared to Jalin Hyatt, who posted a 14.2 aDOT in his record-breaking season in 2022. More downfield shots for White with a new quarterback could result in a top 10 fantasy season if things break perfectly. Lanky Tulane transfer Chris Brazzell II, who averaged 16.2 yards per catch last season as a freshman, will fill the vacated role of Ramel Keyton as the team's top deep threat. It is extremely rare for Heupel to have a 200+ carry running back, but there is a severe lack of proven depth behind RB1 Dylan Sampson, who was sensational as a sophomore with 603 rushing yards and eight total touchdowns.

Texas was indeed back last season, finishing the regular season 11-1 with a dominant victory over Oklahoma State in the Big 12 championship game resulting in an appearance in the College Football Playoff. The Longhorns have the roster to reach the CFP again in 2024, particularly on offense with a third year starting quarterback, a stacked group of skill position talent, and an OL that might be the best in the country with four starters back. Quinn Ewers improved statistically, completing 69% of his passes for 3,500 yards and 22 touchdowns, finishing the year as QB29. Still, he had too many instances of missing open receivers downfield – just 34% completion rate beyond 20 yards – but he's firmly entrenched as the starter. Take off the tinfoil hats Arch Manning truthers. Steve Sarkisian loves feeding his RB1, averaging around 209 carries and 41% volume share per season. There's still a debate as to who that will be between sophomore Cedric Baxter Jr. and Jaydon Blue, as the latter was the talk of spring camp and is now close to 200 pounds. Wise CFF players should stack the Texas backfield if investing in this situation with Blue going 5-6 rounds after his counterpart in spring drafts. Just once in the last eight seasons has Sark's WR1 failed to hit 100 targets. The leader in the clubhouse is 'probably' Alabama transfer Isaiah Bond, but this is a loaded room that features Jonhtay Cook, Matthew Golden (Houston), Silas Bolden (Oregon State), as well as a host of underclassmen who impressed in the spring, namely freshman Ryan Wingo. Adding to the riches is tight end Amari Niblack (Alabama), who caught four touchdowns as a freshman.

From an outsider's perspective, we think A&M nailed the coaching hires, starting with former Aggie defensive coordinator Mike Elko to lead the program after winning 17 games in two seasons at Duke. Elko then went outside his tree to hire a young, innovative play-caller in Collin Klein, whose Kansas State offense ranked 33rd in pace, 37th in EPA per play and 20th in success rate last season. Will that translate to Year 1 success with the Aggies? Health at quarterback will be paramount, as Conner Weigman has played just nine games in two years, while potential backup Jaylen Henderson suffered a gruesome injury in the bowl game to his non-throwing arm. Weigman was impressive in his first three starts prior to the injury, completing 69% of his throws and scoring a combined 103 fantasy points in that stretch (34.4 FPPG). Elko added three transfer receivers – Cyrus Allen (Louisiana Tech), Jabre Barber (Troy), Jacob Bostick (Iowa) – but it was junior Noah Thomas who stole the show in the spring with a pair of touchdowns on seven receptions. All reports indicate the 6-foot-6 junior will be the team's WR1 in the fall, lining up in the slot, where he's a potential mismatch. The A&M backfield runs four deep with Le'Veon Moss, Reuben Owens, Amari Daniels, and Stanford transfer E.J. Smith. There's optimism that Owens, the former 5-star, can elevate to RB1 as a sophomore, but the spring game didn't suggest that would be the case. Of the 53 rushing attempts in the scrimmage, 13 went to Moss, which was seven more than any other back. We'll wait for the regular season to see if someone emerges as a waiver add.

Head coach Clark Lea looked at the success Jerry Kill was having at New Mexico State and was like, "yea I want that." Not only did Lea bring Kill in as a chief consultant to the head coach, but also imported offensive coordinator Timothy Beck to the same position, and he added quarterback Diego Pavia and tight end Eli Stowers from the Aggies. Pavia was one of the best CFF quarterbacks in the country last season, averaging over 25 FPPG, and finishing as QB8 in total points scored. We know he's got a firm grasp of the system having played the last two years with Beck – it's a matter of how his play will translate going from the worst conference in college football to the best. Vanderbilt's schedule features Alcorn State, Georgia State and Ball State, so Pavia is potentially a streaming option in those favorable matchups. The Dores ranked 124th nationally in yards per game on the ground (95.3 YPG) and 110th in rush success rate in 2023. Sedrick Alexander led Vanderbilt in rushing as a freshman, but this appears to be a committee system with backup AJ Newberry. Bad rushing team + timeshare = zero value. During Beck's short stint with New Mexico State, no Aggies receiver finished inside the top 100 at the position, so this is another spot to avoid. The top three will likely comprise of Quincy Skinner Jr., Junior Sherrill, and Texas Tech transfer Loic Fouonji. Stowers made a seamless transition from quarterback to tight end last season, finishing third on the team with 361 receiving yards on 50 targets. If Stowers is to have any fanatsy relevancy, fantasy commissioners should consider changing his position designation on Fantrax if it does not change from QB.

FRESHMEN SPOTLIGHT

Here is our list of true freshmen with the clearest path to immediate playing time in 2024.



QB Dylan Raiola, Nebraska - The 5-star quarterback did not disappoint in the Nebraska spring game with 239 yards and two touchdowns, and will undoubtedly start Week 1 for the Cornhuskers. Temper expectations from a fantasy perspective, though, as Raiola will not provide much on the ground with -41 rushing yards during his high school career.



QB Jeremy Hecklinski, Wake Forest - Do we really believe Hank Bachmeier will last the entire season as QB1? Albeit undersized at just 6-foot, 175 pounds, Hecklinski looked like the best quarterback on the roster in the spring game, tossing three touchdowns. Head coach Dave Clawson has found diamonds in the rough before at the QB position.



RB Jason Patterson, Kentucky - RB1 for Kentucky is usually a great source for fantasy output, and that should continue under new OC Bush Hamdan, who comes over from Boise State. Patterson is 200+ pounds coming in as an early enrollee and garnered some first-team reps in practices. This season's starter Chip Trayanum graduates this year, clearing a possible starting path for Patterson in 2025.



RB Jadan Baugh, Florida - Baugh is college-ready at 237 pounds and showed that in the spring game with 77 yards on 12 carries. Montrell Johnson (senior) and Treyaun Webb are the only players standing in Baugh's way for playing time as a freshman, and we've seen this system give its RB3 extended run in the past under head coach Billy Napier. Will Napier remain in Gainesville beyond 2024, though?



RB Kam Davis, Florida State - Davis possesses a college-ready frame at 5-foot-9, 210 pounds and was an early enrollee for the spring, which we love for speeding up the process for playing time. Davis has a legitimate shot at RB1 in 2025 for the Seminoles with Roydell Williams and Lawrance Toafili moving on after this year, and Jaylin Lucas splitting time at RB - WR.



RB Jalen Washington, Southern Mississippi - Two of the three players ahead of Washington on the depth chart, including this year's starter Dreke Clark, are seniors. A 3-star prospect that rushed for over 2,000 yards as a high school senior, Washington was an early enrollee that was getting reps with the 2s in spring practices. Profiles similarly to Frank Gore Jr. as an average athlete with tons of production.



RB Sire Gaines, Boise State - Coaches and teammates all raved about Gaines in the spring and sounds as though the 200-pound running back will have a role in the offense immediately, despite being RB3 behind Ashton Jeanty and Breezy Dubar. Gaines had a big spring game performance with 47 yards on just five attempts. We know Boise State can churn top-tier fantasy running backs on a yearly basis.



RB Micah Welch, Colorado - Top five running backs on last year's roster all hit the portal this offseason, meaning the RB1 job is up for grabs for the Buffs. Dallan Hayden (Ohio State) is the likely candidate to start, but the 205-pound Welch was in for spring practices and was spoken highly of by coaches. One preseason magazine had Welch listed as the starter over Hayden.



RB David Eziomume, Clemson - Phil Mafah will undoubtedly head to the NFL after this season, and behind him currently are just 20 carries of collegiate experience on the depth chart. Eziomume has the requisite weight at 210 pounds to handle the college grind right out of the gates and is a skilled pass-catcher for his size.



RB Yasin Willis, Syracuse - Thunder and lightning was the phrasing used to describe LeQuint Allen and Willis by coaches in the spring, as the freshman quickly made his way up the depth chart to the RB2 role in camp. Willis added 15 pounds of muscle in winter workouts, now up to 212 pounds, and dominated the final spring scrimmage with 92 yards and a TD on 11 attempts.

FRESHMEN SPOTLIGHT



WR Jeremiah Smith, Ohio State - We all know Ohio State is a factory when it comes to producing high-end fantasy receivers, and Smith is next in line. The 6-foot-3, 215 pounder has size, speed and is a smooth route runner that will likely start opposite Carnell Tate from the get-go. Wouldn't select Smith in redraft but should go inside the top two picks of freshmen drafts.



WR Cam Coleman, Auburn - Unlike Smith above, Coleman has a great chance at being his team's WR1 from the jump, and that was on full display in the spring game with four receptions for 92 yards and a score. While having Payton Thorne throwing him the ball isn't inspiring for premier fantasy production, the system under Hugh Freeze has produced multiple 100-target receivers in the last several years.



WR Ryan Williams, Alabama - Williams had a dramatic recruitment, but at the end of the day, the 5-star didn't give a piss bout nothin but the Tide. Germie Bernard is the only surefire starter at receiver in a system that has three on the field at all times. HC Kalen DeBoer has one of the top track records for wide receiver production, with his WR1 hitting 100+ targets in seven of the last eight seasons.



WR Bryant Wesco, Clemson - This might also apply to fellow freshman TJ Moore with Clemson's dire need for a playmaker or three at receiver. Wesco gets the slight nod here because of spring reports, adding 14 pounds since his arrival and highlight reel receptions posted on the team's social media page. Wesco had a nine-yard TD in the spring game.



WR Emmett Mosley, Stanford - Injuries to Elic Ayomanor and Tiger Bachmeier in the spring forced Mosley into a starting role for much of camp. Good size at 6-foot-2, 190 pounds, that displayed deep threat ability in practices, but was also utilized in the backfield at times.



WR Micah Hudson, Texas Tech - Hudson is the highest-rated prospect to ever commit to the Red Raiders according to 247Sports rankings. At 6-foot-0, 185 pounds, Hudson has the versatility to play inside or out which is an intriguing skill set in Zach Kittley's offensive scheme. The only downside here is no eyes on Hudson in the spring as he sat out due to a knee procedure.



WR Nick Marsh, Michigan State - Talk about wide open depth chart with nearly 200 vacated targets and not a single difference maker at receiver on the roster. Marsh has the prototypical size of an outside X-receiver at 6-foot-3, 208 pounds and displayed his abilities in the spring showcase with three receptions and a 75-yard touchdown.



WR Jordan Shipp, North Carolina - Plenty of buzz surrounding the 6-foot-1 freshman who caught a 16-yard touchdown in the spring game as an early enrollee. UNC brings back four receivers who started multiple games in 2023, but the question we continue to ask, is there an actual difference maker in that group? Shipp could be.



TE Elija Lofton, Miami - Remember cheat code CFF tight end Jaylen Samuels back in the day? Lofton might wind up being utilized in a similar fashion as he lined up as a tight end, H-Back and running back in spring ball. Lofton finished his high school career with 1,893 receiving yards while also rushing for 178 yards and 16 scores.

SUPPLEMENTAL DYNASTY OPTIONS

Here is our list our players possibly available in your supplemental dynasty draft, which also includes freshmen options not included in the Freshmen Spotlight.



QB DJ Lagway, Florida - Lagway will go either 1.1 or 1.2 in every supplemental dynasty draft as the heir apparent when Graham Mertz graduates after this season. The 230-pound dual-threat quarterback scored 74 total touchdowns in his senior year of high school with almost 1,000 yards on the ground. Exactly what you want from a CFF quarterback.



QB Cedrick Bailey, NC State - Bailey check marks so many boxes that we covet from a CFF quarterback. Early enrollee? Check. System? Check - we want quarterbacks that play for OC Robert Anae. Running ability? Check - Bailey rushed for 72 yards in the team's spring game. Clear path to playing time within a year? Check. Grayson McCall will graduate after this year.



QB Alex Orji, Michigan - There's a chance Orji is not the QB1 for Michigan this season, but he certainly gives the Wolverines the most upside at the position given he's widely considered to be the best athlete on the entire team. Much to be desired with Orji throwing the ball, but 10 rushing touchdowns is a distinct possibility if he started all season which would make him a CFF asset.



QB Ethan Vasko, Coastal Carolina - Vasko likely gets the first crack at replacing McCall as he started four of the final five games last season, completing 63 percent of his passes with seven touchdowns. Vasko's intrigue comes via his legs, though, after bursting onto the scene in Week 10 vs. Old Dominion with 184 rushing yards on 17 carries. Multiple years of eligibility remaining.



QB Devon Dampier, New Mexico - Dampier played in nine games as a true freshman, displaying dual-threat ability with almost six yards per rushing attempt on 59 carries. New head coach Bronco Mendenhall is one of the best in the sport at producing high-end CFF quarterbacks, with his QB1 averaging over 28 FPPG between 2018-21.



QB Jacurri Brown, UCF - KJ Jefferson will graduate after this year, and the offensive system under HC Gus Malzahn is perfectly-suited for a dual threat like Brown. The former Miami transfer had a strong performance in the bowl game vs. Rutgers, accounting for three touchdowns with 57 yards on 15 carries on the ground. Sounds like a Malzahn QB prototype, though you'll have to wait a year to play him.



QB John Mateer, Washington State - Mateer is technically still in a QB battle with Bryant transfer Zevi Eckhaus but came out of the spring with a slight lead in the competition. We know what Wazzu wants to do offensively, ranking No. 2 nationally in pass play rate at 59.9 percent of the time. Top 10 CFF upside because of the pass-happy scheme.



QB Gio Lopez, South Alabama - The 0-for-13 performance in the spring game cast some doubt over the assumption that Lopez was a shoo-in to start in 2024. Should Lopez win the job, though, that'll be at least two more years of fantasy production in a system under Major Applewhite that produced the likes of D'Eriq King and Greg Ward.



RB Cam Cook, TCU - No player saw his CFF stock increase more over the offseason than Cook who surpassed Trey Sanders as TCU's RB1 in the spring, reportedly breaking off multiple 60+ yard runs during scrimmages. Expecting a first-year starter to replicate Kendre Miller or Emani Bailey numbers might be optimistic, but this is a valuable CFF system for running backs with multiple years of eligibility remaining.

SUPPLEMENTAL DYNASTY OPTIONS



RB Chip Trayanum, Kentucky - The Wildcats had multiple attempts to land another running back to pair with Trayanum in the transfer window but failed to do so, meaning 200+ carries for the former Ohio State transfer is a distinct possibility. RB1s in this system seemingly always hit at least 10 rushing TDs. Just one year of eligibility remaining.



RB Rickey Hunt, Ohio - One-game wonder or Sieh Bangura 2.0? Hunt was the Myrtle Beach Bowl MVP accounting for five total touchdowns in the win over Georgia Southern. Ohio lost a ton in the transfer portal, so this might be a rebuilding year offensively, but Hunt has at least two years of eligibility left for a team that usually has a productive fantasy running back.



RB Jevon Jackson, UTEP - Jackson comes to UTEP via Austin Peay where he was the RB1 under new head coach Scotty Walden, rushing for 1,300 yards in 2023. This offense could be a disaster this season, ranking 118th in returning production and a totally rebuilt offensive line, but we know this is a fast-paced offense and Jackson knows the playbook already.



RB Quinton Martin, Penn State - Should be a first-round CFF dynasty draft pick considering the situation. Nick Singleton and/or Kaytron Allen are likely to take off for the NFL after this season, and Penn State has a strong reputation of producing fantasy relevant running backs. Martin is the total package, accumulating 55 rushing and 21 receiving touchdowns in his high school career. He looked the part in the PSU spring game.



RB Lee Beebe, UAB - Beebe impressed in limited time as a freshman, averaging close to seven yards a carry on 52 attempts and was useful in the passing game with 14 receptions on 17 targets. There's debate as to who is RB1 between Beebe and Isaiah Jacobs, but the former was the better of the two in both yards per attempt and yards after contact.



RB Dreke Clark, Southern Mississippi - Just one season of eligibility remaining, but Clark is all but certain to assume the RB1 job replacing Frank Gore Jr. A 200-pound bowling ball that could get you 200+ carries if things break correctly as this is generally a run-heavy system.



RB Kanye Roberts, Appalachian State - The Mountaineers have one of the deepest RB rooms in the Sun Belt, but Roberts has the highest chance to reach stardom amongst the potential options. The 205-pound sophomore reportedly averaged over 14 yards per carry this spring in team scrimmages.



WR Chris Bell, Louisville - Caullin Lacy's absence in spring camp opened the door for Bell, who had over 100 receiving yards and two touchdowns in the final scrimmage. Nine of the last 10 WR1s for head coach Jeff Brohm have been boundary receivers, which Bell is. Pay close attention to practice reports in fall camp.



WR Kamdyn Benjamin, Tulsa - The 5-foot-9 senior has a strong close to last season with 37 of his 74 targets coming in the final three weeks with a combined 86 fantasy points scored in that stretch. Tulsa's depth chart is wide open beyond Benjamin with multiple starters from last season transferring out, so he might be force fed targets in 2024.



WR Joshua Meredith, Washington State - The starting slot receiver is practically guaranteed 100 targets under offensive coordinator Ben Arbuckle, and Meredith came out of the spring with a slight lead over Oregon transfer Kris Hutson. There's top 10 fantasy upside here for Meredith if the quarterback play is up to par.

SUPPLEMENTAL DYNASTY OPTIONS



WR Omari Kelly, Middle Tennessee - The former Auburn transfer led all wideouts in MTSU's spring game with six receptions for 94 yards. In all three seasons with Eastern Washington / North Texas, offensive coordinator Bodie Reeder's WR1 hit at least 100 targets. The depth chart here is wide open for someone like Kelly to emerge as a target hog.



WR Denzel Boston, Washington - The 6-foot-4 sophomore was the talk of the spring for the Huskies, nabbing a touchdown in the final scrimmage from quarterback Will Rogers. The WR1 for HC Jedd Fisch has hit 100 targets in each of the last three years, and Boston overtook Jeremiah Hunter in the spring as the team's top wideout.



WR Zeed Haynes, Syracuse - Haynes transferred in from Georgia where he'll play under new head coach Fran Brown who was the Bulldogs' defensive backs coach so there's some familiarity there. Haynes was the MVP of the spring for the Orange, and closed camp with six receptions and a touchdowns in the team's final scrimmage.



WR Trech Kekahuna, Wisconsin - Another player you may have to wait a year on with Will Pauling ahead of him on the depth chart, but Kekahuna was Wisconsin's second-best receiver in the spring. Assuming Pauling departs after this year, Kekahuna will take over the coveted slot position under Phil Longo that typically hits 100 targets.



WR Kyren Lacy, LSU - When speaking on the receiver position in the spring, HC Brian Kelly repeatedly mentioned Lacy first amongst the group. Not expecting a huge drop off in offensive production from the Tigers' offense in 2024 with Garrett Nussmeier assuming the reins at QB and the offensive line returning largely intact.



WR Mike Matthews, Tennessee - Physically, Matthews is one of the most athletic receivers in this freshman class at 6-foot-1 with speed to burn. There's some debate on his refinedness at the position, but this is a system under Josh Heupel that runs a lot of go-routes where technical abilities aren't of most importance. If Squirrel White departs after this season, Matthews has a path to start in the slot in 2025.

Byrum Brown, South Florida - As a redshirt freshman last year, Brown threw for 3,292 yards and 26 touchdowns, while leading the team in rushing with 809 yards and 11 touchdowns. His 203 rushing attempts was third-most by a quarterback in 2023, and to prepare for another possible heavy workload on the ground, Brown put on 15 pounds by the start of spring practice. Four of his top five receivers return in 2024, including Sean Atkins, who caught 92 passes for 1,054 yards and 7 touchdowns. What makes Brown such an appealing fantasy option is the potential number of snaps he will receive in Alex Golesh's offense, as the Bulls led the FBS in plays per game last year (82.1).

Kaidon Salter, Liberty - Last year, Salter passed for 2,876 yards and 32 touchdowns, and was one of only three quarterbacks to rush for at least 1,000 yards (163-1089-12). Looking at the Flames' 2024 schedule, it is easy to envision Salter matching last year's numbers in his second season under head coach Jamey Chadwell. Last season's top target, CJ Daniels (55-1067-10) did transfer to LSU, but Treon Sibley returns after averaging 20.3 yards per catch in 2023, and former Coastal Carolina receiver Tyson Mobley transferred in. However, it is Salter's potential as a runner that makes him such an attractive fantasy option on draft day, as he averaged 12.9 fantasy points per game on the ground last year.

Jordan McCloud, Texas State - Last year, McCloud passed for 3,657 yards and 35 touchdowns, ran for 276 yards and eight scores, and led James Madison to an 11-1 regular season record. However, when head coach Curt Cignetti left for Indiana, a lot of the talent on the Dukes' roster hit the transfer portal. McCloud landed at Texas State after T.J. Finley, the Bobcats' starter last year, transferred to Western Kentucky. As good a fantasy asset McCloud was at JMU, his fantasy potential may even be greater playing in a G.J. Kinne system that averaged 36.7 points per game in 2023, eleventh-best in the FBS. Plus, he will have a couple of reliable targets to throw to with Joey Hobert (76-895-8) and Kole Wilson (66-747-8) back this fall.

Dillon Gabriel, Oregon - After passing for 3,660 yards and totaling 42 touchdowns last year (30 passing / 12 rushing), Gabriel opted for a transfer to Oregon over the opportunity to turn pro. The Ducks were the second-highest scoring team in the FBS last year, averaging 44.2 points per game, and quarterback Bo Nix threw for over 4,500 yards and accounted for 51 touchdowns. We're not expecting similar numbers from Gabriel this year, especially with the program's move to the Big Ten, but the return of WR Tez Johnson (86-1182-10), WR Traeshon Holden (37-452-6), and TE Terrance Ferguson (42-414-6), along with the addition of transfer receiver Evan Stewart (Texas A&M), gives the sixth-year senior a host of quality targets.

Jaxson Dart, Ole Miss - At this time last year, there were questions about Dart's fantasy potential after Spencer Sanders was brought in from Oklahoma State. However, Dart quickly dismissed any concerns and led the Rebels to an 11-2 record, passing for 3,364 yards and 23 touchdowns, while rushing for 389 yards and 8 touchdowns. Going into 2024, Dart is the unquestioned starter under the direction of head coach Lane Kiffin. Not only do the Rebels return two 50-catch receivers from last year, Tre Harris (54-985-8) and Jordan Watkins (53-741-3), but they added Antwane Wells Jr. from South Carolina, and Wells was the Gamecocks' leading receiving in 2022 (68-928-6).

Jackson Arnold, Oklahoma - The former 5-star recruit is set to take over at quarterback after last year's starter, Dillon Gabriel, transferred to Oregon. Fantasy owners must have, to some degree, blind faith in a young and unproven talent embedded into a Seth Littrell offense. Arnold did make his first career start in last season's Valero Alamo Bowl, where he finished 26-of-45 for 361 yards, 2 TDs, and an INT. There are at least two things that should give fantasy owners confidence in drafting Arnold: he will have proven playmakers at receiver in Nic Anderson, Jalil Farrow, and Purdue transfer Deion Burks, and a home-friendly non-conference schedule to start the year (Temple, Houston, Tulane). However, we are going to learn a lot about Arnold's long-term potential very quickly because the Sooners' SEC schedule packs a punch.

Jalen Milroe, Alabama - Last year, Milroe passed for 2,834 yards and 23 touchdowns, and he ran for 531 yards and a team-high 12 touchdowns. However, the retirement of Nick Saban and the arrival of Kale DeBoer means a change in offensive system, or so we believe. Does Milroe possess the refinement of a sharp passer that DeBoer relies on to orchestrate his offense? From what we watched of Milroe last year, not really. But, Milroe does throw a nice long ball and his dual-threat ability makes him a dangerous offensive weapon. It will not take long for DeBoer to put his name, image, and likeness on the offense, but the Tide's roster is still flooded with talent and it's a safe assumption he will adjust his play calling to his current personnel. Therefore, we like the fantasy potential of a Heisman finalist in combination with an offensive minded head coach.

Nico lamaleava, Tennessee - The lamaleava hype train officially left the station following last year's 35-0 Cheez-It Citrus Bowl win over Iowa, when the true frosh completed 12-of-19 passes for 151 yards and accounted for four touchdowns (1 pass / 3 rush). In addition to lamaleava's five-star talent, Josh Heupel's system, three returning starters along the offensive line, and an experienced receiving corps adds to his fantasy appeal. lamaleava looked poised and unfazed against an impressive Iowa defense, so imagine what his numbers might look like in some faster paced SEC matchups.

9



Garrett Greene, West Virginia - Greene had a breakout season last year, passing for 2,406 yards and 16 touchdowns, while rushing for 772 yards and 13 touchdowns. Over the last eight games of the regular season, the dual-threat quarterback averaged 16.5 fantasy points per game on the ground, scoring two or more rushing TDs five times, with three 100-yard performances. With Greene taking snaps, the strength of the offense will remain the running game, especially with running backs Jahiem White and CJ Donaldson back in 2024. The offensive line did lose two stalwarts, but they return three starters and return five linemen in total with starting experience.

10



Seth Henigan, Memphis - 2023 was a career year for Henigan, as he passed for 3,883 yards and accounted for 37 touchdowns (32 pass / 5 rush). He is already Memphis' career passing leader and another year with offensive coordinator Tim Cramsey could pay off in a big way for his fantasy owners. The Tigers do return its top two receivers from last year, Roc Taylor (69-1083-4) and Demeer Blankumsee (53-901-7), but the offensive line must replace three starters.

11



Haynes King, Georgia Tech - Only two players in 2023 passed for at least 2,700 yards and 25 touchdowns and rushed for at least 600 yards and 5 touchdowns, Jayden Daniels and Haynes King. King may not be the best quarterback in the ACC, but his dual-threat ability makes him quite an appealing fantasy option. If he can cut down on the turnovers (16 INTs last year), the Yellow Jackets' offense should improve on their 31.1 PPG scoring average from last year, especially with the return of receivers Eric Singleton Jr. (48-714-8) and Malik Rutherford (46-502-4) and four starters along the offensive line.

12



KJ Jefferson, Central Florida - After five seasons at Arkansas, Jefferson decided to transfer to Central Florida, a program in search of its next quarterback after the graduation of John Rhys Plumlee. Did Jefferson decide to leave because Bobby Petrino replaced Dan Enos as offense coordinator, or was it that Boise State transfer quarterback Taylen Green was added to the roster? Both, maybe? In regards to fantasy potential, Jefferson is a more appealing fantasy option in the Big XII, and especially with Gus Malzahn, who always seems to maximize his quarterback's dual-treat ability.

13



Chandler Morris, North Texas - The Mean Green lost starting quarterback Chandler Rogers to Cal via the transfer portal, but head coach Eric Morris utilized the portal to his advantage to lure TCU transfer Chandler Morris. Morris arrives a bit more proven than Rogers did a year ago when he transferred from Louisiana Monroe, and Rogers finished the 2023 season with 3,382 passing yards and totaled 33 touchdowns (29 passing / 4 rushing). Morris may have had his struggles at TCU, but his dual-threat skills should translate well into Eric Morris' offense against AAC opposition.

14



Cam Ward, Miami - After passing for 6,967 yards and accounting for 61 touchdowns (48 passing / 13 rushing) in two seasons at Washington State, Ward announced a transfer to Miami, where he will pilot Shannon Dawson's offense. The Hurricanes return their top two receivers from last year, Xavier Restrepo and Jacolby George, they added former Oregon State running back Damien Martinez, and three starters along the offensive line are back.

15



Riley Leonard, Notre Dame - Following Duke head coach Mike Elko's departure to Texas A&M, Leonard opted for the transfer portal and signed with the Irish. Leonard only played in seven games last year due to injury, but in 2022 he passed for 2,967 yards, rushed for 699 yards, and totaled 33 touchdowns (20 passing / 13 rushing). The senior quarterback's dual-threat ability should be a good fit with new offensive coordinator Mike Denbrock, whose system produced last year's Heisman Trophy winner. Three starters must be replaced along the offensive line, but the schedule feels friendly after the season opener at Texas A&M.

16



Avery Johnson, Kansas State - We did not get to see a ton of Johnson last season, but when we did he looked the part of the Wildcats' next quarterback. In October, he led K-State to a 38-21 win at Texas Tech, a game in which he rushed for 90 yards and five touchdowns. In the Pop-Tarts Bowl, he accounted for three touchdown (2 pass / 1 rush) in a 28-19 win over NC State. Last year's offensive coordinator, Collin Klein, left for Texas A&M, but O-line coach Conor Riley was promoted into the position, and let's not overthink it, the Wildcats' offense will still embody head coach Chris Klieman's identity.

Joey Aguilar, Appalachian State - Last year, passed for 3,757 yards and 33 touchdowns, while adding 245 yards and 3 touchdowns rushing. He accounted for three or more touchdowns in nine of fourteen games and attempted 35 or more passes six times. Three of the team's top four receivers return, including Kaedin Robinson, who caught 67 passes for 905 yards and 10 touchdowns, but three offensive line starters were lost, two of which received all-conference recognition.

18



Kyron Drones, Virginia Tech - Last year, Drones passed for 2,085 yards and 17 touchdowns and finished as the Hokies' second-leading rusher with 818 yards and 5 touchdowns. It was his improved play over the second half of the season that left us optimistic about his 2024 fantasy potential. He threw two or more TD passes in each of the Hokies' final four games and rushed for 130-plus yards in two of those four games. Not only do the Hokies return all five offensive line starters, but their top two receivers fare back, Da'Quan Felton and Jaylin Lane, and they should have a healthy Ali Jennings, a former 1,000-yard receiver.

19



Thomas Castellanos, Boston College - Last year, Castellanos passed for 2,248 yards and 15 touchdowns and rushed for 1,113 yards and 13 touchdowns. He had the second-most rushing yards for a quarterback behind LSU's Jayden Daniels and his 13 rushing touchdowns was the most by a quarterback in 2023. Unfortunately, head coach Jeff Hafley left for the NFL, which resulted in a new staff, led by new head coach Bill O'Brien, who brought in Will Lawing as the offensive coordinator. Lawing worked with O'Brien at Alabama as an offensive analyst in 2021-22. We can only assume he offense will be tailored to Castellanos' strengths, but there is always that slight risk of disconnect between player and new system that some fantasy owners fear.

20



Grayson McCall, NC State - Following the 2022 season, McCall flirted with the transfer portal after totaling 2,700 passing yards and 30 touchdowns. However, he stayed at Coastal Carolina and had his 2023 season cut short due to injury. He formally moved on from the Chanticleer's program and transferred to NC State, where his dual-threat ability feels like a good match for offensive coordinator Robert Anae's system. Not only do the Wolfpack return do-everything receiver KC Concepcion, but the offensive line returns four starters and added a Notre Dame transfer.

21



Preston Stone, SMU - In 2023, Stone passed for 3,197 yards and accounted for 32 touchdowns (28 pass / 4 rush), and now he is set to lead the Mustangs in their first season of ACC competition. The one thing that Stone will definitely have is an experienced receiving corps, as all seven receivers that caught at least 24 passes last year are back in 2024. Head coach Rhett Lashlee's quarterbacks are always fantasy relevant, as they have thrown at least 30 touchdown passes three times in his four seasons at SMU ('22-'23 / '18-'19). It is worth noting that the Mustangs play in Week 0, which results in the team having three byes between Weeks 3-11.

22



Will Howard, Ohio State - Last year at Kansas State, Howard passed for 2,643 yards, rushed for 351 yards and accounted for 33 touchdowns (24 pass / 9 rush). He then parlayed his successful 2023 campaign into an opportunity to quarterback one of the nation's premier programs, and the Buckeyes just might be the favorite to win the national title. The receiving corps is talented and deep, led by Emeka Egbuka, the offensive line returns four starters from last year, and Chip Kelly was brought in to replace Bill O'Brien as offensive coordinator, a move that feels better suited to accommodate Howard's dual-threat ability.

23



Tyler Shough, Louisville - For a second consecutive season, Louisville head coach Jeff Brohm recruited his next starting quarterback from the transfer portal. At 6-foot-5 and 230 pounds, Shough's potential has always been recognized, but his inability to remain healthy is the stigma he must shake in 2024. In three seasons at Texas Tech, he only played in 15 games, but if Shough is fortunate enough to stay put together, the thought of him leading Brohm's offense for 12 games is very appealing, especially with incoming transfer receivers Caullin Lacy (91-1316-7 at South Alabama) and Ja'Corey Brooks on board.

24



John Mateer, Washington State - After sitting behind Cam Ward for the past two seasons, Mateer is expected to take over the offense in 2024. The sample size on the redshirt sophomore is small, but the combination of the Cougars' offensive system and Mateer's dual-threat ability makes him an intriguing fantasy option this year. Plus, the receiving corps is deep, the offensive line returns three starters, and the schedule is kind with nine G5 opponents.




25



Miller Moss, USC - Moss may not be Caleb Williams, but if there is one thing fantasy owners have grown to trust over time, it's Lincoln Riley's ability to produce a top-tier fantasy quarterback. Moss' performance in last year's Holiday Bowl (23-of-33 for 372 yards and 6 TDs) either legitimized his position as Riley's next QB1 or created a high-speed hype train moving into the 2024 season. Either way, you will have to move on the junior quarterback pretty early to secure him in drafts this year, even with the Trojans having to replace its top two receivers from last year.

1	 Ashton Jeanty, Boise State - In 12 games last year, Jeanty carried the ball 220 times for 1,347 yards, caught 43 passes for 569 yards and totaled 19 touchdowns (14 rushing / 5 receiving). He averaged 18.3 rush attempts per game, while teammate George Holani averaged 16.8 rush attempts per game. Now that Holani is gone, will the Broncos ride Jeanty for 20-plus carries per game in 2024? He did pack on a few extra pounds by the start of spring practice and the school did create a logo promoting him for Heisman, so fantasy owners can hope.
2	 Ollie Gordon II, Oklahoma State - Last year, Gordon ran for 1,732 yards, caught 39 passes for 390 yards, and totaled 22 touchdowns. He averaged 20.4 rushing attempts per game and his 285 carries represented 77% of the Cowboys' workload from the running back position. It is interesting to note that Gordon only totaled 19 rush attempts in the first three games last year. AJ Green was brought in from Arkansas via the transfer portal to provide depth, but with all five starters back along the offensive line, expect another heavy dose of Gordon in 2024.
3	 DJ Giddens, Kansas State - Only one time in the first nine games of the 2024 season did Giddens carry the ball more than 16 times in a game, and in that matchup against UCF he carried the ball 30 times for 207 yards and 4 touchdowns. He carried the ball at least 18 times in the Wildcats' last four games of the year, and in those games he topped the 100-yard mark each time and totaled 5 touchdowns. Treshaun Ward (124-643-5) transferred out of the program and with little proven depth at running back, expect Giddens to get a heavy workload this fall, but four starters must be replaced along the offensive line.
4	 Phil Mafah, Clemson - Sharing backfield duties with Will Shipley last year, Mafah was the more productive fantasy back, rushing for 965 yards and 13 touchdowns, and he caught 21 passes for 108 yards. Unless a legitimate RB2 develops behind Mafah, he could top the 200-carry mark in 2024. Line play was underwhelming last year, so Matt Luke was brought in to turn things around, and with four starters back, Mafah could be even more productive in Garrett Riley's second year as offensive coordinator.
5	 Jadyn Ott, California - Last year, there were times when Ott shouldered the offensive load, as he carried the ball 246 times and caught 25 passes, totaling 1,484 scrimmage yards and 14 touchdowns. Offensive coordinator Jake Spavital left for Baylor, but o-line coach Mike Bloesch takes over, so expect him to have a lot of confidence in the Bears' running game, especially with the return of Ott and three starters along the offensive line. In two seasons, Ott has totaled 416 rushing attempts and caught 71 passes for 2,702 scrimmage yards and 25 touchdowns.
6	 Darius Taylor, Minnesota - Two weeks into the 2023, Minnesota found their replacement for Mo Ibrahim when Taylor carried the ball 33 times for 193 yards and a touchdown in the Gophers' 25-6 win over Eastern Michigan. Unfortunately, injuries limited Taylor's time on the field and he missed seven of the Gophers' last eight games of the regular season. Excluding 2023's opener, Taylor played in five games and averaged 159.2 rushing yards per game and totaled 5 touchdowns. If Taylor can avoid the injury bug in 2024 and prove that he can handle a high work rate, he could post huge fantasy numbers behind an offensive line that returns four starters.
7	 Mario Anderson Jr., Memphis - After leading South Carolina in rushing last year with 707 yards, Anderson opted for the transfer portal and committed to Memphis, a program that lost its top back from last year, Blake Watson, who totaled 1,632 scrimmage yards and scored 17 touchdowns. Watson also caught 53 passes last year, so Anderson's dual-threat ability (22-153-1 receiving in '23) should mesh well with offensive coordinator Tim Cramsey's system.
8	 Omarion Hampton, North Carolina - Last year, Hampton finished with 1,504 rushing yards, 222 receiving yards, and scored 16 touchdowns. From Weeks 6-11, he averaged 179.8 scrimmage yards per game and really put the Tar Heels offense on his back. He'll likely have to shoulder the load again, especially with quarterback Drake Maye off to the NFL. Perhaps a bigger concern for offensive coordinator Chip Lindsey heading into the fall is that the offensive line must replace four starters.
9	 Jaydon Blue, Texas - Last year, Jaydon Blue was the Longhorns' third-leading rusher behind Jonathon Brooks and CJ Baxter, totaling 398 yards and three touchdowns on the ground, while adding 14 receptions for 135 yards and a score in the passing game. After a solid spring, Blue was reportedly pushing presumptive starter CJ Baxter for the starting role, but Baxter's preseason knee injury erases any speculation about a split backfield in 2024. Head coach Steve Sarkisian is known for riding his RB1, and now that Blue seems to be the clear-cut starter, he vaults inside our Top 10.

Devin Neal, Kansas - Neal returns for his senior season after totaling 1,497 scrimmage yards (1,280 rushing / 217 receiving) and 17 touchdowns last year. He really helped his fantasy owners down the stretch, averaging 110.0 rushing yards and scoring nine of his touchdowns over the final five weeks of the regular season. New offensive coordinator Jeff Grimes wants to be physical, but he must plug in four new starters along the offensive line. In addition to the offensive line having to be rebuilt, Daniel Hishaw Jr. presents quality depth at the position, so those two factors could potentially limit Neal's ceiling in 2024.

11



Damien Martinez, Miami - After rushing for 2,167 yards and 16 touchdowns in two seasons at Oregon State, Martinez announced his intentions to enter the transfer portal and eventually cashed in his success in the northwest for an opportunity in Coral Gables, joining another Pacific Northwest transfer, quarterback Cam Ward (Washington State). Martinez should be cemented as the Canes' RB1, especially after the transfers of Donald Chaney to Louisville and Henry Parrish to Ole Miss, not to mention rising sophomore Mark Fletcher is making his way back from a foot injury. The addition of Ward and Martinez improves Shannon Dawson's offense tremendously, and the offensive line returns three starters.

Tahj Brooks, Texas Tech - In 2023, Brooks was one of only two players in the FBS to average at least 22 rush attempts per game (Marcus Carroll-Georgia St.) and his 290 carries equaled 84% of the team's workload by running backs. Don't expect that work rate to continue into 2024 with a healthy Behren Morton quarterbacking Zach Kittley's offense, but no matter how many times Brooks might have his number called, he's proven to be productive and durable. Ultimately, Tech's offensive success this year just might lie in the dependability of the offensive line, a unit that must be rebuilt after losing four starters.

13



Jordan James, Oregon - As a backup to Bucky Irving last year, Jordan James rushed for 759 yards, averaging 7.1 yards per attempt, and scored 11 touchdowns. The junior back should step into the lead role with Irving gone and Noah Whittington working his way back from a season-ending foot injury. Whittington is likely to be more active as a receiver out of the two, but James should see the heavier workload on the ground and the Ducks should have an experienced offensive line led by three returning starters and an experienced incoming transfer.

Donovan Edwards, Michigan - For two seasons we felt Edwards was going to eat into Blake Corum's workload, but outside of a Corum injury that never did happen. Now Corum is gone, so it's Edwards time to move into a feature role, but not only is 2024 a transition year from Jim Harbaugh to Sherrone Moore, the Wolverine must completely rebuild the offensive line. Now, a program like Michigan has horses in the stable, but we might just need to temper fantasy expectations.

15



Makhi Hughes, Tulane - Last year, Hughes carried the ball 258 times for 1,378 yards and 7 touchdowns under head coach Willie Fritz. Fritz left for Houston, but Hughes chose to stay and should remain the Green Wave's lead back under new head coach Jon Sumrall, who came over from Troy. Sumrall brought his offensive coordinator with him, Joe Craddock, who fed Kimani Vidal 528 rushing attempts over the previous two seasons.

16



Malik Sherrod, Fresno State - If Sherrod would have been more consistent last year, we would have recognized him as being one of the more valuable fantasy backs, but he had more sub-60 yard rushing games (5) than he did 100-yard games (4). Sherrod was slightly more valuable in PPR formats, as he averaged four receptions and 23.6 receiving yards per game. Outside of the season-opener at Michigan, the early-season schedule sets up nicely for a fast start, and the Bulldogs return three offensive line starters.

17



Quinshon Judkins, Ohio State - After rushing for 2,723 yards and scoring 34 touchdowns in two seasons at Ole Miss, it was a surprise when Judkins left for Ohio State. Had he stayed in Oxford, there might have been some debate about him being RB1 going into the 2024 season, but the potential of Judkins sharing backfield duties with TreVeyon Henderson might make fantasy owners feel a bit uneasy. Still, Judkins has proven productive and durable in two seasons, which is more we can say about Henderson, so his upside under Chip Kelly in an offense that returns four o-line starters is too great to pass up.

18



Ismail Mahdi, Texas State - Last year, Ismail Mahdi proved to be explosive, versatile and durable. Mahdi's 2,169 all-purpose yards led the FBS, as he had 1,331 rushing yards, 275 receiving yards, and 563 return yards. He touched the ball 265 times in thirteen games (223 rush attempts, 20 receptions, 22 kick returns) and totaled 12 touchdowns. We're projecting another big year from the junior back in G.J. Kinne's second season as head coach, and although last year's starting quarterback, TJ Finley, transferred to Western Kentucky, the Bobcats added Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year, quarterback Jordan McCloud.

Abu Sama III, Iowa State - Sama led the Cyclones in rushing last year with 614 yards and 6 TDs, the second straight season an ISU back failed to top the 700-yard mark after back-to-back 1,400-plus yard season by Breece Hall in 2020 and 2021. Sama did show breakout potential as a freshman last year, topping the 100-yard rushing mark in two of the last four games of the season, highlighted by his 276-yard, 3-TD game against Kansas State. Looking ahead to 2024, the offense returns fully intact, including the offensive line that returns all five starters.

20 

Bhayshul Tuten, Virginia Tech - Last year, Tuten finished the 2023 season with a team-high 863 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns, and he caught 27 passes for 239 yards and two touchdowns. He can be a game-breaker as a kick returner, too, as Tuten fielded 19 kickoffs for 550 yards and two touchdowns. He projects as the Hokies' top back in 2024, even with the return of Malachi Thomas. The Hokies averaged 189.8 rushing yards per game last year, which was 23rd-best in the FBS, and all five offensive line starters are set to return in 2024.

21 

Chip Trayanum, Kentucky - After finishing as the Buckeyes' second-leading rusher last year behind TreVeyon Henderson, Trayanum transferred for the second time in his career in hopes of securing a feature role. Kentucky must replace Ray Davis, who was a transfer prior to the 2023 season that finished the year with 1,452 scrimmage yards and 21 touchdowns. For Trayanum to reach Davis' touchdown total from a year ago might be far fetched, but the scrimmage yards number may be attainable running behind an offensive line that returns four starters.

22 

LeQuint Allen, Syracuse - Not only did Allen lead the Orange in rushing last year with 1,064 yards and nine touchdowns, but he also led the team in receptions, finishing the 2023 season with 38 catches for 210 yards and a touchdown. In the spring, new offensive coordinator Jeff Nixon spoke about Allen's ability to be an every down back and the potential he has to play at the next level. In a display of dedication and commitment, the rising junior added 15 pounds before spring to help improve strength and explosiveness.

23 

Cameron Skattebo, Arizona State - Last year, Skattebo totaled 1,069 scrimmage yards and scored 10 touchdowns. Consistency was what made Skattebo a viable fantasy option last year, as he scored in nine of twelve games. Given the struggles of the offensive line, Skattebo's numbers may have been more impressive than we initially thought. The Sun Devils battled through injuries and had to move pieces around last year, which factored into their 111.9 rushing yards per game average (3rd-worst in the Pac 12). Head coach Kenny Dillingham made it a point to get stronger and deeper up front in year No. 2, which sounds promising for Skattebo's fantasy potential in 2024.

24 

Quinton Cooley, Liberty - Cooley transferred into the Liberty program last year from Wake Forest and finished the year as the Flames' top rusher, carrying the ball 221 times for 1,401 yards and 16 touchdowns. He was one of only four running backs last year to average 100 rushing yards per game and score at least 16 touchdowns (Gordon-OKSt, Estime-ND, Harvey-UCF). There are some holes to fill along the offensive line with only two starters returning, but that might not be a major issue given the ease of schedule.

25 

RJ Harvey, Central Florida - Last year, Harvey totaled 1,654 scrimmage yards (1,416 rushing) and 17 touchdowns, and his 226 rushing attempts was the most for a UCF player since Brynn Harvey in 2009 (261-1109-14). In the last two seasons, Harvey has carried the ball 344 times and averaged 6.4 yards per attempts, and he has totaled 41 receptions for 453 yards (11.0 ypc). The Knights only return two starters along the offensive line, but they did bring in dual-threat quarterback KJ Jefferson to take some of the attention off of their senior back. However, fantasy owners can't ignore the fact that a 1,400-yard rusher, Toledo transfer, Peny Boone, was added to the roster in early May.

He tore through the first half of the schedule, catching at least seven passes in each of the first six games of the year and he topped the 100-yard mark five times. He only hit those numbers one time in the Tigers' last seven games of 2023, but he did play through a nagging injury. If he stays healthy throughout a 12-game schedule, his numbers could be even better in 2024.
2	 Tetairoa McMillan, Arizona - McMillan was the Wildcats' top fantasy receiver last year, catching 90 passes for 1,402 yards and 10 touchdowns under then head coach Jedd Fisch. Fisch left to take over at Washington, but former San Jose State head coach Brent Brennan was hired to take over the program, a move that likely preserved McMillan's fantasy value. Brennan produced only two 1,000-yard receivers in seven seasons at San Jose State, but he hasn't had a playmaker like McMillan, and sophomore quarterback Noah Fifita returns.
3	 Tory Horton, Colorado State - In 2022 Horton hauled in 71 passes for 1,131 yards and 8 touchdowns and followed that up with 96 receptions for 1,136 yards and 8 touchdowns in 2023. His average of 8.0 catches per game last year was fourth-best in the FBS. The injury to Week 1 starting quarterback Clay Millen was somewhat a blessing in disguise, as freshman Brayden Fowler-Nicolosi assumed the starting role and finished the year with 3,460 passing yards and 22 touchdowns. Now that Fowler-Nicolosi has a full season of experience, he and Horton could potentially be a lethal combination in 2024.
4	 Jalen Royals, Utah State - Last year, Royals was the only receiver in the country to catch at least 70 passes, total 1,000 yards receiving, and score 15 touchdowns (71-1080-15). Still, Royals did not lead the team in receptions, as teammate Terrell Vaughn totaled 89 receptions for 933 yards and 11 touchdowns. Vaughn is gone, so Royals likely becomes the offense's top target in 2024, and in three seasons with Blake Anderson as head coach his top target has averaged at least 5.8 receptions per game.
5	 Tez Johnson, Oregon - Last year, Johnson caught 86 passes for 1,182 yards and 10 touchdowns, setting a new single-season school mark for receptions. Instead of declaring for the NFL draft, Johnson chose to return for his senior season and will catch passes from Oklahoma transfer Dillon Gabriel. Johnson should remain just as impactful as he was last year, but with the Ducks' move to the Big Ten, the schedule presents a few more challenges than it did a season ago.
6	 Ricky White, UNLV - White was a fantasy surprise last year, as he caught 88 passes for 1,483 yards and 8 touchdowns. He posted seven 100-yard receiving games and caught at least seven passes in eight of fourteen games. Quarterback Jayden Maiava transferred to USC, but the Rebels signed Matthew Sluka, a 6-foot-3 and 215-pound transfer from Holy Cross, who threw 46 touchdown passes and only 9 interceptions in the past two seasons.
7	 Xavier Restrepo, Miami - Last year, Restrepo led the Hurricanes in receiving with 85 catches for 1,092 yards and 6 touchdowns. In 2024, he figures to be the top target again in offensive coordinator Shannon Dawson's offense led by Washington State transfer Cam Ward, who threw 48 touchdown passes for the Cougars from 2022-2023.
8	 Pofele Ashlock, Hawaii - Ashlock led the Rainbow Warriors in receptions last year with 83 for 832 yards, and his 9 receiving touchdowns tied with Steven McBride for the team lead. Both players return in 2024, as does quarterback Brayden Schager, so if head coach Timmy Chang is going to put things together, 2024 might be the year to make a jump. Ashlock averaged 6.4 catches per game last year and we like his chances of improving upon his 10.0 yards-per-catch average this year.
9	 Sean Atkins, South Florida - Atkins returns for a sixth and final season after catching 92 passes for 1,054 yards and 7 touchdowns last year. He averaged 7.1 receptions per game (8th-best in the FBS) and was targeted 120 times. No team averaged more snaps per game than South Florida in 2023 (82.1) and we do not expect that to change much, which means Atkins should continue to see plenty of targets this fall.

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- 10  **Joey Hobert, Texas State** - Hobert missed two games last year and still led the team in receptions (76), receiving yards (895), and receiving touchdowns (8). Following the 2023 season, quarterback TJ Finley left for Western Kentucky, but a fortunate series of events led to the Bobcats landing James Madison transfer quarterback Jordan McCloud, the 2023 Sun Belt Player of the Year. McCloud's arrival at Texas State feels like an upgrade to head coach G.J. Kinne's offense.
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- 11  **Tre Harris, Ole Miss** - Last year, Harris led the Rebels in receiving with 54 catches for 985 yards and 8 touchdowns, averaging 18.2 yards per reception. He was only one of three players in the FBS to have an 18.0 yards-per-catch average and average at least 4.5 receptions per game (Marvin Harrison-OSU and Tahj Washington-USC). Harris was banged up for some of last season, but to prepare for the upcoming season, he added some muscle and was listed at 6-foot-2 and 215 pounds in the spring.
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- 12  **Evan Stewart, Oregon** - Offensive coordinator Will Stein has a history of producing more than one fantasy relevant receiver in a season, as he did last year with Troy Franklin (81-1383-14) and Tez Johnson (86-1182-10). Johnson returns in 2024, but Stewart was brought in from Texas A&M to help make up for the loss of Franklin. Stewart only played eight games last year, but in 2022 he was the Aggies' leading receiver with 53 catches for 649 yards and two touchdowns.
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- 13  **KC Concepcion, NC State** - Last year, Concepcion caught 71 passes for 839 yards and 10 touchdowns, catching at least 5 passes in ten of thirteen games and he had five multiple-TD games. His 105 targets more than doubled the next-best receiver on the Wolfpack roster in 2023, and he finished second on the team in rushing with 320 yards. Quarterback Brennan Armstrong is gone, and so is MJ Morris, who transferred, but Coastal Carolina transfer Grayson McCall was brought in to run Robert Anae's offense behind an offensive line that returns four starters.
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- 14  **Germie Bernard, Alabama** - Bernard followed head coach Kalen DeBoer to Alabama and the 6-foot-1, 203-pound junior is expected to be a major contributor in 2024. Last year at Washington, Bernard caught 34 passes for 419 yards and 2 touchdowns, which are better numbers than any returning receiver on the Crimson Tide roster. Bernard has tremendous versatility, too, as he was even utilized as a returner last year, so it seems he offers the highest fantasy upside of any Bama receiver this season.
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- 15  **Emeka Egbuka, Ohio State** - It will be interesting to see how Chip Kelly reshapes the Buckeyes' offense, but we still expect Egbuka to be a major piece to the passing game. In six seasons at UCLA, Kelly did not have a receiver catch more than 60 passes in a season, but his offenses weren't as talented as the one he is inheriting this year. Egbuka is undoubtedly one of the top receivers in the country, but the transition to Kelly's system could potentially limit his fantasy ceiling.
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- 16  **Jamaal Pritchett, South Alabama** - Last year, Pritchett was the Jaguars' second-leading receiver, catching 57 passes for 883 yards and a team-high 8 touchdown receptions, despite being only 5-foot-8 and 164 pounds. This fall, Pritchett should be a frequent target of quarterback Gio Lopez, and in two of the past three years at South Alabama, Major Applewhite's WR1 has caught at least 82 passes.
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- 17  **Deion Burks, Oklahoma** - Burks led Purdue in receiving last year with 47 receptions for 629 yards and 7 touchdowns. In the Sooners' spring game, the transfer receiver caught five passes for 174 yards and 2 touchdowns from quarterback Jackson Arnold. New offensive coordinator Seth Littrell has depth at receiver, a group that returns Nic Anderson and Jail Farooq, but Burks' play-making ability makes him the standout amongst the group.
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- 18  **Eugene Wilson III, Florida** - As a true freshman, Wilson caught at least six passes in seven of the Gators' last eight games of 2023 and caught a touchdown pass in six of the last eight, but he finished the year without a 100-yard performance and averaged only 8.8 yards per reception. A year of experience should result in increased fantasy production, especially with the return of quarterback Graham Mertz, who threw 20 touchdown passes and only three interceptions last year. With Mertz and highly touted freshman DJ Lagway, the Gators are set at quarterback, but they will be tasked with rebuilding the offensive line for a second straight year.

19  **Squirrel White, Tennessee** - Last year, White led the Volunteers in receiving with 67 catches for 803 yards, nearly doubling the amount of receptions than the team's second-leading receiver, Ramel Keyton, who finished with 35 receptions. Even though White averaged 12.0 yards per catch and 5.2 receptions per game, he fell a bit short of fantasy expectations because he only scored two touchdowns, the fewest amount a touchdowns for a Tennessee leading receiver since Marquez Callaway in 2018 (37-592-2). While there might be some uncertainty about the receiver depth chart at Tennessee, White is locked in as a starter.


20  **Roc Taylor, Memphis** - Last year, Taylor led the team in receiving with 69 catches for 1,083 yards. He only scored four touchdowns, but topped the 100-yard mark six times. In 2024, the Memphis passing game should be primed for a big season under the direction of offensive coordinator Tim Cramsey, as quarterback Seth Henigan returns, as does receiver Demeer Blankumsee, and former South Carolina running back Mario Anderson was added to replace Blake Watson.

21  **Caullin Lacy, Louisville** - After leading South Alabama in receiving last year with 91 receptions for 1,316 yards and 7 touchdowns, Lacy announced his transfer to Louisville for his final season of collegiate eligibility. The Cardinals' leading receiver in 2023, Jamari Thrash, has moved on after catching 62 passes on 96 targets for 848 yards and 6 touchdowns. Lacy is expected to move into the WR1 role in an offense that should put the ball in the air more frequent than they did last year after adding transfer quarterback Tyler Shough. **UPDATE 8.17.24:** Lacy fractured his collarbone in a preseason scrimmage and is expected to miss 6-8 weeks, so don't hesitate substituting **Ja'Corey Brooks** into this spot.

22  **Will Pauling, Wisconsin** - Pauling was the Badgers' top receiver last season with 74 catches for 837 yards. He was targeted 109 times in thirteen games and accounted for six of the Badgers' ten touchdowns caught by receivers. Last year's starting quarterback Tanner Mordecai graduated, but Miami transfer Tyler Van Dyke was brought in to pilot offensive coordinator Phil Longo's offense behind an offensive line that returns three starters

























23  **Denzel Boston, Washington** - Given the talent and depth that the Huskies had at receiver last year, it's no surprise that Boston hardly played. The team's three top receivers, Rome Odunze (No. 9), Ja'Lynn Polk (No. 37), and Jalen McMillan (No.92) were all selected within the Top 100 picks of the NFL Draft, and Germie Bernard (34-419-2) followed Kalen DeBoer to Alabama. Boston was one of the spring standouts, catching seven passes for 127 yards and a touchdown in the spring game. In three years at Arizona, head coach Jedd Fisch had four receivers finish with at least 80 receptions in a season.

24  **Kole Wilson, Texas State** - Last year, Wilson caught 66 passes for 747 yards, and his eight touchdown receptions tied for the team lead with Joey Hobert. The 5-foot-9 and 165-pound receiver was a consistent performer in 2023, as he caught at least four passes in ten of thirteen games and caught a touchdown pass in seven of the Bobcats' last eleven games. Year No. 2 under head coach G.J. Kinne could produce better numbers, especially after Jordan McCloud was brought in to replace TJ Finley at quarterback.

25  **Steven McBride, Hawaii** - McBride caught 20 fewer passes than teammate Pofele Ashlock last year, but he averaged 16.3 yards per reception and finished with 1,024 yards and 8 touchdowns. The Rainbow Warriors' offense should be better with the return of McBride, Ashlock, and quarterback Brayden Schager, who threw for 3,542 yards and 26 touchdowns last season. **UPDATE:** McBride was arrested in late July and was charged with two counts of misdemeanor abuse. He has rejoined the team, but his available for Week 0 is unknown.
